ABOUT THE CENTER FOR LEGISLATIVE ACCOUNTABILITY

ACUF's Center for Legislative Accountability researches and selects a range of bills to evaluate a member's adherence to conservative principles. We begin by defining conservatism (i.e., the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person). Next, we apply our understanding of the proper role of government (i.e., protecting Life, Liberty and Property). Then, we select bills that focus on Ronald Reagan's philosophy of the "three-legged stool": 1) fiscal and economic: taxes, budgets, regulation, spending, healthcare, and property; 2) social and cultural: Second Amendment, religion, life, welfare, and education; and 3) national security: preserving our nation's security by maintaining a strong national defense. The wide range of issues covered are designed to give citizens an accurate assessment of how Members of Congress view the role of government in an individual's life.

METHODOLOGY

The CLA's Ratings of Congress and the States illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. When determining a position on a particular issue, the CLA begins by defining conservatism: the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person. Then, we apply the founders' belief that the proper role of government is to protect Life, Liberty and Property.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

Each lawmaker is evaluated on a zero to 100 scale, with a score of 100 representing a voting record that is perfectly aligned with conservative principles. Officials who earn a score of 90% or higher are presented with the CLA's highest honor, the Award for Conservative Excellence, while those who earn a score of 80% or higher, but less than 90%, are presented with the Award for Conservative Achievement. Additionally, any lawmaker who earns a score of 10% or lower qualifies for the ACUF's Coalition of the Radical Left.

BILLS

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31. Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected. The CLA provides a score for each legislative chamber, which is based upon the average scores of all members within that respective chamber. A legislature's overall score is calculated by averaging each state's two legislative chambers together in order to better reflect the differences in political power between the chambers. (The exception being Nebraska, the nation's only unicameral legislature comprising a single legislative chamber, on which the state's overall score is based.)



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
KANSAS SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- SB 2 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Authorizing Alcohol Sales and Consumption on the State Fairgrounds and Raising the Allowable ABV Level of Wine to 16%. ACU supports these measures which expand individual liberties and entrepreneurship and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 31, 2022 by a vote of 31-6 and the bill was signed into law.
- 2. SB 34 Protecting Individual Liberties through a Prohibition on Government Imposed Mask and Vaccination Mandates. ACU supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good. ACU supports this measure to ensure the legislative branch remains in control of masking and other mandates as opposed to unaccountable bureaucrats and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 28, 2022 by a vote of 23-17 but the bill was vetoed by the Governor.
- 3. SB 58 Strengthening Parental Rights and Transparency in Education by Establishing a "Parents' Bill of Rights". ACU supports strengthening parental rights and increasing transparency within the education system and supported this bill. The Senate voted to override the Governor's veto on April 26, 2022 by a vote of 27-12. (The House failed to override the Governor's veto.)
- 4. SB 150 Reducing Lawsuit Abuse by Limiting Deceptive Legal Advertisements. ACU supports free speech as protected under the First Amendment, including advertising: however, criminal fraud cannot be dressed up as free speech and must be prevented. Therefore, ACU supports efforts to prevent lawsuit abuse resulting from unsubstantiated and misleading legal advertisements which ultimately comes at the expense of consumers and taxpayers and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 1, 2022 by a vote of 27-13 and the bill was signed into law.
- 5. SB 160 Protecting Women's Athletics from Competition with Men by Basing K-12 Sports on Biological Sex. ACU believes all individuals should be treated with dignity and respect and have the same opportunities under the law. ACU also recognizes that there are numerous standard classifications in sports (such as age, weight, etc.) to ensure fair competition. Therefore, ACU supports ensuring fair competition among teams competing across the state and supported this bill. The Senate voted to override the Governor's veto on April 26, 2022 by a vote of 28-10. (The House failed to override the Governor's veto.)
- 6. SB 161 Fostering Innovation and Reducing Costs through the Authorization of Certain Autonomous Personal Delivery Devices on Sidewalks and Shoulders. ACU supports reducing labor and consumer costs through proactive efforts to embrace innovation and maximize the free-market benefits provided by autonomous technology and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 29, 2022 by a vote of 22-17 but the bill was vetoed by the Governor.
- 7. SB 199 Improving Access to Affordable Health Insurance by Allowing Short-Term Health Care Plans to be Offered up to 3 Years (Previously 12 Months). ACU recognizes STLDHP plans are typically much cheaper options as they do not have to provide the "essential health benefits" under Obamacare. ACU has long opposed Obamacare which has led to enormous increases in health care costs, supports providing consumers the freedom to purchase health care plans free of Obamacare mandates and supported this as a step in the right direction. The Senate voted to override the Governor's veto on April 26, 2022 by a vote of 28-9. (The House failed to override the Governor's veto.)
- 8. SB 286 Protecting Hospitals and Businesses from Frivolous Litigation by Extending COVID-19 Liability Protections. ACU recognizes that this measure helps prevent greedy plaintiffs' attorneys from abusing the legal system which ultimately drives up healthcare and business costs for everyone and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 1, 2022 by a vote of 24-16 but the bill was vetoed by the Governor.

- 9. SB 313 Reducing Product and Consumer Mobility Costs by Permitting Operation of Autonomous Vehicles. ACU supports reducing consumer costs by maximizing the free-market benefits provided by autonomous technology, opposes union attempts to squash innovation in order to enrich their members and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 27, 2022 by a vote of 23-17 and the bill was signed into law.
- 10. SB 326 Expanding Cronyism by Providing \$8.72 Million in Special Tax Breaks to the Railroad Industry. ACU supports a tax code that is broadly applied with as low of rates as possible for everyone. ACU opposes this cronyism which enriches select companies while shifting tax burdens to other industries and individuals not favored by government and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 7, 2022 by a vote of 29-7. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 11. SB 347 Enriching Woke Corporations Through a New "APEX Program" which Socializes over \$800 Million of Panasonic's Private Business Costs onto Taxpayers. ACU supports a broadly applied tax code with as low of rates as possible for everyone. ACU opposes this cronyism which enriches and provides a competitive advantage to select large companies (including Panasonic and other Woke Corporations) while socializing costs onto small businesses and other taxpayers not favored by government. ACU finds the Panasonic "deal" particularly egregious considering Kansans are being forced to subsidize the Lefts quest to force motorists into electric vehicles and war on the internal combustion engine and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 9, 2022 by a vote of 31-9 and the bill was signed into law.
- 12. SB 348 Exempting "Hair Threading" from the State's Draconian Cosmetology Licensing Regime. ACU supports the elimination of the state's draconian board of cosmetology which is designed to restrict competition and enrich cosmetology schools through the board's 1,500 hour training mandates and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The Senate passed the bill on March 28, 2022 by a vote of 32-6 and the bill was signed into law.
- 13. SB 395 Strengthening Fourth Amendment Rights by Prohibiting Warrantless Surveillance on Private Property by Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks (KDWP). ACU supports the founders' believe in the Fourth Amendment and protections against warrantless search and seizures and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 30–9. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 14. SB 455 Expanding School Choice by Permitting Students to Enroll in Outside School Districts that have Available Capacity. ACU supports improving educational outcomes and reducing taxpayer costs by responsibly expanding school choice via open enrollment and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 22, 2022 by a vote of 23-16. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 15. SB 489 Protecting Individual Liberties by Ensuring the Legislature Oversees Pandemic Shutdown and Not the Secretary of Health and Unelected Bureaucrats. ACU supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 24-15. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 16. SB 493 Protecting Consumer Choice by Prohibiting Localities from Banning Plastic Straws, Bags, and Containers. ACU opposes unnecessary mandates which drive up business and consumer costs in order to advance a Leftist politicized environmental agenda and supported this bill. The Senate voted to override the Governor's veto on April 26, 2022 by a vote of 27–12. (The House failed to override the Governor's veto.)
- 17. SCR 1620 Protecting Taxpayers Through a Constitutional Amendment Requiring a 2/3rds Vote of the Legislature to Impose or Hike Taxes. ACU supports protecting taxpayers and expanding economic growth by maintaining the lowest possible levels of taxation and supported this resolution. The Senate failed to pass the resolution on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 25-14. (A 2/3 majority was required.)

- 18. HB 2005 Imposing an Overreaching and Costly New Occupational Licensing Regime in the Elevator Industry. ACU recognizes elevators have been widely utilized in Kansas for over a century, opposes these overreaching regulations that exceed basic safety certification and ultimately restrict competition and unnecessarily drive up consumer costs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 29, 2022 by a vote of 34-5 and the bill was signed into law.
- 19. HB 2056 Strengthening Election Integrity by Limiting Remote Ballot Boxes to One per 30k Voters and Requiring Constant Video Surveillance. ACU supports strengthening ballot integrity by ensuring that necessary safeguards are in place to protect against illegal "ballot harvesting" and vote fraud which disenfranchises legal voters and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 22-17. (The bill failed to advance from conference committee.)
- 20. HB 2087 Combatting Excessive Regulations by Expanding Economic Impact Reporting to Cover Regulation above \$1 Million (Previously \$3 Million). ACU has long supported the federal REINS Act (Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny) and greater oversight of costly regulations and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 31, 2022 by a vote of 34-4 and the bill was signed into law.
- 21. HB 2109 Protecting Free Speech by Extending the Prohibition on State and Local Officials Disclosing the Identities of Nonprofit Donors. ACU supports free speech as protected under the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, supports this measure to prevent government bureaucrats from discouraging free speech by creating an environment of donor intimidation and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 1, 2022 by a vote of 40-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 22. HB 2138 Strengthening Election Integrity Through Multiple New Safeguards Including Ballot Watermarks, Voter Roll Maintenance and Auditing. ACU supports strengthening ballot integrity and preventing vote fraud which disenfranchises legal voters and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 1, 2022 by a vote of 28-8 and the bill was signed into law.
- 23. HB 2237 Socializing "Affordable Housing" Costs and Enriching Select Developers through a Series of New Tax Credit and Subsidy Schemes. ACU recognizes the free market is the best mechanism to direct investment as opposes government central planning schemes such as this measure. ACU opposes this cronyism which enriches government-favored developers while shifting tax burdens to homeowners and taxpayers not favored by government, believes the best way to make housing truly "affordable" is by eliminating excessive building and zoning mandates, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 25, 2022 by a vote of 34–3 and the bill was signed into law.
- 24. HB 2252 Protecting Election Integrity by Prohibiting the Governor or Secretary of State from Changing Election Law or Procedure without Legislative Approval. ACU supports this effort to protect the integrity of the state's election system through this legislative check on executive branch power and supported this bill. The Senate voted to override the Governor's veto on May 23, 2022 by a vote of 27-10 and the bill later became law.
- 25. HB 2279 Expanding Access to Health Care by Allowing Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs) to Practice Independently without Collaborative Agreements. ACU supports expanding access to health care and lowering costs by providing Registered Nurses greater practice authority and removing other unnecessary regulatory barriers and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 9, 2022 by a vote of 30-7 and the bill was signed into law.

- 26. HB 2448 Promoting Self Sufficiency Through Work and Training Requirements for Work-Ready Adults Ages 18-49 Seeking Food Stamps. ACU supports efforts to help work-ready individuals live more prosperous lives by reducing government dependency, which oftentimes leads to intergenerational poverty and supported this bill. The Governor's veto was overridden by the Senate on April 28, 2022 by a vote of 29-11.
- 27. HB 2717 Ensuring Local Cooperation with Federal Immigration Enforcement and Clarifying Municipal ID Cards Don't Meet State Identity Requirements. ACU supports efforts to assist the federal government in performing its constitutional role to enforce the nation's immigration laws, supports government and election integrity by clarifying ID requirements and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 30, 2022 by a vote of 29-10 and the bill was signed into law.
- 28. HCR 5014 Combatting Bureaucratic Overreach through a Constitutional Amendment Providing Legislative Oversight of Administrative Rules and Regulations. ACU supports strengthening government integrity and accountability through this legislative check on the powers of the executive branch and unaccountable bureaucrats and supported this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 27-12. (Voters rejected the proposed amendment on November 8, 2022.)

KANSAS HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- SB 2 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Authorizing Alcohol Sales and Consumption on the State Fairgrounds and Raising the Allowable ABV Level of Wine to 16%. ACU supports these measures which expand individual liberties and entrepreneurship and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 31, 2022 by a vote of 86-31 and the bill was signed into law.
- 2. SB 34 Protecting Individual Liberties Through a Prohibition on Government Imposed Mask and Vaccination Mandates. ACU supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good. ACU supports this measure to ensure the legislative branch remains in control of masking and other mandates as opposed to unaccountable bureaucrats and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 28, 2022 by a vote of 64-53 but the bill was vetoed by the Governor.
- 3. SB 58 Strengthening Parental Rights and Transparency in Education by Establishing a "Parents' Bill of Rights". ACU supports strengthening parental rights and increasing transparency within the education system and supported this bill. The House failed to override the Governor's veto on April 28, 2022 by a vote of 72-50.
- 4. SB 150 Reducing Lawsuit Abuse by Limiting Deceptive Legal Advertisements. ACU supports free speech as protected under the First Amendment, including advertising: however, criminal fraud cannot be dressed up as free speech and must be prevented. Therefore, ACU supports efforts to prevent lawsuit abuse resulting from unsubstantiated and misleading legal advertisements which ultimately comes at the expense of consumers and taxpayers and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 75-47 and the bill was signed into law.
- 5. SB 160 Protecting Women's Athletics from Competition with Men by Basing K-12 Sports on Biological Sex. ACU believes all individuals should be treated with dignity and respect and have the same opportunities under the law. ACU also recognizes that there are numerous standard classifications in sports (such as age, weight, etc.) to ensure fair competition. Therefore, ACU supports ensuring fair competition among teams competing across the state and supported this bill. The House failed to override the Governor's veto on April 28, 2022 by a vote of 81-41.
- 6. SB 161 Fostering Innovation and Reducing Costs Through the Authorization of Certain Autonomous Personal Delivery Devices on Sidewalks and Shoulders. ACU supports reducing labor and consumer costs through proactive efforts to embrace innovation and maximize the free-market benefits provided by autonomous technology and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 75-47 but the bill was vetoed by the Governor.
- 7. SB 199 Improving Access to Affordable Health Insurance by Allowing Short-Term Health Care Plans to be Offered up to 3 Years (Previously 12 Months). ACU recognizes STLDHP plans are typically much cheaper options as they do not have to provide the "essential health benefits" under Obamacare. ACU has long opposed Obamacare which has led to enormous increases in health care costs, supports providing consumers the freedom to purchase health care plans free of Obamacare mandates and supported this as a step in the right direction. The House passed the bill on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 73-49 but the bill was vetoed by the Governor.
- 8. SB 267 (Helgerson Amd.) Increasing Government Dependency by Expanding Medicaid Under Obamacare to All Individuals Earning up to 138% of the Federal Poverty Level. The Helgerson (ACUF Lifetime 28%) amendment to the appropriations bill. ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier, more productive lives, opposes increasing government dependency and expanding a program rife with inefficiencies, fraud and waste and opposed this amendment. The House failed to adopt the amendment on March 22, 2022 by a vote of 49-72.

- 9. SB 286 Protecting Hospitals and Businesses from Frivolous Litigation by Extending COVID-19 Liability Protections. ACU recognizes that this measure helps prevent greedy plaintiffs' attorneys from abusing the legal system which ultimately drives up healthcare and business costs for everyone and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 1, 2022 by a vote of 64–51 but the bill was vetoed by the Governor.
- 10. SB 313 Reducing Product and Consumer Mobility Costs by Permitting Operation of Autonomous Vehicles. ACU supports reducing consumer costs by maximizing the free-market benefits provided by autonomous technology, opposes union attempts to squash innovation in order to enrich their members and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 27, 2022 by a vote of 75-44 and the bill was signed into law.
- 11. SB 347 Enriching Woke Corporations Through a New "APEX Program" which Socializes over \$800 Million of Panasonic's Private Business Costs onto Taxpayers. ACU supports a broadly applied tax code with as low of rates as possible for everyone. ACU opposes this cronyism which enriches and provides a competitive advantage to select large companies (including Panasonic and other Woke Corporations) while socializing costs onto small businesses and other taxpayers not favored by government. ACU finds the Panasonic "deal" particularly egregious considering Kansans are being forced to subsidize the Lefts quest to force motorists into electric vehicles and war on the internal combustion engine and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 8, 2022 by a vote of 80-41 and the bill was signed into law.
- 12. SB 348 Exempting "Hair Threading" from the State's Draconian Cosmetology Licensing Regime. ACU supports the elimination of the state's draconian board of cosmetology which is designed to restrict competition and enrich cosmetology schools through the board's 1,500 hour training mandates and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The House passed the bill on March 17, 2022 by a vote of 110-10 and the bill was signed into law.
- 13. SB 493 Protecting Consumer Choice by Prohibiting Localities from Banning Plastic Straws, Bags, and Containers. ACU opposes unnecessary mandates which drive up business and consumer costs in order to advance a Leftist politicized environmental agenda and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 74-48 but the bill was vetoed by the Governor.
- 14. HB 2005 Imposing an Overreaching and Costly New Occupational Licensing Regime in the Elevator Industry. ACU recognizes elevators have been widely utilized in Kansas for over a century, opposes these overreaching regulations that exceed basic safety certification and ultimately restrict competition and unnecessarily drive up consumer costs and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 31, 2022 by a vote of 73-45 and the bill was signed into law.
- 15. HB 2087 Combatting Excessive Regulations by Expanding Economic Impact Reporting to Cover Regulation Above \$1 Million (Previously \$3 Million). ACU has long supported the federal REINS Act (Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny) and greater oversight of costly regulations and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 31, 2022 by a vote of 105-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- 16. HB 2109 Protecting Free Speech by Extending the Prohibition on State and Local Officials Disclosing the Identities of Nonprofit Donors. ACU supports free speech as protected under the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, supports this measure to prevent government bureaucrats from discouraging free speech by creating an environment of donor intimidation and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 1, 2022 by a vote of 92–20 and the bill was signed into law.
- 17. HB 2138 Strengthening Election Integrity Through Multiple New Safeguards Including Ballot Watermarks, Voter Roll Maintenance and Auditing. ACU supports strengthening ballot integrity and preventing vote fraud which disenfranchises legal voters and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 26, 2022 by a vote of 82-40 and the bill was signed into law.

- 18. HB 2237 Socializing "Affordable Housing" Costs and Enriching Select Developers Through a Series of New Tax Credit and Subsidy Schemes. ACU recognizes the free market is the best mechanism to direct investment as opposes government central planning schemes such as this measure. ACU opposes this cronyism which enriches government-favored developers while shifting tax burdens to homeowners and taxpayers not favored by government, believes the best way to make housing truly "affordable" is by eliminating excessive building and zoning mandates, and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 26, 2022 by a vote of 109-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- 19. HB 2252 Protecting Election Integrity by Prohibiting the Governor or Secretary of State from Changing Election Law or Procedure without Legislative Approval. ACU supports this effort to protect the integrity of the state's election system through this legislative check on executive branch power and supported this bill. The House voted to override the Governor's veto on May 23, 2022 by a vote of 84–37 and the bill later became law.
- 20. HB 2279 Expanding Access to Health Care by Allowing Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs) to Practice Independently without Collaborative Agreements. ACU supports expanding access to health care and lowering costs by providing Registered Nurses greater practice authority and removing other unnecessary regulatory barriers and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 1, 2022 by a vote of 80-34 and the bill was signed into law.
- 21. HB 2340 Advancing the War on Individual Liberties by Raising the Tobacco Age to 21. ACU believes tobacco and nicotine usage is a personal liberty issue, believes those who are old enough to fight for our country are old enough to decide whether to use these products and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 79-43. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 22. HB 2448 Promoting Self Sufficiency Through Work and Training Requirements for Work-Ready Adults Ages 18-49 Seeking Food Stamps. ACU supports efforts to help work-ready individuals live more prosperous lives by reducing government dependency, which oftentimes leads to intergenerational poverty and supported this bill. The Governor's veto was overridden by the House on April 28, 2022 by a vote of 86-36.
- 23. HB 2615 Expanding School Choice by Permitting Students to Enroll in Outside School Districts that have Available Capacity. ACU supports improving educational outcomes and reducing taxpayer costs by responsibly expanding school choice via open enrollment and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 63–59. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 24. HB 2717 Ensuring Local Cooperation with Federal Immigration Enforcement and Clarifying Municipal ID Cards Don't Meet State Identity Requirements. ACU supports efforts to assist the federal government in performing its constitutional role to enforce the nation's immigration laws, supports government and election integrity by clarifying ID requirements and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 23, 2022 by a vote of 84-38 and the bill was signed into law.
- 25. HCR 5014 Combatting Bureaucratic Overreach Through a Constitutional Amendment Providing Legislative Oversight of Administrative Rules and Regulations. ACU supports strengthening government integrity and accountability through this legislative check on the powers of the executive branch and unaccountable bureaucrats and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on February 21, 2022 by a vote of 85–39. (Voters rejected the proposed amendment on November 8, 2022.)
