The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the CPAC Foundation, is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area.

In 1971, ACUF launched its Ratings of Congress to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress. The Ratings quickly became considered the “gold standard” and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles.

In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, Ratings of the States grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers. Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America’s federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31.

Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected.

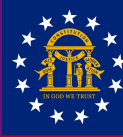

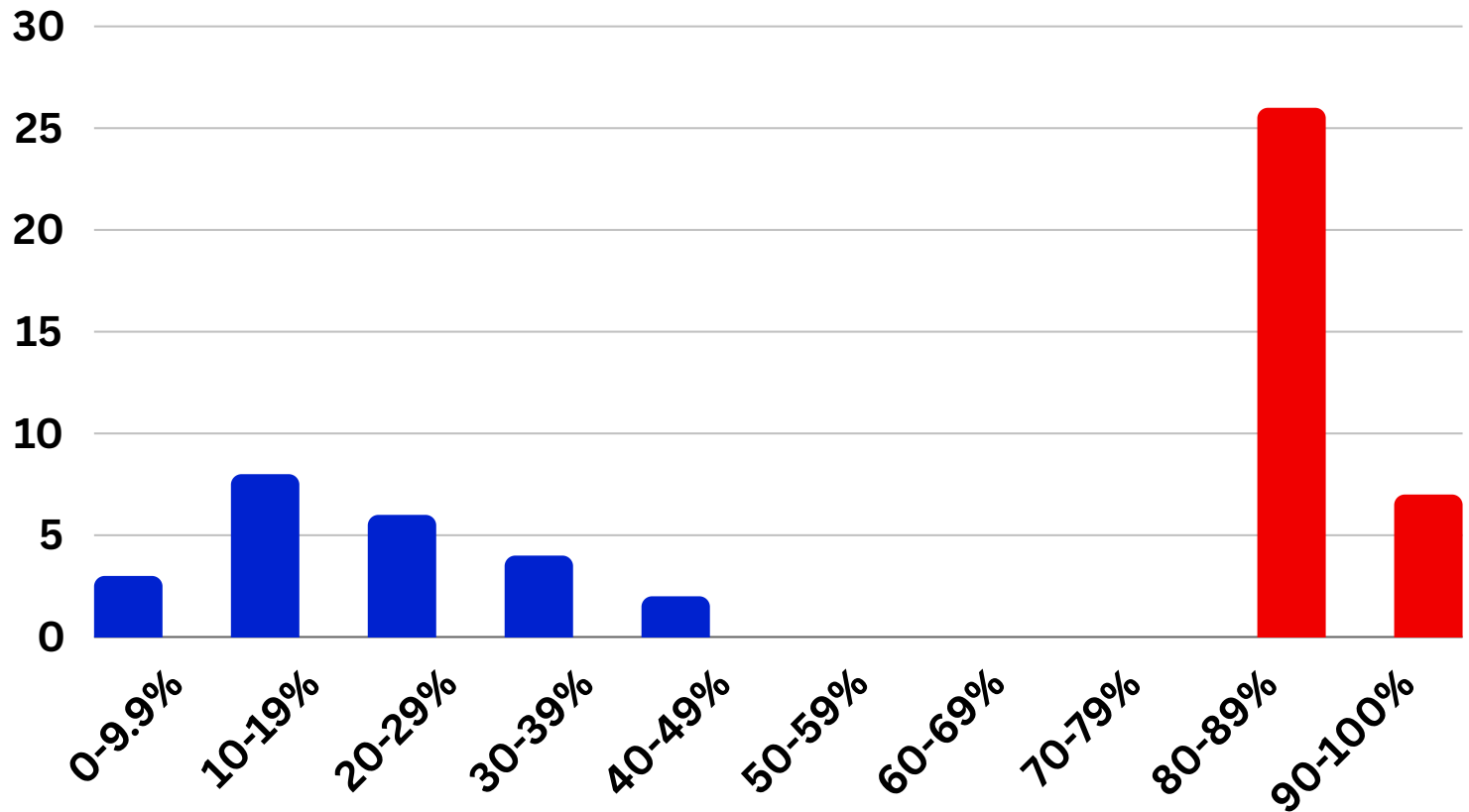

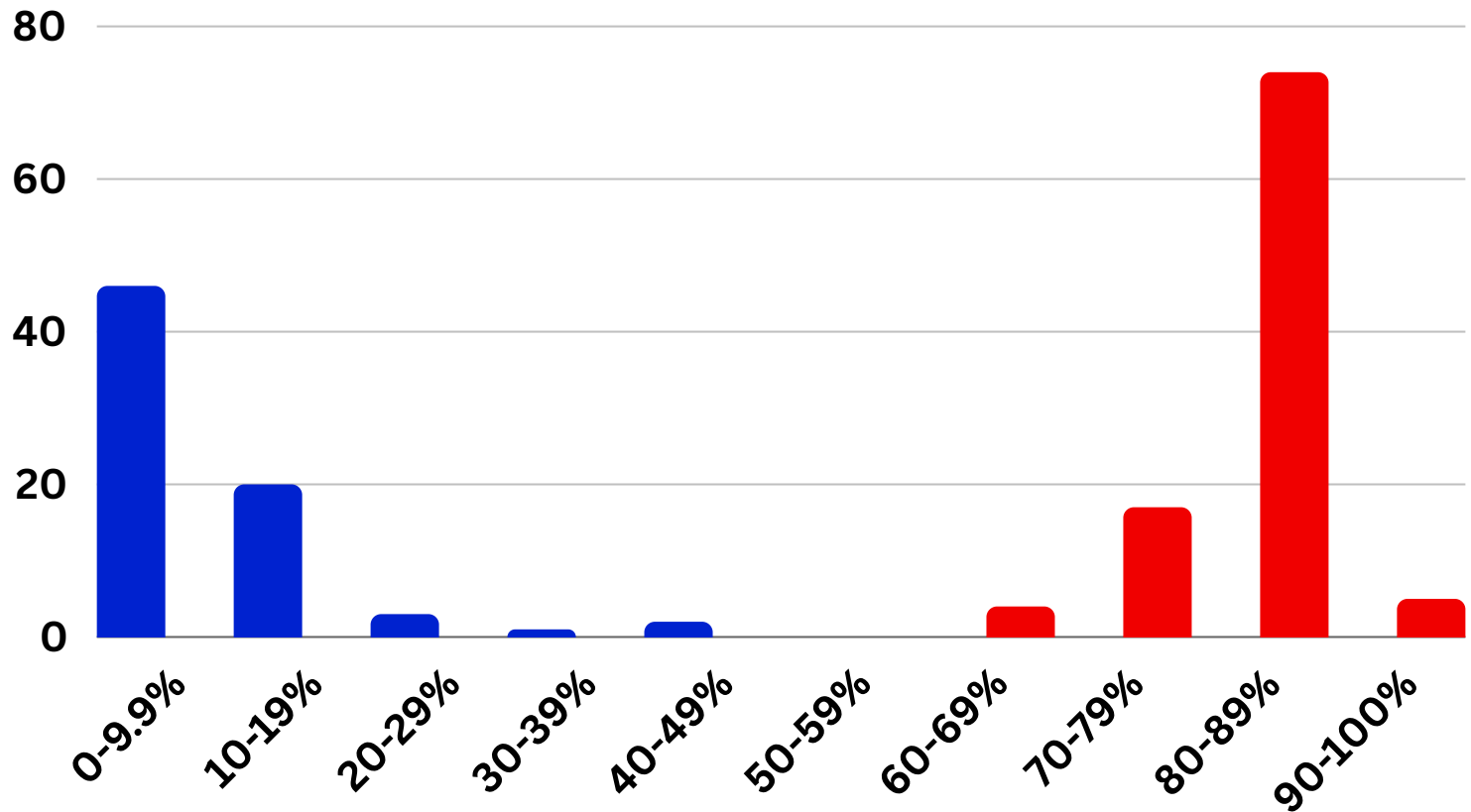

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SB 1 Protecting the Freedom to Choose Not to Get Vaccinated.

This bill removes the sunset date on a prohibition that prevented the government from discriminating against people based on their vaccination status. CPAC supports efforts to make the decision to get a vaccine as voluntary as possible and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 7, 2023 by a vote of 31-21 and the bill later became law.

SB 62 Preventing the Private Monopolization of Public Property.

This bill prohibits counties and municipal corporations from adopting regulations that prevent the enforcement of orders or ordinances prohibiting individuals from camping on sidewalks. It also prohibits local governments from moving homeless individuals to the jurisdictions of other local governments. CPAC opposes the private monopolization of public spaces and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 27, 2023 by a vote of 36-20 and the bill later became law.

SB 92 Ensuring that Prosecutors Hold Individuals Accountable.

This bill creates the Prosecuting Attorneys Qualifications Commission, the likes of which will have the power to discipline and remove district attorneys who are willfully and persistently failing to carry out their duties. CPAC supports efforts to ensure the safety and well-being of the public, opposes the refusal of Soros-funded DAs to prosecute certain crimes, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 27, 2023 by a vote of 32-24 and the bill later became law.

SB 93 No TikTok on Georgia's Government Devices.

This bill prohibits state employees from installing social media platforms that are controlled by foreign governments on government devices. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 27, 2023 by a vote of 52-0 and the bill later became law.

SB 99 Taking Steps Toward Certificate of Need Reform.

This bill exempts qualifying acute care hospitals located in rural areas from certificate of need requirements. While CPAC would prefer to see a greater abolition of certificate of need requirements, it still supports reform within this system and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 27, 2023 by a vote of 42-13 but the bill did not progress in the House.



SB 132 No Land for Foreign Adversaries in Georgia.

This bill prohibits the governments of nations designated as foreign adversaries by the US from acquiring controlling interests in Georgian land. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 2, 2023 by a vote of 35-20 but the bill did not progress in the House.

SB 140 No Radical Gender Surgeries for Minors in Georgia.

This bill prohibits healthcare practitioners from performing sex reassignment surgeries on or providing hormone replacement therapy to minors. CPAC opposes the mutilation of minors and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 21, 2023 by a vote of 31-21 and the bill later became law.

SB 145 Fighting the Left's War on Leafblowers.

This bill prohibits municipalities from adopting regulations that apply standards to gas-powered leaf blowers that are significantly different from standards applied to similar gas-powered equipment. CPAC supports efforts to reduce excessive government regulation and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 27, 2023 by a vote of 37-16 and the bill later became law.

SB 160 Providing a Small Amount of Relief to Employers.

This bill diminishes the contribution rates of tenured employers to the unemployment system until 2026. CPAC supports efforts to provide appropriate relief to employers and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 6, 2023 by a vote of 34-21 and the bill later became law.

SB 222 Banning Zuckerbucks in Georgia.

This bill requires that election authorities conduct elections, primaries, and runoffs using only lawfully appropriated public funds. CPAC supports efforts to promote election integrity, opposes the use of private funds to pay for elections, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 29, 2023 by a vote of 32-21 and the bill later became law.



SB 233 Promoting School Choice in Georgia.

This bill sets up the Georgia Promise Scholarship Act, the likes of which will provide funds to parents such that they may select the educational option for their children best suited to their needs. CPAC supports efforts to promote school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 6, 2023 by a vote of 33-23 but the bill was defeated in the House.

SB 246 Forcing Taxpayers to Pay Off Other People's Student Loans.

The early version of this bill sets up a program for which qualified nurses can apply in order to receive up to \$100,000 over 5 years to pay off their student loan debts. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should have to pay off other people's student loans and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 30, 2023 by a vote of 53-1 and the bill later became law.

SB 266 Protecting Georgia's Retirement Funds from ESG-Obsessed Companies.

This bill requires fiduciaries of retirement system funds to solely invest such funds based on pecuniary factors. It prohibits these fiduciaries from investing funds based on nonpecuniary factors, including those associated with ESG ratings. CPAC supports efforts to diminish the influence of ESG scoring systems and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 6, 2023 by a vote of 54-0 but the bill never became law.

HB 408 Special Tax Exemption for Hyundai.

This bill extends the sunset date on provisions that gave tax exemptions on sales of tangible personal property to "competitive [projects] of regional significance" from 2023 to 2026. CPAC opposes government favoritism toward particular economic development projects and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 29, 2023 by a vote of 43-6 and the bill later became law (quite literally in the Hyundai Metaplant in Bryan County).

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SB 1 Protecting the Freedom to Choose Not to Get Vaccinated.

This bill removes the sunset date on a prohibition that prevented the government from discriminating against people based on their vaccination status. CPAC supports efforts to make the decision to get a vaccine as voluntary as possible and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 23, 2023 by a vote of 99-69 and the bill later became law.

SB 62 Preventing the Private Monopolization of Public Property.

This bill prohibits counties and municipal corporations from adopting regulations that prevent the enforcement of orders or ordinances prohibiting individuals from camping on sidewalks. It also prohibits local governments from moving homeless individuals to the jurisdictions of other local governments. CPAC opposes the private monopolization of public spaces and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 27, 2023 by a vote of 99-76 and the bill later became law.

SB 92 Ensuring that Prosecutors Hold Individuals Accountable.

This bill creates the Prosecuting Attorneys Qualifications Commission, the likes of which will have the power to discipline and remove district attorneys who are willfully and persistently failing to carry out their duties. CPAC supports efforts to ensure the safety and well-being of the public, opposes the refusal of Soros-funded DAs to prosecute certain crimes, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 27, 2023 by a vote of 97-77 and the bill later became law.

SB 93 No TikTok on Georgia's Government Devices.

This bill prohibits state employees from installing social media platforms that are controlled by foreign governments on government devices. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 20, 2023 by a vote of 174-0 and the bill later became law.

SB 140 No Radical Gender Surgeries for Minors in Georgia.

This bill prohibits healthcare practitioners from performing sex reassignment surgeries on or providing hormone replacement therapy to minors. CPAC opposes the mutilation of minors and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 16, 2023 by a vote of 96-75 and the bill later became law.

SB 145 Fighting the Left's War on Leafblowers.

This bill prohibits municipalities from adopting regulations that apply standards to gas-powered leaf blowers that are significantly different from standards applied to similar gas-powered equipment. CPAC supports efforts to reduce excessive government regulation and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 27, 2023 by a vote of 103-67 and the bill later became law.



SB 160 Providing a Small Amount of Relief to Employers.

This bill diminishes the contribution rates of tenured employers to the unemployment system until 2026. CPAC supports efforts to provide appropriate relief to employers and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 27, 2023 by a vote of 97-68 and the bill later became law.

SB 222 Banning Zuckerbucks in Georgia.

This bill requires that election authorities conduct elections, primaries, and runoffs using only lawfully appropriated public funds. CPAC supports efforts to promote election integrity, opposes the use of private funds to pay for elections, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 27, 2023 by a vote of 100-69 and the bill later became law.

SB 233 Promoting School Choice in Georgia.

This bill sets up the Georgia Promise Scholarship Act, the likes of which will provide funds to parents such that they may select the educational option for their children best suited to their needs. CPAC supports efforts to promote school choice and supported this bill. The House defeated this bill on March 29, 2023 by a vote of 85-89.

SB 246 Forcing Taxpayers to Pay Off Other People's Student Loans.

The early version of this bill sets up a program for which qualified nurses can apply in order to receive up to \$100,000 over 5 years to pay off their student loan debts. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should have to pay off other people's student loans and opposed this bill. The House passed the early version of this bill on March 27, 2023 by a vote of 167-3 and the bill later became law.

HB 408 Special Tax Exemption for Hyundai.

This bill extends the sunset date on provisions that gave tax exemptions on sales of tangible personal property to "competitive [projects] of regional significance" from 2023 to 2026. CPAC opposes government favoritism toward particular economic development projects and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on March 2, 2023 by a vote of 169-2 and the bill later became law (quite literally in the Hyundai Metaplant in Bryan County).
