The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the CPAC Foundation, is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area.

In 1971, ACUF launched its Ratings of Congress to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress. The Ratings quickly became considered the “gold standard” and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles.

In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, Ratings of the States grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers. Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America’s federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31.

Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual’s life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected.

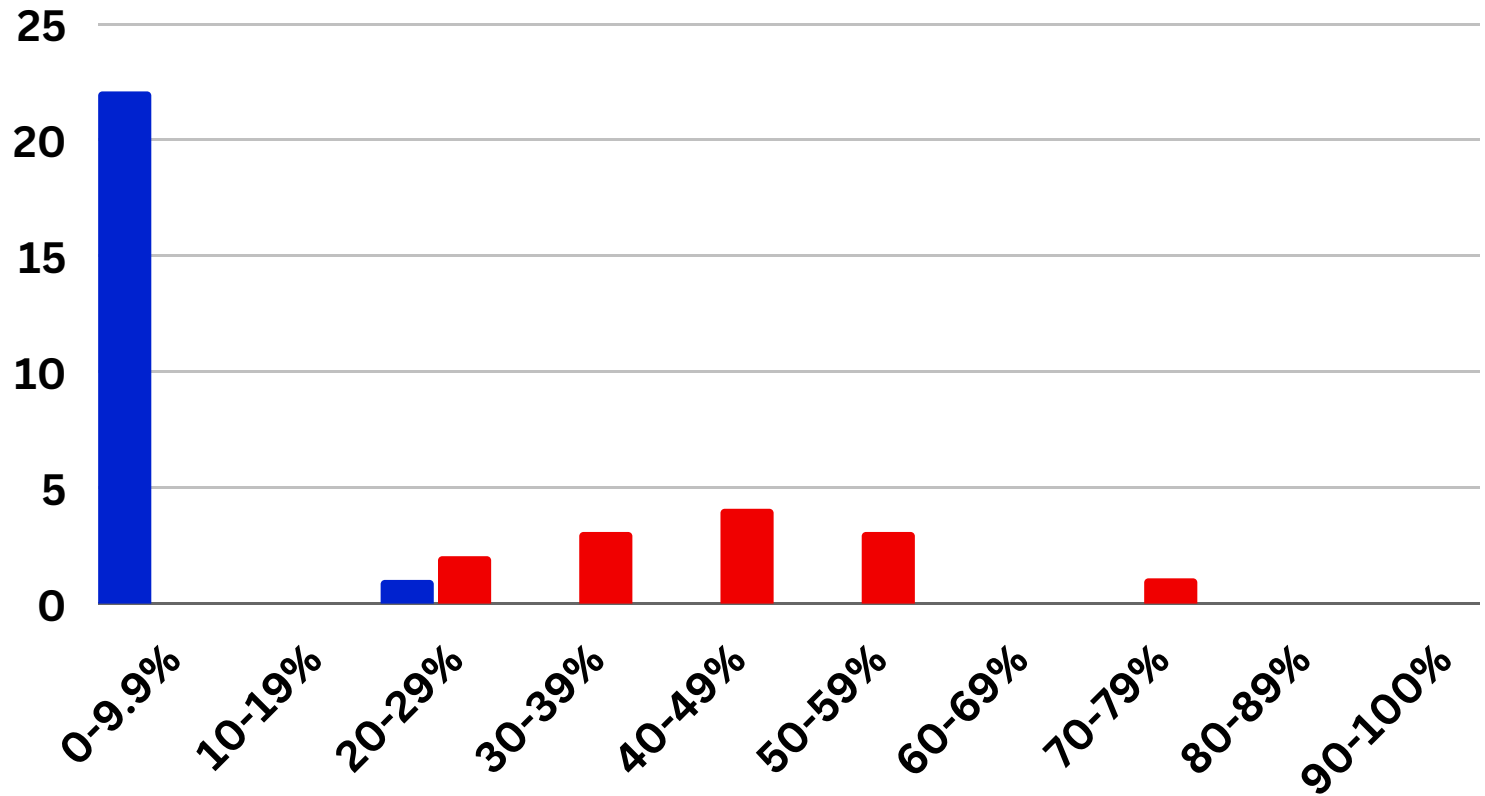

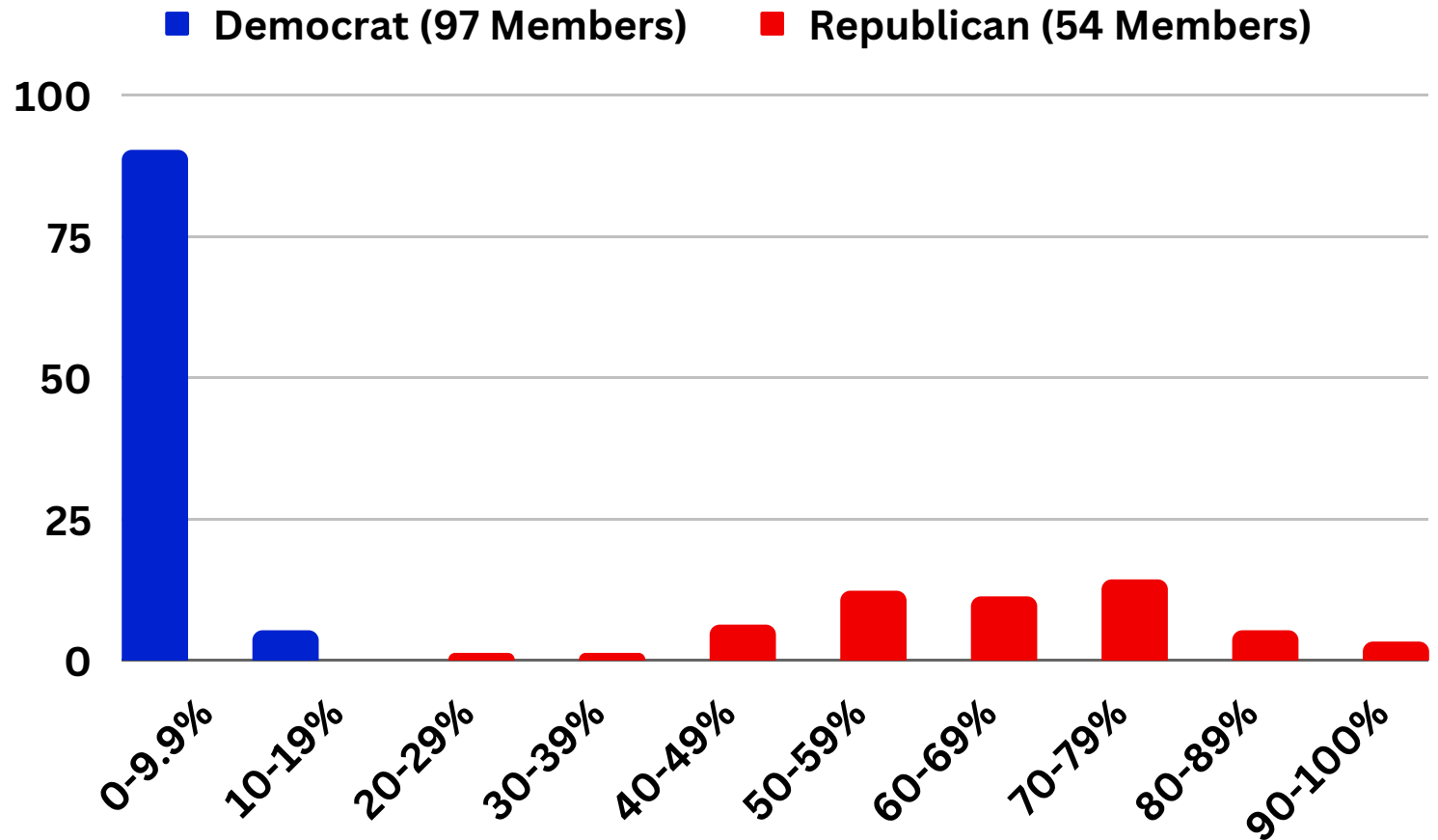

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HJR 107 Paving the Way for the Implementation of Leftist Conservation Policies.

This bill adopts the "Conservation and Development Policies: The Plan for Connecticut, 2018-2023" as the state's conservation plan. This plan provides not only for environmental conservation, but also directs the state to involve itself in expanding housing opportunities. CPAC believes that this plan will unnecessarily increase the role of government and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 4, 2022 by a vote of 31-5 and the bill later became law.

HB 5047 Usurping Parental Rights to Lengthen School Mask Mandates.

This bill extends the sunset date on an executive order that allowed schools to require children to remain masked while attending school. CPAC opposes mask mandates and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 14, 2022 by a vote of 21-14 and the bill later became law.

HB 5216 Imposing Additional Regulations on the Banking Industry.

This bill requires banks to offer basic banking accounts to consumers. These accounts may not institute fees for account closures, dormancies, or overdrafts. They must also include initial deposits lower than \$25 and must offer deposits and check cashing at no additional charge. CPAC opposes attempts by the government to force governments to offer certain products and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 4, 2022 by a vote of 36-0 and the bill later became law.

HB 5264 Reducing Government Oversight over Socialized Grant Programs.

This bill allows the board of directors of Connecticut Innovations to delegate the decision to approve an application to staff members as long as the application is seeking less than five-hundred dollars. CPAC opposes efforts that loosen safeguards to prevent fraud and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 4, 2022 by a vote of 35-1 and the bill later became law.

HB 5305 Frivolous Fines For Firearm Retailers.

This bill imposes fines on firearms retailers that do not install burglar alarms into their store. CPAC believes that this regulation unfairly hamstring such businesses, does not believe that it is a proper duty of government to regulate burglary alarms in stores, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 4, 2022 by a vote of 36-0 and the bill later became law.



HB 5414 Converting Connecticut into a Sanctuary State for Abortionists.

This bill prohibits certain covered entities within the state from releasing information pertaining to the abortions one attains or seeks in the state of Connecticut. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, opposes its expansion, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 29, 2022 by a vote of 25-9 and the bill later became law.

HB 5505 Special Interest Tax Credits for Manufacturers.

This bill allows manufacturers engaged in certain aerospace manufacturing projects to claim tax credits against their corporate business tax liability. CPAC opposes government favoritism toward particular industries and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 27, 2022 by a vote of 34-1 and the bill later became law.

SR 12 Giving Bureaucrats a \$1.87B Raise.

This resolution approves a \$1,870,000,000 salary increase for state employees that was agreed upon between the State of Connecticut and the State Employees Bargaining Coalition. CPAC opposes efforts to sustain the power of public unions and opposed this resolution. The Senate passed this resolution on April 22, 2022 by a vote of 22-13.

SB 4 Connecticut's Green New Deal.

This bill orders the state to cease the purchase of diesel-powered transit buses. It also annuls provisions made by condominiums that restrict the creation of EV charging stations. Additionally, the bill offers vouchers to entities in "environmental justice communities" that purchase electric batteries. CPAC supports all forms of energy, does not believe that the government should favor one form of energy over another, opposes building mandates, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 26, 2022 by a vote of 24-11 and the bill later became law.

SB 10 Instituting Burdensome Climate Goals.

This bill makes it a goal of the state to reduce total emissions of greenhouse gases from electricity production to 0 by 2040. CPAC believes that this goal is unreasonable and will constitute a major burden on consumers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 26, 2022 by a vote of 35-0 and the bill later became law.



SB 93 Financing the Radical Leftist “Green Agenda.”

This bill decreases the state’s responsibility to ensure that the benefits of projects that are financed by the Connecticut Green Bank outweigh its costs. CPAC opposes taking such a reckless attitude toward state programs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 19, 2022 by a vote of 33-1 and the bill later became law.

SB 118 Increasing Costs for Consumers and Restaurants.

This bill prohibits restaurants from distributing polystyrene single-use containers to customers. CPAC opposes government regulations that inappropriately hinder the business operations of restaurants and increase costs for consumers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 20, 2022 by a vote of 24-11 but the bill did not progress in the House.

SB 317 Incentivizing Union Members to Strike.

This bill allows striking employees to collect unemployment benefits. CPAC opposes measures that allow individuals who are already employed to collect unemployment benefits and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 13, 2022 by a vote of 19-13 but the bill did not progress in the House.

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HR 11 Giving Bureaucrats a \$1.87B raise.

This resolution approves a \$1,870,000,000 salary increase for state employees that was agreed upon between the State of Connecticut and the State Employees Bargaining Coalition. CPAC opposes efforts to sustain the power of public unions and opposed this resolution. The House passed this resolution on April 21, 2022 by a vote of 96-52.

HR 12 More Privileges for Academia.

This resolution approves an agreement made between the Graduate Employee Union and the University of Connecticut Board of Trustees. The agreement provides for annual increases to stipends for GA's and for an expanded number of holidays for these employees. CPAC opposes sustaining the power of public unions and opposed this resolution. The House passed this resolution on April 21, 2022 by a vote of 104-44.

HJR 107 Paving the Way for the Implementation of Leftist Conservation Policies.

This bill adopts the "Conservation and Development Policies: The Plan for Connecticut, 2018-2023" as the state's conservation plan. This plan provides not only for environmental conservation, but also directs the state to involve itself in expanding housing opportunities. CPAC believes that this plan will unnecessarily increase the role of government and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on March 16, 2022 by a vote of 101-39 and the bill later became law.

HB 5047 Usurping Parental Rights to Lengthen School Mask Mandates.

This bill extends the sunset date on an executive order that allowed schools to require children to remain masked while attending school. CPAC opposes mask mandates and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on February 10, 2022 by a vote of 86-62 and the bill later became law.

HB 5216 Imposing Additional Regulations on the Banking Industry.

This bill requires banks to offer basic banking accounts to consumers. These accounts may not institute fees for account closures, dormancies, or overdrafts. They must also include initial deposits lower than \$25 and must offer deposits and check cashing at no additional charge. CPAC opposes attempts by the government to force governments to offer certain products and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 13, 2022 by a vote of 109-31 and the bill later became law.



HB 5264 Reducing Government Oversight over Socialized Grant Programs.

This bill allows the board of directors of Connecticut Innovations to delegate the decision to approve an application to staff members as long as the application is seeking less than five-hundred dollars. CPAC opposes efforts that loosen safeguards to prevent fraud and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 27, 2022 by a vote of 92-53 and the bill later became law.

HB 5305 Frivolous Fines For Firearm Retailers.

This bill imposes fines on firearms retailers that do not install burglar alarms into their store. CPAC believes that this regulation unfairly hamstring such businesses, does not believe that it is a proper duty of government to regulate burglary alarms in stores, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 19, 2022 by a vote of 147-0 and the bill later became law.

HB 5343 Taking the LGBT+ Agenda Even Further Left.

This bill makes it a goal of the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer Health and Human Services Network to promote equitable opportunities to and educational awareness about the members of these richly favored and privileged sexualities. CPAC opposes the promotion of Leftist notions about equity, the likes of which often requires unjust forms of discrimination, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 26, 2022 by a vote of 138-4 but the bill did not progress in the Senate.

HB 5386 Driving Up Insurance Costs with More Government Mandates.

This requires certain insurance plans to also cover the cost of acquiring at least one epinephrine cartridge injector. CPAC opposes insurance mandates, the likes of which drive up the costs of premiums for everyone, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 19, 2022 by a vote of 142-4 but the bill did not make it any further.

HB 5414 Converting Connecticut into a Sanctuary State for Abortionists.

This bill prohibits certain covered entities within the state from releasing information pertaining to the abortions one attains or seeks in the state of Connecticut. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, opposes its expansion, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 19, 2022 by a vote of 87-60 and the bill later became law.



HB 5444 Tying the Hands of Employers.

This bill prohibits employers from permanently replacing employees who are striking. CPAC believes that this is an incredibly unreasonable regulation to place on businesses, believes that this measure would create a majorly anti-business environment in Connecticut, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 13, 2022 by a vote of 91-49 but the bill did not progress in the Senate.

HB 5505 Special Interest Tax Credits for Manufacturers.

This bill allows manufacturers engaged in certain aerospace manufacturing projects to claim tax credits against their corporate business tax liability. CPAC opposes government favoritism toward particular industries and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 27, 2022 by a vote of 130-14 and the bill later became law.

SB 4 Connecticut's Green New Deal.

This bill orders the state to cease the purchase of diesel-powered transit buses. It also annuls provisions made by condominiums that restrict the creation of EV charging stations. Additionally, the bill offers vouchers to entities in "environmental justice communities" that purchase electric batteries. CPAC supports all forms of energy, does not believe that the government should favor one form of energy over another, opposes building mandates, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 29, 2022 by a vote of 95-52 and the bill later became law.

SB 10 Instituting Burdensome Climate Goals.

This bill makes it a goal of the state to reduce total emissions of greenhouse gases from electricity production to 0 by 2040. CPAC believes that this goal is unreasonable and will constitute a major burden on consumers and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 28, 2022 by a vote of 113-35 and the bill later became law.

SB 93 Financing the Radical Leftist "Green Agenda."

This bill decreases the state's responsibility to ensure that the benefits of projects that are financed by the Connecticut Green Bank outweigh its costs. CPAC opposes taking such a reckless attitude toward state programs and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 28, 2022 by a vote of 119-31 and the bill later became law.
