SELECTING THE VOTES

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the CPAC Foundation, is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area.

In 1971, ACUF launched its Ratings of Congress to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress. The Ratings quickly became considered the "gold standard" and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles.

In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, Ratings of the States grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers. Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America's federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31.

Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected.





SB 152 Micromanaging the Employment Practices of Warehouse Owners.

This bill requires warehouse owners to provide their employees with the quotas that they are expected to meet while performing their job. The bill also sets certain regulations that employers must follow when creating such quotas. CPAC opposes measures that allow the government to micromanage the workplace and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on June 7, 2023 by a vote of 24-12 but the bill never became law.

SB 911 Reducing Penalties for Unemployment Fraud During a Fraud Epidemic.

This bill raises the threshold amount of money that a person must wrongfully obtain from the unemployment insurance system through fraud in order for their crime to count as a felony. According to Connecticut's own Department of Labor, about 75% of the unemployment claims that the state currently receives are fraudulent. CPAC believes that it is foolish to lower the consequences of committing unemployment fraud when a large amount of fraud is occurring and, therefore, opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 4, 2023 by a vote of 23-11 but the bill never became law.

SB 977 Forcing Taxpayers to Fund Other People's Weight Loss Plans.

This bill requires the Commissioner of Social Services to provide medical assistance to people such that they may receive bariatric surgeries and related medical services. CPAC believes that taxpayers should not be forced to pay for other people's weight loss medical procedures and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 16, 2023 by a vote of 30–5 and the bill later became law.

SB 988 Foisting Purchasing Mandates Down Onto Mobile Home Park Owners.

This bill requires mobile home park owners to, when trying to sell their mobile home park, offer to sell the property to the park's tenants at the price being offered for it by other buyers. CPAC opposes measures that inappropriately infringe on one's capacity to form contracts with whomever they wish and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 31, 2023 by a vote of 26-9 and the bill later became law.

SB 1035 Increasing the Force of Prevailing Wage Laws.

This bill raises the fine an employer may incur for failing to pay the prevailing wage rate to their workers. It also allows for stop work orders to be issued for failures to pay the prevailing wage rate. CPAC opposes artificial wage increases, opposes making such increases even more onerous for employers, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 4, 2023 by a vote of 28-7 and the bill later became law.





SB 1108 Getting Connecticut's Universities into the Contraceptives Business.

This bill requires public institutions of higher education to develop plans to provide students that live on campus with access to abortion services. CPAC believes that public universities should focus on educating students, not subsidizing their sex, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 25, 2023 by a vote of 34-2 and the bill later became law.

SB 1123 Expanding the Prevailing Wage Mandate to More Construction Projects.

This bill includes residential constructions in the list of projects that are subject to existing prevailing wage contract rates. CPAC opposes prevailing wage mandates, the likes of which massively increase the cost of construction, opposes their expansion, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 3, 2023 by a vote of 33-2 and the bill later became law.

SB 1147 Worsening Onerous Environmental Justice Laws.

This bill strengthens requirements that force certain facilities applying for environmental permits in "environmental justice communities" to consider the cumulative health and environmental consequences that may be attendant to the construction of the facility. It also allows state agencies to deny permits based on these factors and expands public notice requirements for facility constructions. CPAC recognizes that these provisions will be incredibly onerous for businesses and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on June 2, 2023 by a vote of 34-2 and the bill later became law.

SB 1178 Cramming Down Even More Sick Leave Mandates onto Employers.

This bill expands Connecticut's paid sick leave laws to cover all private employers, expands the reasons for which employees may take leave, and increases the number of days of sick leave that an employee may take. CPAC believes that employees, not the government, should negotiate their benefits with employers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 18, 2023 by a vote of 20-12 but the bill never became law.

HJ 1 Reducing Election Security by Massively Expanding Absentee Ballot Voting.

This resolution proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow for no-excuse absentee ballot voting. This means that any elector in the state of Connecticut would be able to receive an absentee ballot without exception. CPAC opposes measures that reduce election security and opposed this resolution. The Senate passed this resolution on May 30, 2023 by a vote of 26-8.





HB 5004 Enhancing Vote Fraud by Implementing Early Voting.

This bill authorizes people to engage in early voting prior to an election. CPAC opposes the creation of an election season in place of an election day, opposes measures that reduce ballot security, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 31, 2023 by a vote of 27-7 and the bill later became law.

HB 5917 Increasing Taxation by Citation by Allowing for the Adoption of More Automated Traffic Enforcement Systems.

This bill authorizes municipalities to place red light and speeding cameras at certain traffic stops. CPAC opposes automated traffic enforcement systems and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on June 7, 2023 by a vote of 27-9 and the bill later became law.

HB 6638 Providing for More Frivolous Lawsuits Against Employers.

This bill prohibits certain entities from discriminating against people based on their age and strengthens protections against discrimination based on sexual orientation in Connecticut's antidiscrimination laws. CPAC opposes the expansion of these so-called "antidiscrimination" laws, the likes of which are often abused by greedy plaintiff lawyers, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on June 7, 2023 by a vote of 32-4 and the bill later became law.

HB 6667 Enacting Much of the Left's Unconstitutional Gun Control Agenda.

This bill stuffs a variety of gun control measures into a single bill. It prohibits the intentional open carry and display of firearms, limits the number of firearms that can be sold to certain people, and bans a laundry list of firearms. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on June 3, 2023 by a vote of 24-11 and the bill later became law.

HB 6354 Establishing a New Green Job Corps Program.

This bill establishes a green job corps program, the likes of which will use public funding to develop certificate programs oriented toward promoting the green economy. The bill will also provide grants to students to help them receive these certificates. The provisions of the bill also make a special effort to ensure that individuals from "underrepresented" populations will be recruited into the program. CPAC opposes the government's efforts to promote certain industries over others and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on June 5, 2023 by a vote of 34-1 and the bill later became law.





HB 6689 Forcing Taxpayers to Pay Off Other People's College Loans.

This bill establishes a Nursing and Mental Health Care Professionals Loan Subsidies Program, the likes of which will provide funds to practicing medical professionals to help them cover the costs of their student loans. CPAC believes that taxpayers should not be forced to pay off other people's college debts and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on June 5, 2023 by a vote of 34-1 and the bill later became law.

HB 6820 Further Transforming Connecticut into a Sanctuary State for Abortionists.

This bill prohibits Connecticut's licensing boards and other medical institutions from refraining from licensing a physician because the physician performed an abortion. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, opposes its protection, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on June 6, 2023 by a vote of 35-1 and the bill later became law.

HB 6892 Infringing on Property Rights by Empowering the Government to Take More Land into Receivership.

This bill increases the number of municipalities that can take certain properties into receiverships by decreasing the population that a municipality must have in order to be granted this power. It also allows municipalities to take commercial properties into receivership. CPAC opposes infringements on property rights and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on June 1, 2023 by a vote of 24-12 and the bill later became law.

SB 977 Forcing Taxpayers to Fund Other People's Weight Loss Plans.

This bill requires the Commissioner of Social Services to provide medical assistance to people for their bariatric surgeries and related medical services. CPAC believes that taxpayers should not be forced to pay for other people's weight loss medical procedures and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on June 5, 2023 by a vote of 98-44 and the bill later became law.

SB 988 Foisting Purchasing Mandates Down Onto Mobile Home Park Owners.

This bill requires mobile home park owners to, when trying to sell their mobile home park, offer to sell the property to the park's tenants at the price being offered for it by other buyers. CPAC opposes measures that inappropriately infringe on one's capacity to form contracts with whomever they wish and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on June 6, 2023 by a vote of 112-37 and the bill later became law.

SB 1035 Increasing the Force of Prevailing Wage Laws.

This bill requires the Commissioner of Social Services to provide medical assistance to people such that they may receive bariatric surgeries and related medical services. CPAC opposes artificial wage increases, opposes making such increases even more onerous for employers, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on June 6, 2023 by a vote of 98-50 and the bill later became law.

SB 1108 Getting Connecticut's Universities into the Contraceptives Business.

This bill requires public institutions of higher education to develop plans to provide students that live on campus with access to abortion services. CPAC believes that public universities should focus on educating students, not subsidizing their sex, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on June 1, 2023 by a vote of 114-34 and the bill later became law.

SB 1123 Expanding the Prevailing Wage Mandate to More Construction Projects.

This bill raises the fine an employer may incur for failing to pay the prevailing wage rate to their workers. It also allows for stop work orders to be issued for failures to pay the prevailing wage rate. CPAC opposes artificial wage increases, opposes making such increases even more onerous for employers, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on June 7, 2023 by a vote of 133-17 and the bill later became law.





SB 1147 Worsening Onerous Environmental Justice Laws.

This bill strengthens requirements that force certain facilities applying for environmental permits in "environmental justice communities" to consider the cumulative health and environmental consequences that may be attendant to the construction of the facility. It also allows state agencies to deny permits based on these factors and expands public notice requirements for facility constructions. CPAC recognizes that these provisions will be incredibly onerous for businesses and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on June 7, 2023 by a vote of 109-41 and the bill later became law.

HJ 1 Reducing Election Security by Massively Expanding Absentee Ballot Voting.

This resolution proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow for no-excuse absentee ballot voting. This means that any elector in the state of Connecticut would be able to receive an absentee ballot without exception. CPAC opposes measures that reduce election security and opposed this resolution. The House passed this resolution on May 10, 2023 by a vote of 113-38.

HB 5004 Enhancing Vote Fraud by Implementing Early Voting.

This bill authorizes people to engage in early voting prior to an election. CPAC opposes the creation of an election season in place of an election day, opposes measures that reduce ballot security, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on May 4, 2023 by a vote of 107-35 and the bill later became law.

HB 5917 Increasing Taxation by Citation by Allowing for the Adoption of More Automated Traffic Enforcement Systems.

This bill authorizes municipalities to place red light and speeding cameras at certain traffic stops. CPAC opposes automated traffic enforcement systems, opposes expanding existing automated enforcement systems, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on May 23, 2023 by a vote of 104-46 and the bill later became law.

HB 6354 Establishing a New Green Job Corps Program.

This bill establishes a green job corps program, the likes of which will use public funding to develop certificate programs oriented toward promoting the green economy. The bill will also provide grants to students to help them receive these certificates. The provisions of the bill also make a special effort to ensure that individuals from "underrepresented" populations will be recruited into the program. CPAC opposes the government's efforts to promote certain industries over others and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 27, 2023 by a vote of 139-5 and the bill later became law.





HB 6397 Declaring a Climate "Emergency" and Channeling Funds toward the Left's Favorite Climate-related Initiatives.

This bill declares that there exists a "climate emergency" and directs the Commissioner of Energy and Environmental Protection to produce a comprehensive Connecticut Decarbonization Roadmap. It also directs the state to obtain federal funding for various renewable energy projects. CPAC supports all forms of energy, believes that the government should not support one form of energy over another, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on June 2, 2023 by a vote of 95–53 but the bill never became law.

HB 6638 Providing for More Frivolous Lawsuits Against Employers.

This bill prohibits certain entities from discriminating against people based on their age and strengthens protections against discrimination based on sexual orientation in Connecticut's antidiscrimination laws. CPAC opposes the expansion of these so-called "antidiscrimination" laws, the likes of which are often abused by greedy plaintiff lawyers, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on May 23, 2023 by a vote of 132-17 and the bill later became law.

HB 6667 Enacting Much of the Left's Unconstitutional Gun Control Agenda.

This bill stuffs a variety of gun control measures into a single bill. It prohibits the intentional open carry and display of firearms, limits the number of firearms that can be sold to certain people, and bans a laundry list of firearms. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on May 25, 2023 by a vote of 96-51 and the bill later became law.

HB 6689 Forcing Taxpayers to Pay Off Other People's College Loans.

This bill establishes a Nursing and Mental Health Care Professionals Loan Subsidies Program, the likes of which will provide funds to practicing medical professionals to help them cover the costs of their student loans. CPAC believes that taxpayers should not be forced to pay off other people's college debts and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on May 3, 2023 by a vote of 121-23 and the bill later became law.

HB 6820 Further Transforming Connecticut into a Sanctuary State for Abortionists.

This bill prohibits Connecticut's licensing boards and other medical institutions from refraining from licensing a physician because the physician performed an abortion. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, opposes its protection, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on May 18, 2023 by a vote of 128-19 and the bill later became law.





HB 6854 Funneling Money into Failing Grocery Stores.

This bill apportions tax credits to grocery stores such that they may be incentivized to locate themselves in so-called "food deserts." CPAC believes that it is not the government's job to determine where grocery stores should be located and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on May 30, 2023 by a vote of 136-14 but the bill never became law.

HB 6866 Gratifying Transgender Ideology within the Government.

This bill requires all state agencies to place a "nonbinary" option on forms that ask for a person's gender. CPAC opposes the gratification of transgender ideology and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on May 17, 2023 by a vote of 124-26 but the bill never became law.

HB 6892 Infringing on Property Rights by Empowering the Government to Take More Land into Receivership.

This bill increases the number of municipalities that can take certain properties into receiverships by decreasing the population that a municipality must have in order to be granted this power. It also allows municipalities to take commercial properties into receivership. CPAC opposes infringements on property rights and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on May 16, 2023 by a vote of 108-43 and the bill later became law.
