The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the CPAC Foundation, is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area.

In 1971, ACUF launched its Ratings of Congress to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress. The Ratings quickly became considered the “gold standard” and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles.

In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, Ratings of the States grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers. Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America’s federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31.

Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual’s life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected.

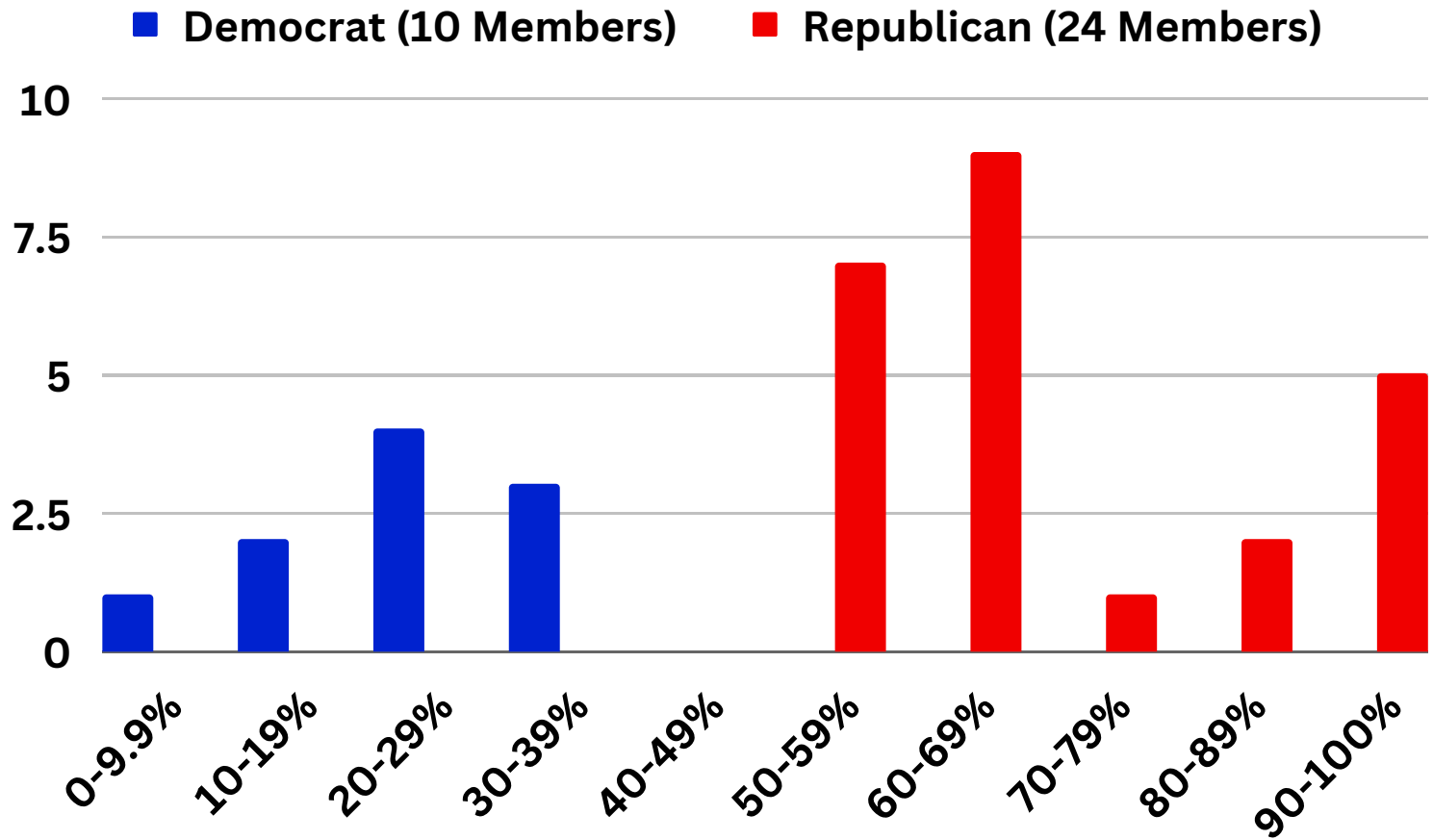

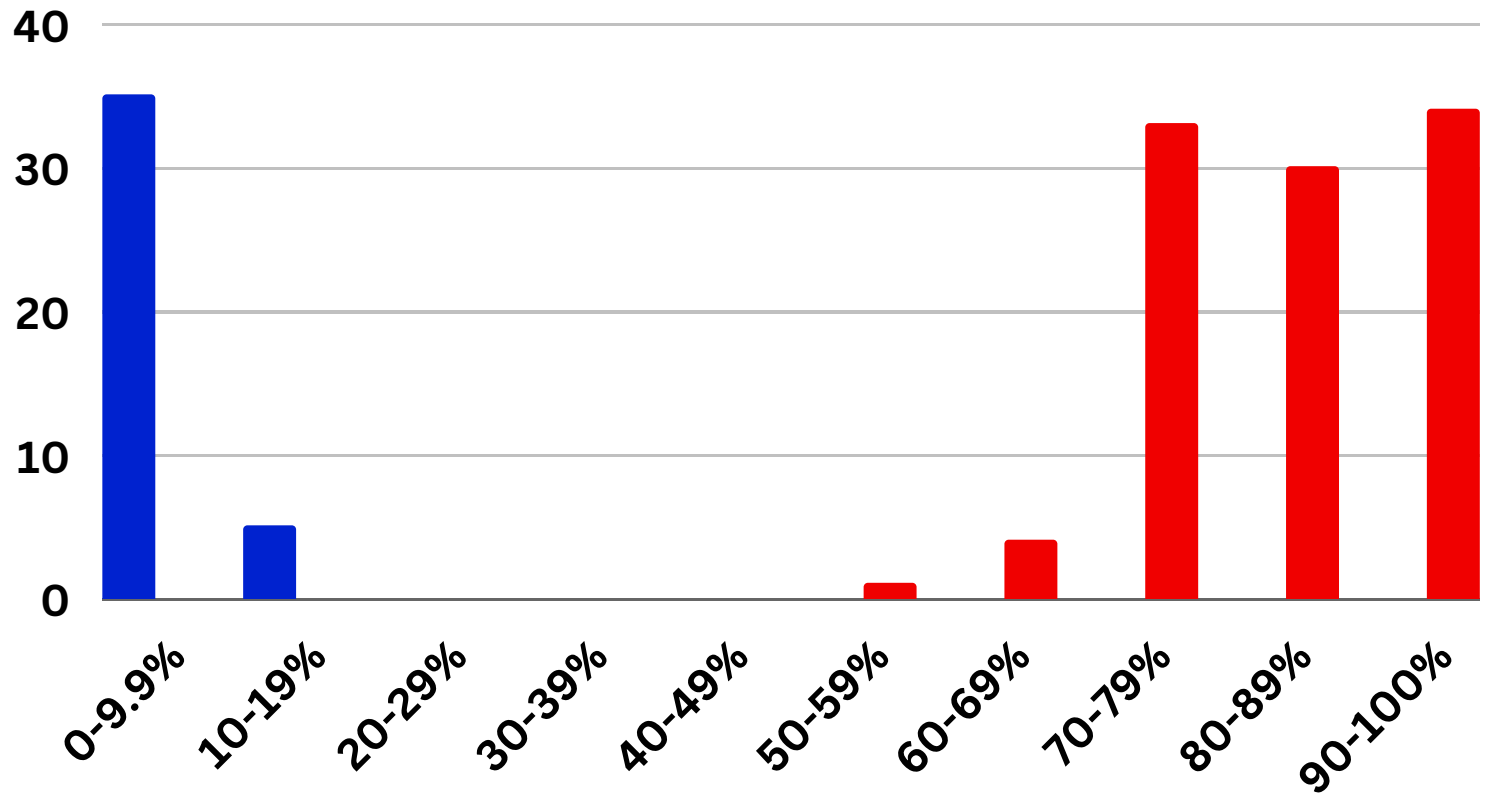

HB 1552 Funding Parity for Charter Schools.

This bill, known as the Charter School Funding Equity Bill, eliminates much of the funding disparity (approximately \$1700-2500 per student) between public schools and charter schools. CPAC supports empowering parental choice in education and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 20, 2022 by a vote of 29-5 and the bill later became law.

HB 1662 Freedom to Work from Home.

This bill prevents local governments from shutting down those who work from home via rules against telephone sales and services by appointment within the home. It also prevents local governments from making restrictions on the hours of operation of home-based work. CPAC supports the ability of individuals to conduct legal business on their own private property and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 11, 2022 by a vote of 29-4 and the bill later became law.

HB 1720 Socializing Agricultural Development Through Crony Tax Credits and Loan Programs.

This bill extends and expands special tax credit programs for various agricultural industries. CPAC opposes this type of cronyism in government and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 10, 2022 by a vote of 28-6 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.

HB 1878 Increasing Election Integrity.

This bill authorizes the Secretary of State to audit election rolls quarterly and requires election authorities to determine whether local officials have performed voter registration list maintenance election activities. The bill also prohibits the state from receiving or spending private money when conducting an election. CPAC supports efforts to strengthen ballot integrity and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 9, 2022 by a vote of 23-11

HB 2485 Preventing Excessive Regulations.

This bill reduces bureaucratic red tape relating to the recycling of waste and makes it such that rules and regulations regarding these matters cannot be stricter than federal rules. CPAC supports streamlining bureaucratic regulations where possible and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 5, 2022 by a vote of 21-11 and the bill later became law.



SJR 33 Capping Taxes.

This resolution proposes a constitutional amendment that caps the state income tax at 5.9 percent. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to reduce the tax burdens placed on Americans and supported this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on February 24, 2022 by a vote of 30-1 but did not get a final vote in the House.

SJR 38 Preventing Kansas City from Defunding the Police.

This resolution proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the general assembly to increase the minimum funding threshold for the Kansas City police department. CPAC supports keeping the police department well-funded and supported this bill. The Senate passed the resolution on March 21, 2022 by a vote of 23-10 and the measure will appear on the ballot.

SB 3 (Special Session) Tax Cuts.

This bill improves Missouri from the 26th highest top income tax rate on individuals among states to the 16th lowest rate at the onset of 2023, and 13th lowest when the full effect of the bill is reached. The bill also amends current laws in order to increase the standard exemption from the income tax from \$100 to \$1000. CPAC supports broad and appropriate tax relief and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on September 21, 2022 by a vote of 24-4.

SB 8 (Special Session) Tax Credits for Corrosive Ethanol and Other Industries.

This bill apportions tax credits for retailers selling gas with relatively high blends of ethanol. CPAC recognizes that high blends of ethanol have a damaging effect on motor vehicles, opposes the subsidized destruction of gas-powered vehicles, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on September 21, 2022 by a vote of 26-4 and the bill later became law.

SB 672 Subsidizing Government-Favored Workforce Programs.

This bill extends to 2029 a program that gives financial aid to adults seeking a degree or other form of certification in a field of "high need." CPAC opposes government programs that put those not involved in them at a disadvantage, supports the ability of market forces to decide what types of workers are needed rather than the government, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 24, 2022 by a vote of 24-8 and the bill later became law.



SB 672 (Amd. 2) Supporting Fairness in Women's Sports.

The Moon (CPAC Lifetime Rating 77%) to SB 672 amendment disqualifies students from receiving grants from the Fast Track Workforce Incentive Grant Program if the institution they are attending allows males to participate on women's sports teams. While CPAC would prefer if grant programs like this were not created at all, it approves of efforts to create a fair and safe environment of play in schools and supported this amendment. The Senate voted to table this amendment on February 15, 2022 by a vote of 24-7.

SB 672 (Amd. 3) Disincentivizing the Teaching of Critical Race Theory in Schools.

The Hoskins (CPAC Lifetime Rating 83%) amendment to SB 672 disqualifies students from receiving grants from the Fast Track Workforce Incentive Grant Program if the institution they are attending teaches certain "divisive concepts." These concepts include those that suggest that one is inherently racist because of their race and that their moral character is determined by their race. While CPAC would prefer if grant programs like this were not created at all, it approves of efforts to diminish the teaching of racist principles in schools. The Senate voted to table this amendment on February 15, 2022 by a vote of 23-7.

SB 758 (Amd. 2) Prohibiting ESG-Related Discrimination in the Public Bidding Process.

The Moon (CPAC Lifetime Score 77%) amendment to this bill prohibits public bodies from discriminating against bidders, offerors, and contractors based on their Environmental Social Governance (ESG) score when engaged in procuring or offering up contracts. CPAC approves of measures taken to limit the government's support of woke political agendas through bans on ESG-related discrimination and supported this amendment. The Senate defeated this amendment on April 4, 2022 by a vote of 8-20.

SB 798 Food Stamps for Restaurants.

This bill expands the Food Stamp program (now SNAP) to include restaurant meals. CPAC sees no reason for this type of extravagance with taxpayer funds. Although the bill ends a "pilot program" that allowed Food Stamp recipients to use ATM machines, CPAC thinks this bill sends the wrong message to the taxpayers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 28, 2022 by a vote of 18-15 but the bill was defeated in Committee in the House.

SB 812 Banning Zuckerbucks .

This bill prevents election authorities from accepting funding or gifts, excluding in-kind donations valued at less than \$1,000 dollars per polling place, from any source for conducting an election. CPAC opposes blatant attempts to curry favor with election officials and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 28, 2022 by a vote of 23-10 but the bill was stalled in the House.

SB 908 More Oversight for Crony Special Taxing Districts.

This bill increases transparency in special taxation districts like community improvement districts, neighborhood improvement districts, tax increment financing districts, and transportation development districts. CPAC supports this measure to combat cronyism by placing limitations on special taxing districts, which often enrich developers and increase tax burdens on individuals and businesses not favored by the government and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 6, 2022 by a vote of 33-0 but the bill stalled after passing in the House.

HJR 94 Requiring an ID to Vote.

This resolution proposes a state constitutional amendment that would require voters to provide election authorities with a government-issued photo ID to vote. Under the amendment, a person without a photo ID could still cast a provisional ballot. CPAC supports reasonable efforts to maintain ballot integrity and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on March 10, 2022 by a vote of 97-36 but the resolution was not taken up by the Senate.

HJR 110 Parents Bill of Rights.

This resolution proposes a state constitutional amendment that codifies a parental Bill of Rights. Among other provisions, it gives parents the right to be notified of any possible criminal offense involving their child and allows them access to their school's curricula. CPAC supports strengthening parental rights and supported this resolution. The House defeated this resolution on May 9, 2022 by a vote of 60-81.

HJR 131 Protecting Elections from Non-Citizens.

This resolution proposes a state constitutional amendment that would require a voter to be a United States citizen. The amendment would also require voters to use paper ballots in the voting process that can be preserved for an election audit and would require that voting machines be tested and certified. CPAC supports efforts to preserve ballot integrity and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on April 6, 2022 by a vote of 97-45 but the resolution was not taken up by the Senate.

HB 3 (Special Session) Subsidized Destruction of Vehicles through Ethanol Tax Credits.

This bill gives tax credits to retailers selling gas with relatively high blends of ethanol, a substance that is corrosive to motor vehicles. It also furnishes producers in a number of other industries with tax credits. CPAC opposes the government-incentivized destruction of gas-powered vehicles and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on September 21, 2022 by a vote of 83-28 and the bill later became law.

HB 1462 Expanding Gun Rights.

This bill removes a prohibition that restricts the carrying of legal firearms while in areas of public transportation, churches, and other places of worship by concealed carry permit holders. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 9, 2022 by a vote of 101-40 but the bill was not taken up by the Senate.



HB 1552 Funding Parity for Charter Schools.

This bill, known as the Charter School Funding Equity Bill, eliminates much of the funding disparity (approximately \$1700-2500 per student) between public schools and charter schools. CPAC supports empowering parental choice in education and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 12, 2022 by a vote of 116-29 and the bill later became law.

HB 1584 Paying for Electric Vehicle Charging Stations.

This bill forces any local authority that requires the installation of electric vehicle charging stations to pay all costs associated with the construction and maintenance of the stations. CPAC believes that the government should not be involved in the operation of electric vehicle charging stations but strongly believes that state taxpayers should never be on the hook for the cost of installing them and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 10, 2022 by a vote of 98-33 but the bill was never given approval in the Senate.

HB 1662 Freedom to Work from Home.

This bill prevents local governments from shutting down those who work from home via rules against telephone sales and services by appointment within the home. It also prevents local governments from making restrictions on the hours of operation of home-based work. CPAC supports the ability of individuals to conduct legal business on their own private property and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 13, 2022 by a vote of 94-43 and the bill later became law.

HB 1682 Improving Homeowner's Rights.

This bill addresses what homeowners can and cannot do when selling a property. It prohibits local governments from imposing mandatory home inspections on homeowners in certain instances and from restricting the use of "For Sale" signs by homeowners (though appropriate restrictions may be deployed by homeowners' associations). It also prohibits local governments from imposing eviction moratoriums. CPAC supports strengthening property rights and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 6, 2022 by a vote of 102-36 but the bill was not taken up by the Senate.

HB 1713 Religious Freedom Protections.

This bill nullifies orders that shut down religious gatherings save in a few exceptional circumstances. For example, these orders still stand when a gathered group is in imminent danger from problems like floods, fires, terrorist threats, or other immediate disasters. CPAC believes it is vital to the preservation of First Amendment liberties that religious gatherings not be wantonly impeded by the government and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 10, 2022 by a vote of 97-32 but the bill was not taken up by the Senate.



HB 1720 Socializing Agricultural Development Through Crony Tax Credits and Loan Programs.

This bill extends and expands special tax credit programs for various agricultural industries. CPAC opposes this type of cronyism in government and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 10, 2022 by a vote of 111-26 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.

HB 1724 Religious Freedom on Campus.

This bill prohibits public institutions of higher learning from discriminating against a belief-based student association based on its requirement that leaders of the association adhere to its sincerely held beliefs, sincere practice requirements, and standards of conduct. CPAC believes it is vital to the preservation of First Amendment freedoms that on-campus belief-based organizations not be discriminated against and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 10, 2022 by a vote of 95-36 but the bill was not taken up by the full Senate.

HB 1858 Parental Bill of Rights.

This bill codifies a parental bill of rights after the defeat of a similarly motivated proposed constitutional amendment. Under the bill, parents would have the right to know what their minor child is being taught in school, the right to know who is teaching their child, and the right to visit the school and receive all school records, among other provisions. CPAC supports strengthening parental rights and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 19, 2022 by a vote of 85-59 but the bill was not taken up by the full Senate.

HB 1878 Increasing Election Integrity.

This bill authorizes the Secretary of State to audit election rolls quarterly and requires election authorities to determine whether local officials have performed voter registration list maintenance election activities. The bill also prohibits the state from receiving or spending private money when conducting an election. The House passed the bill on May 12, 2022 by a vote of 97-47 and the bill later became law.

HB 2012 Born-Alive Protection Act.

This bill provides children born alive during or after an abortion with all the rights given to any other person in Missouri. It holds those who cause the death of such a child civilly liable and requires that these children be given proper care by health care providers. The bill also protects fetal remains and tissue from abusive activities. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 6, 2022 by a vote of 91-37 but the bill was not taken up by the full Senate.



HB 2485 Preventing Excessive Regulations.

This bill reduces bureaucratic red tape relating to the recycling of waste and makes it such that rules and regulations regarding these matters cannot be stricter than federal rules. CPAC supports streamlining bureaucratic regulations where possible and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 13, 2022 by a vote of 100-45 and the bill later became law.

HB 2587 Experimenting with Regulatory Relief.

This bill sets up the Regulatory Relief Office to administer a regulatory sandbox program. This program allows businesses hoping to introduce novel products into the market to operate without certain onerous regulations for up to 24 months. CPAC strongly supports this concept, hopes that it demonstrates how new businesses could flourish with less regulation, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 6, 2022 by a vote of 108-35 but the bill was not taken up by the Senate.

HB 3010 (Amd. 2) Protecting Life.

The Cody Smith (CPAC Lifetime Rating 91%) amendment to HB 3010 prevents the government from spending funds on institutions that perform abortions. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice, and supported this amendment. The House adopted the amendment on April 5, 2022 by a vote of 87-35.

SJR 38 Preventing Kansas City from Defunding the Police.

This resolution proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the general assembly to increase the minimum funding threshold for the Kansas City police department. CPAC supports keeping the police department well-funded and supported this bill. The House passed the resolution on May 13, 2022 by a vote of 103-44.

SB 3 (Special Session) Tax Cuts.

This bill improves Missouri from the 26th highest top income tax rate on individuals among states to the 16th lowest rate at the onset of 2023, and 13th lowest when the full effect of the bill is reached. The bill also amends current laws in order to increase the standard exemption from the income tax from \$100 to \$1000. CPAC supports broad and appropriate tax relief and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on September 29, 2022 by a vote of 98-32.



SB 672 Subsidizing Government-Favored Workforce Programs.

This bill extends to 2029 a program that gives financial aid to adults seeking a degree or other form of certification in a field of “high need.” CPAC opposes government programs that put those not involved in them at a disadvantage, supports the ability of market forces to decide what types of workers are needed rather than the government, and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 13, 2022 by a vote of 109-29 and the bill was signed into law.

SB 710 (Amd. 15) Invoking Further Government Interference in the Healthcare Industry.

The Wright (CPAC Lifetime Rating 70%) amendment to SB 710 prevents pharmacy benefits managers from differentially treating certain covered entities and pharmacies in a few circumstances. CPAC supports a freer market in healthcare, opposes this government interference in private contracting agreements which further drive-up insurance and pharmaceutical costs, and opposed this amendment. The House adopted the amendment on May 4, 2022 by a vote of 96-34.
