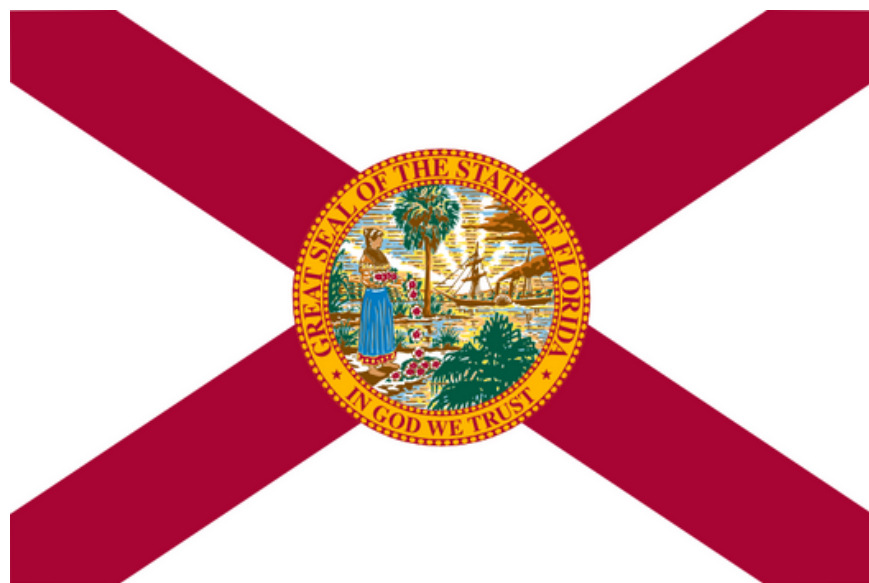

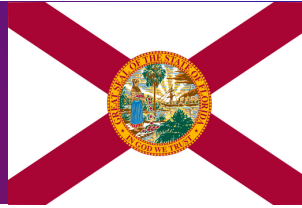

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the CPAC Foundation, is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area.

In 1971, ACUF launched its Ratings of Congress to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress. The Ratings quickly became considered the “gold standard” and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles.

In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, Ratings of the States grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers. Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America’s federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31.

Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected.

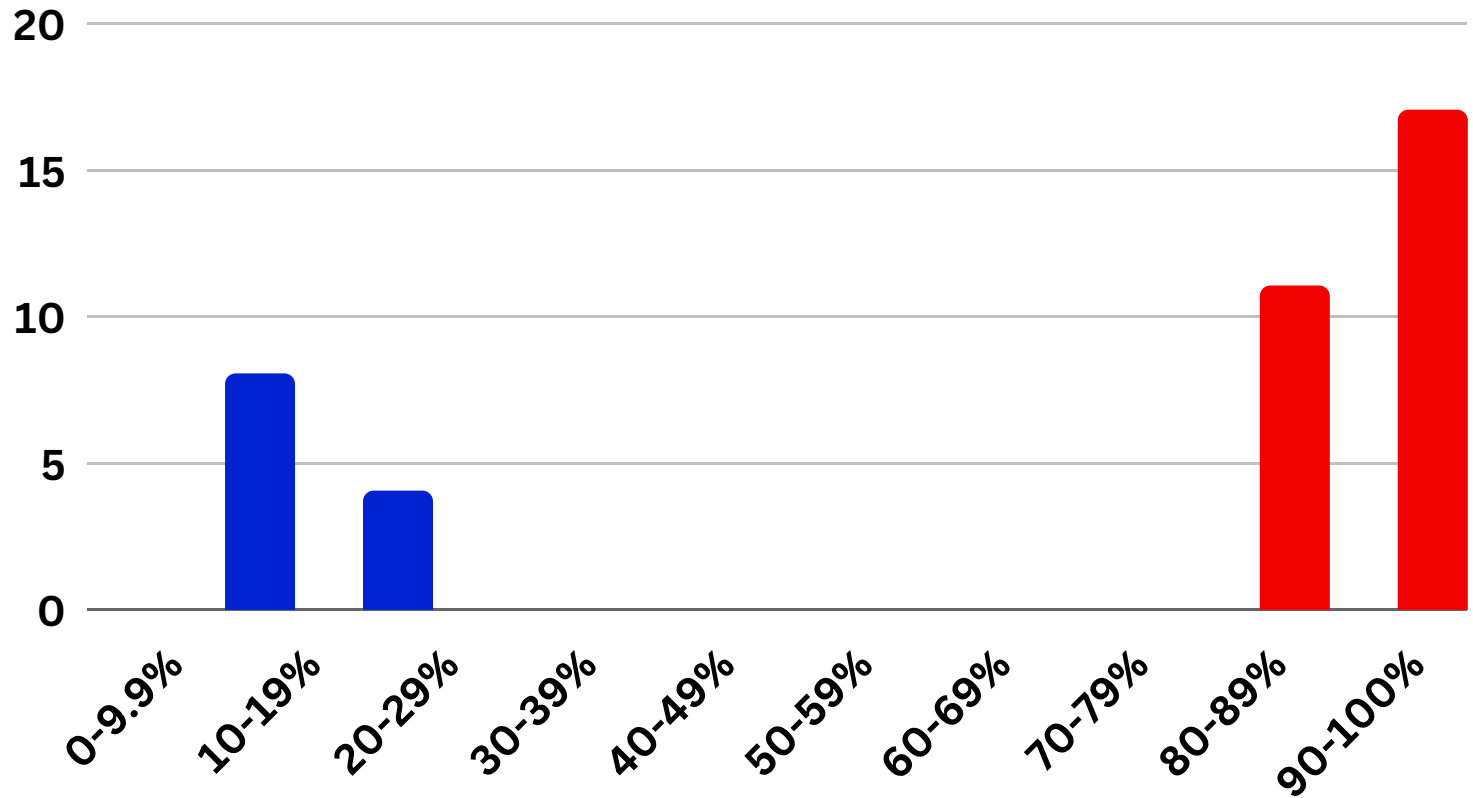

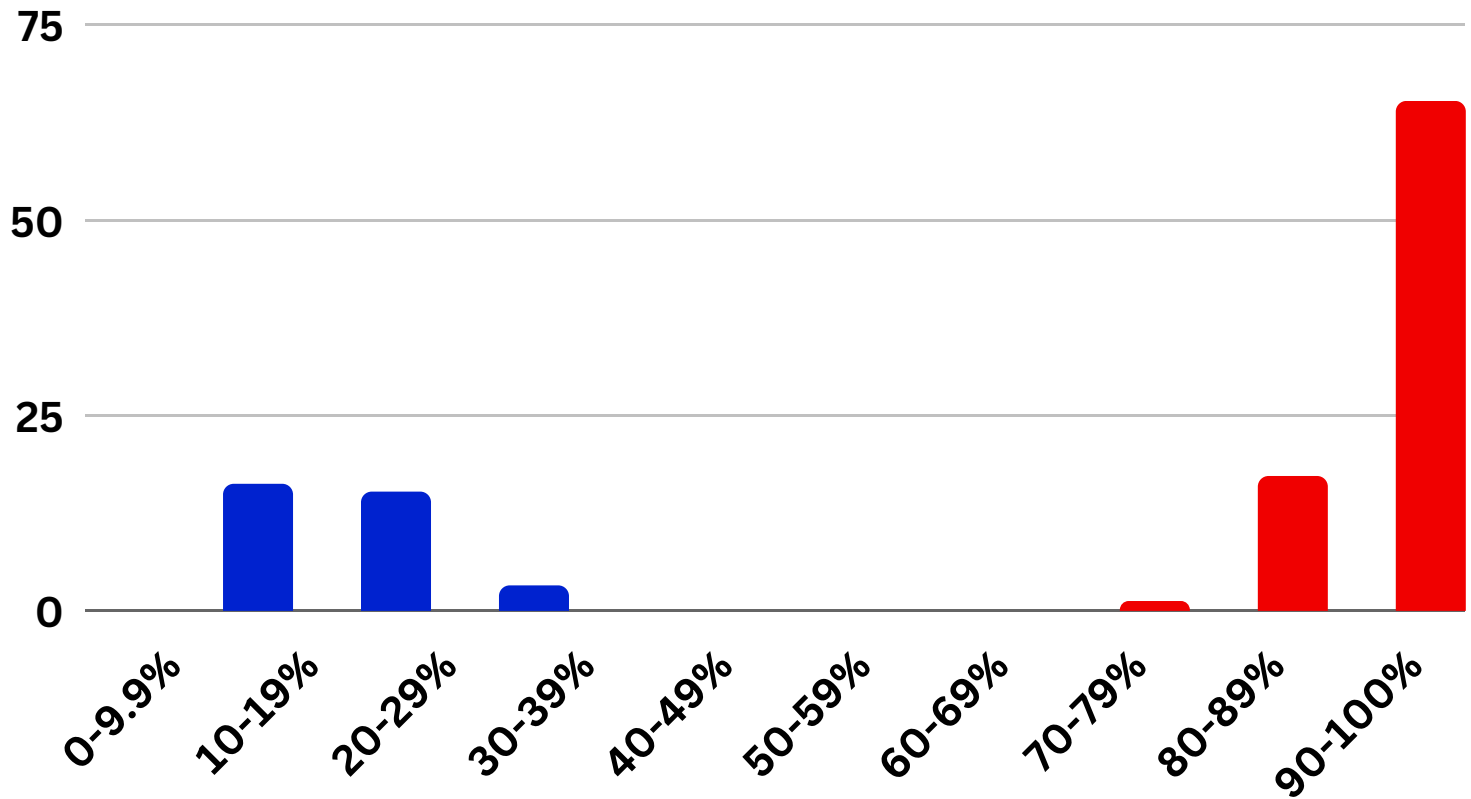

S 4 (SS) Protecting the Integrity of Florida's Elections.

This bill authorizes the Office of Statewide Prosecutions to investigate and prosecute crimes related to voting. CPAC supports efforts to promote election integrity and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 8, 2023 by a vote of 27-12 and the bill later became law.

S 6 (SS) Fighting the Immigration Crisis in Florida.

This bill creates the Unauthorized Alien Transport Program, the likes of which will help move Florida's illegal immigrants to sanctuary cities and states. In practice, this effort has led to the movement of illegal immigrants to areas that vote in favor of policies that allow illegal immigrants to easily enter the United States. CPAC supported this bill because of the boons that it proffered to both liberals and conservatives. For the conservative-leaning states along the border, it helped alleviate the illegal immigration crisis plaguing towns and cities. It additionally gave liberal-leaning states the privilege of experiencing the effects of the deleterious policies that they voted for. The Senate passed this bill on February 8, 2023 by a vote of 27-12 and the bill later became law.

S 102 Spending \$711,000,000 on Housing Incentives.

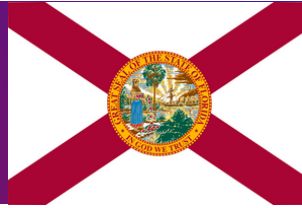
This bill apportions \$711,000,000 to various affordable housing programs. For example, it apportions \$100,000,000 to Florida's Hometown Hero Housing Assistance Program for the purpose of aiding first-time homebuyers in making their down payments. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to help pay for other people's housing, opposes government involvement in the housing market, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 8, 2023 by a vote of 40-0 and the bill later became law.

S 254 Protecting Minors from Radical Gender Surgeries.

This bill prohibits public entities from using taxpayer funds to help minors procure radical gender surgeries and hormone therapy drugs. The bill also allows the government to suspend the license of healthcare practitioners who perform radical gender surgeries on minors. CPAC opposes the mutilation and castration of minors and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 4, 2023 by a vote of 26-13 and the bill later became law. Sen. Trumbull later voted Yea after the initial roll call vote.

S 256 Taking on the Corrupt Bargain Between Unions and the State Through Paycheck Protection.

This bill ends the process whereby the government collected dues on behalf of unions. It also contains provisions requiring public employees to sign a membership authorization form before joining a union. CPAC supports efforts to better inform workers about the nature of being part of a union, supports diminishing the corrupt bargain between unions and the state, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 29, 2023 by a vote of 23-17 and the bill later became law.



S 258 No TikTok on Government Devices in Florida.

This bill prohibits government employees from installing or using TikTok on any of government devices within the state of Florida. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 11, 2023 by a vote of 38-0 and the bill later became law. Sen. Collins voted Yea after the initial roll call vote.

S 264 Fewer Contracts and No Agricultural Land for Foreign Countries of Concern.

This bill prohibits the government from giving out public contracts to China, Russia, Iran, North Korea, Cuba, Venezuela, and Syria when doing so would allow any of these governments to access a person's private information. The bill also prohibits the government from offering economic incentives to the governments of these countries. Additionally, it prohibits these governments from purchasing a controlling interest in any plot of Florida's agricultural land. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 4, 2023 by a vote of 31-8 and the bill later became law.

S 300 Strengthening Florida's Laws Protecting Life.

This bill prohibits women from getting abortions after their unborn baby has reached 6 weeks of age. The bill also prohibits governmental entities and educational institutions from using state funds in order to help women obtain an abortion. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 3, 2023 by a vote of 26-13 and the bill later became law.

S 376 Reforming the Justice System and Creating Productive Citizens.

This bill requires local courts to remove certain arrest records that arise from non-forcible, non-registerable-sex offense arrests that did not receive a conviction. CPAC's Nolan Center for Justice is a national leader in criminal justice reform and works to cut crime, reduce taxpayer costs, protect victims, define the proper scope of government, and safely reduce incarceration rates. CPAC supports efforts to prevent non-conviction arrests from restricting a person's access to gainful employment and secure housing and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 28, 2023 by a vote of 39-0 and the bill later became law.

S 1382 Stopping the Radical Left's Attempts to Erode the Effectiveness of the Military.

This bill urges the federal government to use a merit-based system in the recruiting and promotion efforts of the US military and to throw out the "woke" social programming that has infiltrated the armed forces. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests, opposes the Left's weakening of the military, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 11, 2023 by a vote of 34-5 and the bill later became law.



S 1478 Fighting Against Unjust Incarcerations.

This bill improves laws dealing with technical violations of probation and requires probation officers to proceed with alternative sanctioning programs when offenders are eligible for them unless otherwise directed by the court. CPAC's Nolan Center for Justice is a national leader in criminal justice reform and works to cut crime, reduce taxpayer costs, protect victims, define the proper scope of government, and safely reduce incarceration rates. CPAC supports measures that keep people who pose no risk to others out of jail and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 3, 2023 by a vote of 40-0 but the bill was vetoed by the Governor.

S 1580 Instituting Conscience Protections for Florida's Healthcare Practitioners.

This bill declares that healthcare practitioners have the right to opt out of certain healthcare services if they have conscience-based objections to the procedure. CPAC supports the creation of conscience protections for healthcare practitioners and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 28, 2023 by a vote of 28-11 and the bill later became law.

S 1718 Reinforcing Federal Immigration Laws in Florida.

This bill establishes a number of provisions that disincentivize illegal immigration in the state of Florida. For example, the bill prohibits counties from issuing funds to entities such that they may issue documents of identification to illegal immigrants. It also requires that the state refuse to recognize driver's licenses obtained by illegal immigrants in other states. CPAC supports efforts to disincentivize illegal immigration, supports the enforcement of federal immigration law, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 28, 2023 by a vote of 27-10 and the bill later became law.

S 7050 Improving Election Security Through Numerous Channels.

This bill establishes numerous provisions designed to protect election security. For example, the bill makes it illegal for noncitizens to collect or handle voter registration applications. It also requires the Secretary of State to provide mandatory formal signature-matching training to certain people. CPAC supports efforts to protect election integrity and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 26, 2023 by a vote of 28-12 and the bill later became law.

H 1 Expanding Florida's School Choice Programs.

This bill dramatically expands Florida's school choice initiatives by offering education vouchers to every family in Florida regardless of where they live and what their income is. CPAC supports this tremendous effort to promote school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 23, 2023 by a vote of 26-12 and the bill later became law. Sen. Avila and Sen. Garcia later voted Yea after the initial roll call vote.



H 9 (SS) Disney Receives Its Just Desserts.

This bill renames the Walt Disney Company's Reedy Creek District to the Central Florida Tourism Oversight District and makes it such that five of the board members overseeing the district will now be selected by the governor instead of by Disney. CPAC supports efforts to restore ordinary market conditions to this area of the state and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 10, 2023 by a vote of 26-9 and the bill later became law.

H 121 Further Expanding "Medikids" Medicare.

This bill makes it such that kids above the age of 1 and below the age of 5 in families living below 300% of the federal poverty line may enroll in Florida's Kidcare program, an expansion from the original 200% limit. This means that kids living in families making up to nearly \$80,000 per year may now enroll in the program. CPAC opposes the expansion of this type of government program and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 4, 2023 by a vote of 38-0 and the bill later became law. Sen. Trumbull later voted Yea after the initial roll call vote.

H 543 Establishing Constitutional Carry in Florida.

This bill allows individuals to carry certain firearms without a license as long as they also carry a valid form of identification that can be presented to government authorities. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment, supports constitutional carry laws, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 30, 2023 by a vote of 27-13 and the bill later became law.

H 837 Protecting Businesses and Homeowners through Sensible Tort Reform.

This bill reduces the statute of limitations on lawsuits associated with negligence and adopts a modified comparative negligence standard that prevents plaintiffs from recovering damages if they are found to be at least 51% at fault. CPAC recognizes that these measures will reduce frivolous and unjust litigation efforts, supports this consequence, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 23, 2023 by a vote of 23-15 and the bill later became law. Sen. Avila and Sen. Garia later voted Yea after the initial roll call vote.

H 1069 Preventing Students from Being Forced to Accept Transgender Ideology.

This bill prohibits public schools from forcing employees and students to use another person's pronouns. It also prohibits schools from teaching students in grades K-8 about gender identity and human sexuality. CPAC supports efforts to diminish the influence of radical gender ideology in public schools and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 3, 2023 by a vote of 27-12 and the bill later became law. Sen. Brodeur later voted Yea after the initial roll call vote.

H 1281 Diminishing the Potential for a Democrat-Backed Gas Stove Ban.

This bill prohibits localities from enacting or enforcing regulations that restrict the use of household appliances. CPAC supports efforts to prevent the possibility of a gas stove ban and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 28, 2023 by a vote of 33-4 and the bill later became law. Sen. Davis later voted Nay after the initial roll call vote.

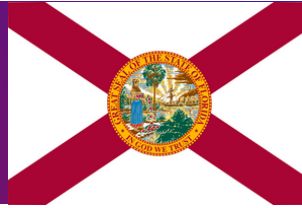

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S 4 (SS) Protecting the Integrity of Florida's Elections.

This bill authorizes the Office of Statewide Prosecutions to investigate and prosecute crimes related to voting. CPAC supports efforts to shore up election integrity and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 10, 2023 by a vote of 77-33 and the bill later became law.

S 6 (SS) Fighting the Immigration Crisis in Florida.

This bill creates the Unauthorized Alien Transport Program, the likes of which will help move Florida's illegal immigrants to sanctuary cities and states. In practice, this effort has led to the movement of illegal immigrants to areas that vote in favor of policies that allow illegal immigrants to easily enter the United States. CPAC supported this bill because of the boons that it proffered to both liberals and conservatives. For the conservative-leaning states along the border, it helped alleviate the illegal immigration crisis plaguing towns and cities. It additionally gave liberal-leaning states the privilege of experiencing the effects of the deleterious policies that they voted for. The House passed this bill on February 10, 2023 by a vote of 77-34 and the bill later became law.

S 102 Spending \$711,000,000 on Housing Incentives.

This bill apportions \$711,000,000 to various affordable housing programs. For example, it apportions \$100,000,000 to Florida's Hometown Hero Housing Assistance Program for the purpose of aiding first-time homebuyers in making their down payments. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to help pay for other people's housing, opposes government involvement in the housing market, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on March 24, 2023 by a vote of 103-6 and the bill later became law.

S 254 Protecting Minors from Radical Gender Surgeries.

This bill prohibits public entities from using taxpayer funds to help minors procure radical gender surgeries and hormone therapy drugs. The bill also allows the government to suspend the license of healthcare practitioners who perform radical gender surgeries on minors. CPAC opposes the mutilation and castration of minors and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on May 4, 2023 by a vote of 83-28 and the bill later became law.

S 256 Taking on the Corrupt Bargain Between Unions and the State Through Paycheck Protection.

This bill ends the process whereby the government collected dues on behalf of unions. It also contains provisions requiring public employees to sign a membership authorization form before joining a union. CPAC supports efforts to better inform workers about the nature of being part of a union, supports diminishing the corrupt bargain between unions and the state, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on April 26, 2023 by a vote of 72-44 and the bill later became law.



S 264 Fewer Contracts and No Agricultural Land for Foreign Countries of Concern.

This bill prohibits the government from giving out public contracts to China, Russia, Iran, North Korea, Cuba, Venezuela, and Syria when doing so would allow any of these governments to access a person's private information. The bill also prohibits the government from offering economic incentives to the governments of these countries. Additionally, it prohibits these governments from purchasing a controlling interest in any plot of Florida's agricultural land. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on May 4, 2023 by a vote of 95-17 and the bill later became law.

S 300 Strengthening Florida's Laws Protecting Life.

This bill prohibits women from getting abortions after their unborn baby has reached 6 weeks of age. The bill also prohibits governmental entities and educational institutions from using state funds in order to help women obtain an abortion. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on April 13, 2023 by a vote of 70-40 and the bill later became law.

S 376 Reforming the Justice System to Help Create More Productive Citizens.

This bill requires local courts to remove certain arrest records that arise from non-forcible, non-registerable-sex offense arrests that did not receive a conviction. CPAC's Nolan Center for Justice is a national leader in criminal justice reform and works to cut crime, reduce taxpayer costs, protect victims, define the proper scope of government, and safely reduce incarceration rates. CPAC supports efforts to prevent non-conviction arrests from restricting a person's access to gainful employment and secure housing and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on May 3, 2023 by a vote of 115-1 and the bill later became law.

S 1382 Stopping the Radical Left's Attempts to Erode the Effectiveness of the Military.

This bill urges the federal government to use a merit-based system in the recruiting and promotion efforts of the US military and to throw out the "woke" social programming that has infiltrated the armed forces. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests, opposes the Left's weakening of the military, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 1, 2023 by a vote of 84-24 and the bill later became law.

S 1478 Fighting Against Unjust Incarcerations.

This bill improves laws dealing with technical violations of probation and requires probation officers to proceed with alternative sanctioning programs when offenders are eligible for them unless otherwise directed by the court. CPAC's Nolan Center for Justice is a national leader in criminal justice reform and works to cut crime, reduce taxpayer costs, protect victims, define the proper scope of government, and safely reduce incarceration rates. CPAC supports measures that keep people who pose no risk to others out of jail and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on May 3, 2023 by a vote of 116-0 but the bill was vetoed by the Governor.



S 1580 Instituting Conscience Protections for Florida's Healthcare Practitioners.

This bill declares that healthcare practitioners have the right to opt out of certain healthcare services if they have conscience-based objections to the procedure. CPAC supports the creation of conscience protections for healthcare practitioners and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on May 2, 2023 by a vote of 84-34 and the bill later became law.

S 1718 Reinforcing Federal Immigration Laws in Florida.

This bill establishes a number of provisions that disincentivize illegal immigration in the state of Florida. For example, the bill prohibits counties from issuing funds to entities such that they may issue documents of identification to illegal immigrants. It also requires that the state refuse to recognize driver's licenses obtained by illegal immigrants in other states. CPAC supports efforts to disincentivize illegal immigration, supports the enforcement of federal immigration law, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on May 2, 2023 by a vote of 83-36 and the bill later became law.

S 7050 Improving Election Security Through Numerous Channels.

This bill establishes numerous provisions designed to protect election security. For example, the bill makes it illegal for noncitizens to collect or handle voter registration applications. It also requires the Secretary of State to provide mandatory formal signature-matching training to certain people. CPAC supports efforts to protect election integrity and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on April 28, 2023 by a vote of 76-34 and the bill later became law.

HB 1 Expanding Florida's School Choice Programs.

This bill dramatically expands Florida's school choice initiatives by offering education vouchers to every family in Florida regardless of where they live and what their income is. CPAC supports this tremendous effort to promote school choice and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 17, 2023 by a vote of 83-27 and the bill later became law.

H 3 Protecting State Investments from ESG-Based Decision-Making.

This bill prohibits the state from investing its funds to promote ESG standards. CPAC supports efforts to diminish government investment in and support of Leftist social causes and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 24, 2023 by a vote of 80-31 and the bill later became law.

H 9 (SS) Disney Receives Its Just Desserts.

This bill renames the Walt Disney Company's Reedy Creek District to the Central Florida Tourism Oversight District and makes it such that five of the board members overseeing the district will now be selected by the governor instead of by Disney. CPAC supports efforts to restore ordinary market conditions to this area of the state and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 9, 2023 by a vote of 82-31 and the bill later became law.



H 121 Further Expanding “Medikids” Medicare.

This bill makes it such that kids above the age of 1 and below the age of 5 in families living below 300% of the federal poverty line may enroll in Florida’s Kidcare program, an expansion from the original 200% limit. This means that kids living in families making up to nearly \$80,000 per year may now enroll in the program. CPAC opposes the expansion of this type of government program and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 13, 2023 by a vote of 105-0 and the bill later became law.

H 543 Establishing Constitutional Carry in Florida.

This bill allows individuals to carry certain firearms without a license as long as they also carry a valid form of identification that can be presented to government authorities. CPAC supports the founders’ belief in the Second Amendment, supports constitutional carry laws, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 24, 2023 by a vote of 76-32 and the bill later became law.

H 837 Protecting Businesses and Homeowners through Sensible Tort Reform.

This bill reduces the statute of limitations on lawsuits associated with negligence and adopts a modified comparative negligence standard that prevents plaintiffs from recovering damages if they are found to be at least 51% at fault. CPAC recognizes that these measures will reduce frivolous and unjust litigation efforts, supports this consequence, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 17, 2023 by a vote of 80-31 and the bill later became law.

H 1069 Preventing Students from Being Forced to Accept Transgender Ideology.

This bill prohibits public schools from forcing employees and students to use another person’s pronouns. It also prohibits schools from teaching students in grades K-8 about gender identity and human sexuality. CPAC supports efforts to diminish the influence of radical gender ideology in public schools and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 31, 2023 by a vote of 77-35 and the bill later became law.

H 1281 Diminishing the Potential for a Democrat-Backed Gas Stove Ban.

This bill prohibits localities from enacting or enforcing regulations that restrict the use of household appliances. CPAC supports efforts to prevent the possibility of a gas stove ban and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on April 26, 2023 by a vote of 98-16 and the bill later became law.
