

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ABOUT THE CENTER FOR LEGISLATIVE ACCOUNTABILITY

ACUF's Center for Legislative Accountability researches and selects a range of bills to evaluate a member's adherence to conservative principles. We begin by defining conservatism (i.e., the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person). Next, we apply our understanding of the proper role of government (i.e., protecting Life, Liberty and Property). Then, we select bills that focus on Ronald Reagan's philosophy of the "three-legged stool": 1) fiscal and economic: taxes, budgets, regulation, spending, healthcare, and property; 2) social and cultural: Second Amendment, religion, life, welfare, and education; and 3) national security: preserving our nation's security by maintaining a strong national defense. The wide range of issues covered are designed to give citizens an accurate assessment of how Members of Congress view the role of government in an individual's life.

METHODOLOGY

The CLA's Ratings of Congress and the States illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. When determining a position on a particular issue, the CLA begins by defining conservatism: the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person. Then, we apply the founders' belief that the proper role of government is to protect Life, Liberty and Property.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

Each lawmaker is evaluated on a zero to 100 scale, with a score of 100 representing a voting record that is perfectly aligned with conservative principles. Officials who earn a score of 90% or higher are presented with the CLA's highest honor, the Award for Conservative Excellence, while those who earn a score of 80% or higher, but less than 90%, are presented with the Award for Conservative Achievement. Additionally, any lawmaker who earns a score of 10% or lower qualifies for the ACUF's Coalition of the Radical Left.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31. Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected. The CLA provides a score for each legislative chamber, which is based upon the average scores of all members within that respective chamber. A legislature's overall score is calculated by averaging each state's two legislative chambers together in order to better reflect the differences in political power between the chambers. (The exception being Nebraska, the nation's only unicameral legislature comprising a single legislative chamber, on which the state's overall score is based.)







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ARIZONA SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. SB 1009 Combatting Executive Overreach by Requiring Legislative Approval for State of Emergencies Lasting over 30 Days. ACU supports protecting individual liberties through this legislative check on executive overreach, believes that many of government's reactions during COVID-19 did more harm than good, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 2, 2022 by a vote of 16-13 and the bill was signed into law.
- 2. SCR 1012 Strengthening Election Integrity Through Voter ID Requirements. ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards such as photo ID requirements are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and supported this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on February 24, 2022 by a vote of 16-12 and the measure will appear on the November 2022 ballot for voter approval.
- 3. SB 1018 Increasing Government Dependency by Creating a New State Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) Welfare Program. ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier lives by encouraging them to become self-sufficient, opposes further expanding government dependency which oftentimes leads to intergeneration poverty and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 22-6. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 4. SB 1074 Expanding Access to Healthcare by Expanding Dentist Scope of Practice to Include Botox Administration. ACU supports improving access to health care by easing excessive restrictions on health care providers and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on January 27, 2022 by a vote of 25-2 and the bill was signed into law.
- 5. SB 1093 Expanding Economic Growth Through a Reduction in the State's Lofty Commercial Property Tax Rate. ACU recognizes Arizona places much larger tax burdens on commercial property owners than most states, supports this broadly applied tax cut which helps expand economic and business growth and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 18, 2022 by a vote of 17-11 and the bill was signed into law.
- 6. SB 1138 Protecting Vulnerable Children by Placing Reasonable Restrictions on Sex Change Procedures on Minors. While ACU strongly supports parental rights, we also support this measure to protect children from abuse and recognize that these procedures result in permanent physiological changes to which a minor child cannot consent and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 24, 2022 by a vote of 16-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- 7. SB 1152 Advancing the Socialization of Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Through Development of a Zero Emission Vehicle Plan. ACU believes the free market is the best mechanism to determine electric vehicle infrastructure needs, opposes this government central planning scheme designed to socialize the amenities of electric vehicle owners onto all motorists and taxpayers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 16-13. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 8. SB 1159 Ensuring Schools Can Recruit the Most Effective Teachers by No Longer Mandating a Bachelor's Degree to Begin Training and Working with Students. ACU supports providing schools the flexibility to hire the most qualified and effective educators, recognizes many bachelor's degree programs provide little if any additional value to individuals pursuing teaching careers and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 24, 2022 by a vote of 16-10 and the bill was signed into law.
- 9. SB 1164 Protecting Life by Banning Abortion After 15 Weeks. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 15, 2022 by a vote of 16-13 and the bill was signed into law.



- 10. SB 1165 Protecting Women's Athletics from Competition with Men by Basing K-12 Sports on Biological Sex. ACU believes all individuals should be treated with dignity and respect and have the same opportunities under the law. ACU also recognizes that there are numerous standard classifications in sports (such as age, weight, etc.) to ensure fair competition. Therefore, ACU supports ensuring fair competition among teams competing across the state and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 2, 2022 by a vote of 16-13 and the bill was signed into law.
- 11. SB 1166 Protecting Taxpayers from Being Forced to Fund Union Activities or Provide Paid Leave for Union Events. ACU has long supported the "right to work" without joining a union, opposes unnecessarily driving up taxpayer costs and holding government services hostage to greedy union bosses and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 31, 2022 by a vote of 24-2 and the bill was signed into law.
- 12. SB 1168 Authorizing Localities to Impose Overreaching Regulations, Licensing and Insurance Mandates on Short-Term Rentals. While ACU does not oppose certain ordinances designed to protect the property rights of surrounding owners, such as noise ordinances, we oppose this overreaching measure which infringes property rights and drives up costs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 24, 2022 by a vote of 24-1 and the bill was signed into law.
- 13. SB 1191 Protecting Taxpayers by Preventing Localities from Imposing Union Project Labor or Prevailing Wage Mandates. ACU has long opposed the Davis-Bacon Act and prevailing wage mandates which unnecessarily drives up the cost of taxpayer-funded projects and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 9, 2022 by a vote of 16-12. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- **14. SB 1198 Strengthening Government Integrity Through a Restriction on Taxpayer-Funded Lobbying.** ACU supports strengthening government integrity and protecting taxpayer funds from abuse and supported this bill. The Senate defeated the bill on March 7, 2022 by a vote of 12–17.
- 15. SB 1211 Strengthening Parental Rights in Education by Establishing a "Right to Review" School Instructional Material Online. ACU supports strengthening government transparency and accountability while ensuring parents are properly informed and at the forefront of their child's education and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 14, 2022 by a vote of 16-13. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- **16. SB 1272 Increasing Government Dependency by Expanding Post-Partum Medicaid Coverage to 12 Months.** ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier, more productive lives, opposes efforts that expand dependence on government, which leads to intergenerational poverty, opposes further expanding a program rife with fraud and waste and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 10, 2022 by a vote of 26-2. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 17. SB 1333 Reducing Delivery Costs by Authorizing Autonomous "Neighborhood Occupant Electric Vehicles" on Roads with Speed Limits of 45mph or less. ACU supports proactive efforts to embrace innovation and maximize the free-market benefits provided by autonomous technology, supports reducing government regulations to ensure new technologies are not unnecessarily burdened and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 24, 2022 by a vote of 21-4 and the bill was signed into law.
- 18. SB 1412 Combatting Leftist Political Indoctrination in Public Schools by Prohibiting Instruction of Critical Race Theory. ACU recognizes that CRT is a tool used by the radical Left to advance division amongst Americans and expand the role of government. ACU believes it is abhorrent to advance this indoctrination on young students and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 24, 2022 by a vote of 16-10. (The bill failed to pass in the House after conference committee.)



- **19. SB 1476 Strengthening Election Integrity Through Ballot Numbering.** ACU supports ensuring each ballot is uniquely marked to improve ballot tracking and reduce fraud and supported this bill. The Senate defeated the bill on March 14, 2022 by a vote of 14-15.
- 20. SB 1509 Strengthening National Security by Requiring Assistants of Elected Officials to be U.S. Citizens. ACU recognizes that elected officials have high levels of authority and access to sensitive information, supports strengthening national security by ensuring those assisting them are U.S. citizens, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 17-11. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 21. SB 1643 Enriching Big Tech and Woke Corporations Through an Additional \$50 Million in Research and Development Tax Credits. ACU supports free markets and a broadly applied tax code with the lowest possible rates for all individuals and companies. ACU opposes this cronyism which provides competitive advantages to select companies and individuals while shifting tax burdens to other individuals and industries not favored by government and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 17, 2022 by a vote of 19-10. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- **22. SB 1718 Strengthening National Security by Funding 15 New Positions for Border Security.** ACU supports the expansion of employment-based immigration but opposes the audacious open border policies of the Biden Administration which are devastating many Arizona communities and severely jeopardizing national security and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 19-9. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 23. HCR 2015 Protecting Taxpayers through a 60% Vote Threshold Via the Initiative Process to Hike Taxes. ACU believes any tax increase should be imposed as only a measure of last resort, supports increasing the threshold within the initiative process to protect taxpayers and economic growth and supported this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 16-12 and the measure will appear on the November 2022 ballot for voter approval.
- 24. HCR 2024 Opposing the Biden Administration's Draconian "30 x 30" Land Grab Plan. ACU believes the private sector and the states are best equipped to manage land, opposes further expanding federal land control—especially considering the federal government controls an astonishing and unsustainable 70% of Arizona and 28% of the country's total land—and supported this resolution. The Senate defeated the resolution on May 17, 2022 by a vote of 13–15. Note: Sen. Kerr is recorded as supporting the ACU position as her vote was for purposes of resolution reconsideration.
- 25. HB 2025 Strengthening Parental Rights in Education by Ensuring Charter and Public Schools are Accessible to Parents for Tours and Classroom Observations. ACU supports strengthening government transparency and accountability while ensuring parents are properly informed and at the forefront of their child's education and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 17, 2022 by a vote of 26-2 and the bill was signed into law.
- 26. HB 2051 Expanding Wasteful Spending and Enriching Select Non-Profits by Reauthorizing the Commission on the Arts through 2030. ACU believes the free market and private sector is the best institution to direct investment to the most pressing initiatives within the arts. ACU believes funding of the arts is not a proper function of government, opposes central planning schemes such as this commission which enrich government-favored non-profits while socializing costs onto taxpayers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 22, 2022 by a vote of 28-1 and the bill was signed into law.



- 27. HB 2107 Protecting Individual Liberties by Preventing Local Governments from Shutting Down Businesses During a Declared Emergency. ACU supports protecting constitutional rights and individual liberties, recognizes countless localities abused their authority during the COVID-19 pandemic, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 16-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- 28. HB 2144 Increasing Health Insurance Premiums Through New Mandates on Biomarker Testing Coverage. ACU opposes insurance mandates which drive up the cost of insurance and restrict the ability of consumers to purchase the policies which best suit their needs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 25, 2022 by a vote of 25–2 and the bill was signed into law.
- 29. HB 2156 Socializing Movie Production Costs onto Taxpayers Through the Creation of a Motion Picture Production Program and Tax Credit Scheme. ACU believes the free market is the best mechanism to direct investment in entertainment, opposes enriching the woke Hollywood elite by socializing the costs of film and tv production onto taxpayers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 23, 2022 by a vote of June 23, 2022 by a vote of 19-9 and the bill became law without the governor's signature.
- **30. HB 2236 Strengthening Election Integrity by Banning Automatic Voter Registration.** ACU opposes automatic voter registration programs which often result in the registration of non-citizens and other ineligible individuals, which increase the risk of voter disenfranchisement via vote fraud and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 23, 2022 by a vote of 16-13 and the bill was signed into law.
- 31. HB 2237 Strengthening Election Integrity by Banning Same-Day Voter Registration. ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards such as requiring advanced registration to provide time for confirmation of residency and eligibility are designed to ensure that only legal ballots are counted. ACU supports this measure to strengthen election integrity and ensure that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 17, 2022 by a vote of 16-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- 32. HB 2243 Strengthening Election Integrity by Improving the Accuracy and Integrity of the State's Voting Rolls. ACUF's Center to Protect Voters and their Voices is a leader in rebuilding the safeguards of our election systems and ensuring that every legal vote counts. If our election system does not respect that principle, then American democracy will cease to exist. ACU supports strengthening ballot integrity and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 16-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- **33. HB 2317 Strengthening National Security Through Border Wall and Security Funding.** ACU supports the expansion of employment-based immigration but opposes the audacious open border policies of the Biden Administration which are devastating many Arizona communities and severely jeopardizing national security and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 16-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- **34.** HB 2323 Driving Up Property Insurance Premiums Through a New Mandate Prohibiting Consideration of Dog Breeds. ACU supports the ability of individuals to own and care for dogs of all breeds and opposes local ordinances that may infringe right. However, we oppose this and other insurance mandates which socialize risk and ultimately drive-up premiums for everyone and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 9, 2022 by a vote of 26-1 and the bill was signed into law.
- **35. HB 2409 Delaying a Property Tax Reduction (1 Cent Per \$100 of Assessed Value) Levied by the AZ Water Conservation District.** ACU opposes bypassing this critical fiscal restraint mechanism which forces government to assess and reprioritize the expenditure of property tax revenue and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 12, 2022 by a vote of 21-6 and the bill was signed into law.




- **36. HB 2411 Combatting Government Overreach by Transferring Regulatory Oversight of Coal Combustion Residuals from the Federal EPA to the State ADEQ.** ACU supports combatting overreaching and one-size-fits all regulations by transferring oversight from the federal government to the states and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 18, 2022 by a vote of 16-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- **37. HB 2490 Expanding Access to Healthcare by Authorizing Pharmacists to Enter into Collaborative Practice Agreements for Certain Drug Therapies.** ACU supports improving access to health care by expanding competition and reforming regulations and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 24, 2022 by a vote of 27-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- **38. HB 2492 Strengthening Election Integrity by Ensuring only U.S. Citizens are Able to Vote.** ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensuring U.S. citizens are not disenfranchised by ineligible voters and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 16-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- **39. HB 2498 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Banning Government-Imposed COVID-19 Vaccine Mandates.** ACU supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 18, 2022 by a vote of 16-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- **40. HB 2507 Protecting Religious Liberties by Ensuring Houses of Worship are Deemed as "Essential" as Other Entities During a State of Emergency.** ACU supports protecting religious liberties, believes that many of government's reactions during COVID-19 did more harm than good and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 18, 2022 by a vote of 16-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- 41. HB 2616 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Requiring Schools to Obtain Parental Consent Prior to Requiring a Child to Wear a Mask. ACU supports strong parental rights and the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 18, 2022 by a vote of 16-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- **42. HB 2637 Protecting Taxpayers by Requiring State Investments be Based Solely on Pecuniary Interests and Not Woke Social Agendas.** ACU supports protecting taxpayers by ensuring investments are made based on providing the greatest financial returns to taxpayers, without regard to political or woke social agendas, and supported this bill. The Senate defeated the bill on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 13–15.
- **43. HB 2678 Expanding Bureaucracy and Wasteful Spending Through the Creation of the "State Broadband Office".** ACU believes the free market is the best mechanism to determine the need for broadband and direct investment, opposes expanding government bureaucracy and wasteful spending and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 24, 2022 by a vote of 20-5 and the bill was signed into law.
- **44. HB 2685 Socializing Mass Transit Initiatives Within Maricopa County by Extending the Half Cent Sales Tax.** ACU believes mass transit initiatives such as bus-routes and light-rail should be privatized but if government-run, should be paid funded through user fees. Furthermore, ACU believes unnecessary regulations such as prevailing-wage mandates should be repealed before taxpayers are asked to provide additional funding for core infrastructure projects. ACU opposes extending a costly tax on all Arizonans in order to socialize uneconomical mass transit initiatives and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 19–9 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.




- 45. HB 2714 Extending the State's Costly and Wasteful Tourism Promotion Authority Through 2030. ACU believes the free market and private sector are best equipped to drive tourism as opposed to bureaucrats within government. ACU further recognizes a recent study conducted by the CLA found Arizona having one of the most wasteful tourism agencies in the country. ACU does not believe it is the proper role of government to engage in tourism promotion, opposes the further waste of taxpayer funds, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 21, 2022 by a vote of 26-1 and the bill was signed into law.
- **46. HB 2731 Fostering Economic Growth by Expanding the State's Regulatory Sandbox Program to Additional Innovations.** ACU supports efforts to advance innovation by easing regulatory burdens and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 18, 2022 by a vote of 17-11 and the bill was signed into law.
- **47. HB 2853 Improving Educational Outcomes by Expanding School Choice Vouchers to All Families.** ACU supports improving educational outcomes by empowering parents to choose the best educational option for their children through the fiscal responsible expansion of school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 24, 2022 by a vote of 16-10 and the bill was signed into law.
- **48. HB 2862 Advancing Out-Of-Control Spending Through a Budget with \$5 Billion in New Spending and a Litany of Special-Interest Handouts.** ACU recognizes Democrats won huge in this measure, believes it is abhorrent that a Republican-controlled legislature and executive branch would allow passage of such a crony and fiscally irresponsible budget and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 20-8 and the bill was signed into law.

REPUBLICAN AVERAGE **85%**





ARIZONA HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. SB 1009 Combatting Executive Overreach by Requiring Legislative Approval for State of Emergencies Lasting over 30 Days. ACU supports protecting individual liberties through this legislative check on executive overreach, believes that many of government's reactions during COVID-19 did more harm than good, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 27, 2022 by a vote of 31-27 and the bill was signed into law.
- 2. SCR 1012 Strengthening Election Integrity Through Voter ID Requirements. ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards such as photo ID requirements are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on February 28, 2022 by a vote of 31-26 and the measure will appear on the November 2022 ballot for voter approval.
- 3. SB 1074 Expanding Access to Healthcare by Expanding Dentist Scope of Practice to Include Botox Administration. ACU supports improving access to health care by easing excessive restrictions on health care providers and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 10, 2022 by a vote of 55-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 4. SB 1093 Expanding Economic Growth Through a Reduction in the State's Lofty Commercial Property Tax Rate. ACU recognizes Arizona places much larger tax burdens on commercial property owners than most states, supports this broadly applied tax cut which helps expand economic and business growth and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 31-28 and the bill was signed into law.
- 5. SB 1138 Protecting Vulnerable Children by Placing Reasonable Restrictions on Sex Change Procedures on Minors. While ACU strongly supports parental rights, we also support this measure to protect children from abuse and recognize that these procedures result in permanent physiological changes to which a minor child cannot consent and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 24, 2022 by a vote of 31-26 and the bill was signed into law.
- 6. SB 1159 Ensuring Schools Can Recruit the Most Effective Teachers by No Longer Mandating a Bachelor's Degree to Begin Training and Working with Students. ACU supports providing schools the flexibility to hire the most qualified and effective educators, recognizes many bachelor's degree programs provide little if any additional value to individuals pursuing teaching careers and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 31-27 and the bill was signed into law.
- 7. SB 1164 Protecting Life by Banning Abortion After 15 Weeks. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 24, 2022 by a vote of 31-26 and the bill was signed into law.
- 8. SB 1165 Protecting Women's Athletics from Competition with Men by Basing K-12 Sports on Biological Sex. ACU believes all individuals should be treated with dignity and respect and have the same opportunities under the law. ACU also recognizes that there are numerous standard classifications in sports (such as age, weight, etc.) to ensure fair competition. Therefore, ACU supports ensuring fair competition among teams competing across the state and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 24, 2022 by a vote of 31-24 and the bill was signed into law.
- 9. SB 1166 Protecting Taxpayers from Being Forced to Fund Union Activities or Provide Paid Leave for Union Events. ACU has long supported the "right to work" without joining a union, opposes unnecessarily driving up taxpayer costs and holding government services hostage to greedy union bosses and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 24, 2022 by a vote of 48-5 and the bill was signed into law.



- 10. SB 1168 Authorizing Localities to Impose Overreaching Regulations, Licensing and Insurance Mandates on Short-Term Rentals. While ACU does not oppose certain ordinances designed to protect the property rights of surrounding owners, such as noise ordinances, we oppose this overreaching measure which infringes property rights and drives up costs and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 24, 2022 by a vote of 41-9 and the bill was signed into law.
- 11. SB 1211 Strengthening Parental Rights in Education by Establishing a "Right to Review" School Instructional Material Online. ACU supports strengthening government transparency and accountability while ensuring parents are properly informed and at the forefront of their child's education and supported this bill. The House defeated the bill on April 18, 2022 by a vote of 28-30. (The House then voted to reconsider but did not take a subsequent vote.)
- 12. SB 1333 Reducing Delivery Costs by Authorizing Autonomous "Neighborhood Occupant Electric Vehicles" on Roads with Speed Limits of 45mph or less. ACU supports proactive efforts to embrace innovation and maximize the free-market benefits provided by autonomous technology, supports reducing government regulations to ensure new technologies are not unnecessarily burdened and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 18, 2022 by a vote of 48–2 and the bill was signed into law.
- 13. SB 1412 Combatting Leftist Political Indoctrination in Public Schools by Prohibiting Instruction of Critical Race Theory. ACU recognizes that CRT is a tool used by the radical Left to advance division amongst Americans and expand the role of government. ACU believes it is abhorrent to advance this indoctrination on young students and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 25, 2022 by a vote of 31-27. (The bill failed to pass in the House after conference committee.)
- 14. HB 2001 Protecting Employment Opportunities by Preempting Local Regulations Relating to Collective Bargaining and Employee Labor Productivity. ACU supports protecting employment opportunities by combatting overreaching regulations at all levels of government and supported this bill. The House defeated the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 30-29 (31 votes were required for passage).
- 15. HCR 2015 Protecting Taxpayers Through a 60% Vote Threshold Via the Initiative Process to Hike Taxes. ACU believes any tax increase should be imposed as only a measure of last resort, supports increasing the threshold within the initiative process to protect taxpayers and economic growth and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 31-27 and the measure will appear on the November 2022 ballot for voter approval.
- 16. HCR 2024 Opposing the Biden Administration's Draconian "30 x 30" Land Grab Plan. ACU believes the private sector and the states are best equipped to manage land, opposes further expanding federal land control—especially considering the federal government controls an astonishing and unsustainable 70% of Arizona's land and 28% of the country's total land—and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on February 3, 2022 by a vote of 31-27. (The resolution failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 17. HB 2025 Strengthening Parental Rights in Education by Ensuring Charter and Public Schools are Accessible to Parents for Tours and Classroom Observations. ACU supports strengthening government transparency and accountability while ensuring parents are properly informed and at the forefront of their child's education and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 15, 2022 by a vote of 31-28 and the bill was signed into law.
- **18.** HCR 2031 Protecting Employment Opportunities by Preventing Localities from Imposing Additional Wage, Leave and Benefit Mandates. ACU supports protecting employment opportunities by combatting overreaching regulations at all levels of government and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 31-28. (The resolution failed to advance in the Senate.)



- 19. HB 2051 Expanding Wasteful Spending and Enriching Select Non-Profits by Reauthorizing the Commission on the Arts Through 2030. ACU believes the free market and private sector is the best institution to direct investment to the most pressing initiatives within the arts. ACU believes funding of the arts is not a proper function of government, opposes central planning schemes such as this commission which enrich government-favored non-profits while socializing costs onto taxpayers and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 3, 2022 by a vote of 44–14 and the bill was signed into law.
- 20. HB 2107 Protecting Individual Liberties by Preventing Local Governments from Shutting Down Businesses During a Declared Emergency. ACU supports protecting constitutional rights and individual liberties, recognizes countless localities abused their authority during the COVID-19 pandemic, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 17, 2022 by a vote of 31-28 and the bill was signed into law.
- 21. HB 2125 Imposing Overreaching New Regulations on the Sale of Vaping, Tobacco and E-Cigarette Products. ACU believes the use of tobacco and nicotine is a personal liberty issue, believes that government regulations on products are only appropriate when their use substantially impacts others and opposed this bill. The House defeated the bill on March 3, 2022 by a vote of 29-27. (31 votes were required for passage and the House then voted to reconsider but did not take a subsequent vote.) Note: Rep. Martinez is recorded as opposing the ACU position as her vote was for purposes of bill reconsideration.
- 22. HB 2144 Increasing Health Insurance Premiums Through New Mandates on Biomarker Testing Coverage. ACU opposes insurance mandates which drive up the cost of insurance and restrict the ability of consumers to purchase the policies which best suit their needs and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 2, 2022 by a vote of 52-4 and the bill was signed into law.
- 23. HB 2156 Socializing Movie Production Costs onto Taxpayers Through the Creation of a Motion Picture Production Program and Tax Credit Scheme. ACU believes the free market is the best mechanism to direct investment in entertainment, opposes enriching the woke Hollywood elite by socializing the costs of film and tv production onto taxpayers and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 39-18 and the bill became law without the governor's signature.
- **24. HB 2236 Strengthening Election Integrity by Banning Automatic Voter Registration.** ACU opposes automatic voter registration programs which often result in the registration of non-citizens and other ineligible individuals, which increase the risk of voter disenfranchisement via vote fraud and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 24, 2022 by a vote of 31-28 and the bill was signed into law.
- 25. HB 2237 Strengthening Election Integrity by Banning Same-Day Voter Registration. ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards such as requiring advanced registration to provide time for confirmation of residency and eligibility are designed to ensure that only legal ballots are counted. ACU supports this measure to strengthen election integrity and ensure that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 22, 2022 by a vote of 31-28 and the bill was signed into law.
- 26. HB 2243 Strengthening Election Integrity by Improving the Accuracy and Integrity of the State's Voting Rolls. ACUF's Center to Protect Voters and their Voices is a leader in rebuilding the safeguards of our election systems and ensuring that every legal vote counts. If our election system does not respect that principle, then American democracy will cease to exist. ACU supports strengthening ballot integrity and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 31-27 and the bill was signed into law.
- 27. HB 2316 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights by Permitting Concealed Carry Holders to Carry in a Greater Range of Public Spaces. ACU supports the Founders' belief in the Second Amendment, opposes weakening the ability of law-abiding citizens to defend themselves against criminals who do not abide by the law and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 17, 2022 by a vote of 31-28. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)



- 28. HB 2317 Strengthening National Security Through Border Wall and Security Funding. ACU supports the expansion of employment-based immigration but opposes the audacious open border policies of the Biden Administration which are devastating many Arizona communities and severely jeopardizing national security and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 31-27 and the bill was signed into law.
- 29. HB 2323 Driving Up Property Insurance Premiums Through a New Mandate Prohibiting Consideration of Dog Breeds. ACU supports the ability of individuals to own and care for dogs of all breeds and opposes local ordinances that may infringe right. However, we oppose this and other insurance mandates which socialize risk and ultimately drive-up premiums for everyone and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 16, 2022 by a vote of 43-10 and the bill was signed into law.
- **30. HB 2409 Delaying a Property Tax Reduction (1 Cent Per \$100 of Assessed Value) Levied by the AZ Water Conservation District.** ACU opposes bypassing this critical fiscal restraint mechanism which forces government to assess and reprioritize the expenditure of property tax revenue and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 46-13 and the bill was signed into law.
- 31. HB 2411 Combatting Government Overreach by Transferring Regulatory Oversight of Coal Combustion Residuals from the Federal EPA to the State ADEQ. ACU supports combatting overreaching and one-size-fits all regulations by transferring oversight from the federal government to the states and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 3, 2022 by a vote of 31-28 and the bill was signed into law.
- **32. HB 2414 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights by Permitting Firearms to Be Stored Loaded Inside Locked Vehicles on School Grounds.** ACU supports the Founders' belief in the Second Amendment, opposes weakening the ability of law-abiding citizens to defend themselves against criminals who do not abide by the law and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 17, 2022 by a vote of 31-27. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- **33. HB 2490 Expanding Access to Healthcare by Authorizing Pharmacists to Enter into Collaborative Practice Agreements for Certain Drug Therapies.** ACU supports improving access to health care by expanding competition and reforming regulations and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 58–1 and the bill was signed into law.
- **34. HB 2492 Strengthening Election Integrity by Ensuring only U.S. Citizens are Able to Vote.** ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensuring U.S. citizens are not disenfranchised by ineligible voters and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 28, 2022 by a vote of 31-26 and the bill was signed into law.
- **35. HB 2498 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Banning Government-Imposed COVID-19 Vaccine Mandates.** ACU supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 24, 2022 by a vote of 31-28 and the bill was signed into law.
- **36. HB 2507 Protecting Religious Liberties by Ensuring Houses of Worship are Deemed as "Essential" as Other Entities During a State of Emergency.** ACU supports protecting religious liberties, believes that many of government's reactions during COVID-19 did more harm than good and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 19, 2022 by a vote of 35-22 and the bill was signed into law.
- **37. HB 2616 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Requiring Schools to Obtain Parental Consent Prior to Requiring a Child to Wear a Mask.** ACU supports strong parental rights and the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 17, 2022 by a vote of 31-28 and the bill was signed into law.



- **38. HB 2678 Expanding Bureaucracy and Wasteful Spending Through the Creation of the "State Broadband Office".** ACU believes the free market is the best mechanism to determine the need for broadband and direct investment, opposes expanding government bureaucracy and wasteful spending and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 46-13 and the bill was signed into law.
- 39. HB 2685 Socializing Mass Transit Initiatives Within Maricopa County by Extending the Half Cent Sales Tax. ACU believes mass transit initiatives such as bus-routes and light-rail should be privatized but if government-run, should be paid funded through user fees. Furthermore, ACU believes unnecessary regulations such as prevailing-wage mandates should be repealed before taxpayers are asked to provide additional funding for core infrastructure projects. ACU opposes extending a costly tax on all Arizonans in order to socialize uneconomical mass transit initiatives and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 37-21 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- **40. HB 2714 Extending the State's Costly and Wasteful Tourism Promotion Authority Through 2030.** ACU believes the free market and private sector are best equipped to drive tourism as opposed to bureaucrats within government. ACU further recognizes a recent study conducted by the CLA found Arizona having one of the most wasteful tourism agencies in the country. ACU does not believe it is the proper role of government to engage in tourism promotion, opposes the further waste of taxpayer funds, and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 47-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- **41. HB 2731 Fostering Economic Growth by Expanding the State's Regulatory Sandbox Program to Additional Innovations.** ACU supports efforts to advance innovation by easing regulatory burdens and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 39-20 and the bill was signed into law.
- **42. HB 2739 Holding School Boards Accountable to Parents by Ensuring Open Meetings and Recording of Minutes.** ACU supports strengthening government transparency and accountability by ensuring parents are able to voice their concerns and questions to school board officials and supported this bill. The House defeated the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 30–29.
- **43. HB 2746 Advancing the State's War on Individual Liberties by Raising the Nicotine and Smoking Age to 21.** ACU believes the usage of both cigarettes and e-cigarettes is a personal liberty issue and those who are old enough to fight for our country are old enough to decide whether to purchase nicotine or vaping products and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 24, 2022 by a vote of 39-20. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- **44. HB 2811 Protecting Life by Banning Abortion-Inducing Drugs Such as Mifepristone.** ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this bill. The House defeated the bill on February 24, 2022 by a vote of 28–31.
- **45. HB 2853 Improving Educational Outcomes by Expanding School Choice Vouchers to All Families.** ACU supports improving educational outcomes by empowering parents to choose the best educational option for their children through the fiscal responsible expansion of school choice and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 22, 2022 by a vote of 31-26 and the bill was signed into law.
- **46. HB 2862 Advancing Out-Of-Control Spending Through a Budget with \$5 Billion in New Spending and a Litany of Special-Interest Handouts.** ACU recognizes Democrats won huge in this measure, believes it is abhorrent that a Republican-controlled legislature and executive branch would allow passage of such a crony and fiscally irresponsible budget and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 23, 2022 by a vote of 49-9 and the bill was signed into law.
