The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the CPAC Foundation, is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area.

In 1971, ACUF launched its Ratings of Congress to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress. The Ratings quickly became considered the “gold standard” and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles.

In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, Ratings of the States grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers. Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America’s federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31.

Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual’s life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected.

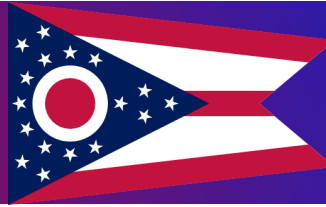

HJR 4 Requiring Citizenship to Vote.

This resolution proposes an amendment to the state constitution that would clarify the list of individuals permitted to vote in the state. For example, it would make clear that only those who are citizens over the age of 18 may vote. CPAC supports this effort to prevent local governments from allowing illegal immigrants and children under 18 to vote in local elections and supported this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on June 1, 2022 by a vote of 32-0 and the measure was placed on the ballot.

HB 99 Limiting Gun-Free Zones.

This bill grants local school boards the authority to give teachers and school workers approval to carry firearms within school zones if they receive a certain amount of firearms training. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment, recognizes the need to protect schools and those within them, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 1, 2022 by a vote of 23-9 and the bill later became law.

HB 140 Transparency in Ballot Measures.

This bill changes the language that may be used to describe a tax on a ballot when a tax is being proposed to electors. For example, such a proposal must now include the amount of revenue the tax is expected to produce. CPAC supports more transparency in government and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 1, 2022 by a vote of 22-10 and the bill later became law.

HB 150 Subsidizing One of the Highest Paid Professions in the Country.

This bill sets up a student loan forgiveness program for attorneys that practice in specific roles in rural areas of the state. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should have to assist in paying off another's tuition, sees even less reason why they should have to pay off the tuition of such a highly-paid profession, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on December 14, 2022 by a vote of 29-2.

HB 175 Deregulating Temporary Water Streams.

This bill deregulates bodies of water that form after rain and snowmelt, the likes of which are known as "ephemeral water features." CPAC supports common sense deregulation and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 30, 2022 by a vote of 25-8 and the bill later became law.



HB 430 Banning Local Rent Control.

This bill prohibits local governments from imposing rent control regulations and rent stabilization agreements onto landlords. CPAC opposes rent control measures and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 1, 2022 by a vote of 25-6 and the bill later became law.

HB 513 Reinforcing the Primacy of State Regulations Over Local Laws.

This bill prevents localities from enacting certain regulations that are stricter than Ohio state laws. CPAC believes these regulations are overdone as they are and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on December 14, 2022 by a vote of 24-8 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.

HB 542 Regulation Reform for Occupational Licenses.

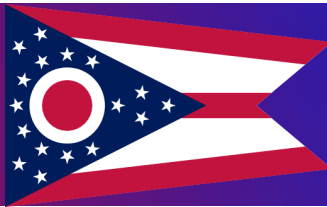
This bill makes common-sense changes to the occupational licensing regime for cosmetologists and barbers. For example, it allows both professions to use the same license. The bill also reduces the number of hours of training a barber or cosmetologist needs in order to obtain their license. CPAC opposes the proliferation of occupational licenses and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The Senate passed the bill on November 30, 2022 by a vote of 24-7 but the bill never received final approval.

SR 204 Urging the US President Not to Punish Members of the Military for Not Getting the COVID-19 Vaccine.

This resolution encourages the US President to not punish or reprimand members of the US Armed Forces for refusing to receive a COVID-19 vaccine. CPAC believes that the decision to get the COVID-19 vaccine should be made as voluntary as possible, disapproves of the persecution of honorable members of the military for their refusal to get this vaccine, and supported this resolution. The Senate adopted this resolution on November 30, 2022 by a vote of 25-6.

SR 259 Urging the US President to Establish US Energy Independence.

This resolution encourages the US President to take steps to ensure that the US becomes energy independent and asks that he remove regulations preventing the attainment of such an end. CPAC supports efforts to reduce the US' dependence on foreign countries for energy and supported this resolution. The Senate adopted this resolution on December 13, 2022 by a vote of 25-6.



SB 9 Regulatory Reform.

This bill extends efforts to find regulations that can be modified or eliminated and sets a goal of reducing base inventory regulations by 30% by 2025. CPAC supports the reduction of burdensome regulations and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 2, 2022 by a vote of 27-6 and the bill later became law.

SB 33 Expanding School Choice.

This bill allows those who have contributed to 529 plans established by other states to receive certain income tax deductions. CPAC supports efforts to expand school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on November 30, 2022 by a vote of 32-0 and the bill later became law.

SB 61 Interfering in Private Contracts.

This bill states that HOAs may not prevent property owners from installing solar panels. CPAC supports property rights, supports efforts to leave individuals to freely negotiate contracts regarding their property, does not believe that the government should insert itself into negotiations between HOAs and homeowners, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on June 1, 2022 by a vote of 32-0 and the bill later became law.

SB 156 Improving Self-Defense Laws.

This bill adds knives to the list of weapons that are legal to use when engaging in self-defense. CPAC views this as a common-sense addition to the list of items that can be used for self-defense and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on October 20, 2022 by a vote of 25-7 and the bill later became law.

SB 215 Establishing Constitutional Carry.

This bill legalizes the carrying of a concealed handgun without a permit, a measure that has come to be known as "Constitutional Carry." CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on December 15, 2022 by a vote of 23-8 and the bill later became law.



SB 249 Establishing a Regulatory Sandbox for Financial Products.

This bill establishes a regulatory sandbox program. Under this program, qualifying entities can offer novel financial products to consumers for up to 24 months without the burden of some regulations that would normally be levied on new products. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to reduce regulations that hamper the functioning of the free market and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 2, 2022 by a vote of 33-0 and the bill later became law.

SB 302 Improving Rules Governing Unemployment Insurance.

This bill tightens rules that govern how one's identity is verified for the purpose of entering a government unemployment program. CPAC supports efforts to reduce fraud and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on December 14, 2022 by a vote of 30-0 and the bill later became law.



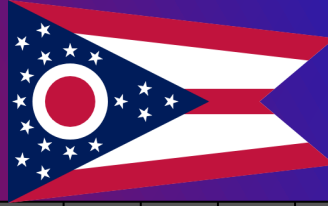

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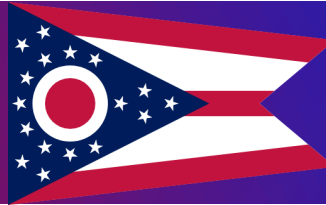

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HJR 4 Requiring Citizenship to Vote.

This resolution proposes an amendment to the state constitution that would clarify the list of individuals permitted to vote in the state. For example, it would make clear that only those who are citizens over the age of 18 may vote. CPAC supports this effort to prevent local governments from allowing illegal immigrants and children under 18 to vote in local elections and supported this resolution. The resolution passed the House on May 25, 2022 by a vote of 68-28 and the measure was placed on the ballot.

HR 194 Urging the Addition of Canada to the Religious Freedom Watch List.

This resolution recognizes the government of Canada's many violations of the religious freedoms of its people and encourages the US Commission on International Religious Freedom to consider adding Canada to its special watch list. CPAC also feels concerned about the increasing tendency of many governments to crush its population's basic freedoms and supported this resolution. The House adopted this resolution on June 1, 2022 by a vote of 58-29.

HB 99 Limiting Gun-Free Zones.

This bill grants local school boards the authority to give teachers and school workers approval to carry firearms within school zones if they receive a certain amount of firearms training. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment, recognizes the need to protect schools and those within them, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 1, 2022 by a vote of 56-35 and the bill later became law.

HB 150 Subsidizing One of the Highest Paid Professions in the Country.

This bill sets up a student loan forgiveness program for attorneys that practice in specific roles in rural areas of the state. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should have to assist in paying off another's tuition, sees even less reason why they should have to pay off the tuition of those participating in such a highly-paid profession, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on December 14, 2022 by a vote of 80-0.



HB 175 Eliminating Government Control of Temporary Bodies of Water.

This bill deregulates bodies of water that form after rain and snowmelt, the likes of which are known as “ephemeral water features.” CPAC supports common sense deregulation and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 6, 2022 by a vote of 61-35 and the bill later became law.

HB 325 Protecting Second Amendment Rights in an Emergency.

This bill prevents governmental entities from attempting to regulate firearms in response to certain emergencies. CPAC supports preserving fundamental rights during emergencies and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 16, 2022 by a vote of 64-35 but the bill was not brought up in the Senate.

HB 430 Banning Local Rent Control.

This bill prohibits local governments from imposing rent control regulations and rent stabilization agreements onto landlords. CPAC opposes rent control measures and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 1, 2022 by a vote of 59-31 and the bill later became law.

HB 497 Removing Ohio’s Third Grade Guarantee.

This teachers’ union-backed bill eliminates a requirement stating that students shall remain in third grade if they don’t meet the minimum reading requirements for third graders. CPAC opposes letting teachers off the hook for providing a shoddy education by advancing students who have fallen behind and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 1 by a vote of 82-10 but the bill was not taken up in the Senate.

HB 513 Reinforcing the Primacy of State Regulations Over Local Laws.

This bill prevents localities from enacting certain regulations that are stricter than Ohio state laws. CPAC believes that state laws should take precedence over local measures and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on December 14, 2022 by a vote of 53-35 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.



HB 542 Regulation Reform for Occupational Licenses.

This bill makes common-sense changes to the occupational licensing regime for cosmetologists and barbers. For example, it allows both professions to use the same license. The bill also reduces the number of hours of training a barber or cosmetologist needs in order to obtain their license. CPAC opposes the proliferation of occupational licenses and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The House passed the bill on May 18, 2022 by a vote of 88-1 but the bill never received final approval.

SB 9 Regulatory Reform.

This bill extends efforts to find regulations that can be modified or eliminated and sets a goal of reducing base inventory regulations by 30% by 2025. CPAC supports the reduction of burdensome regulations and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 2, 2022 by a vote of 61-33 and the bill later became law.

SB 33 Expanding School Choice.

This bill allows those who have contributed to 529 plans established by other states to receive certain income tax deductions. CPAC supports efforts to expand school choice and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on December 14, 2022 by a vote of 56-32 and the bill later became law.

SB 61 Interfering in Private Contracts.

This bill states that HOAs may not prevent property owners from installing solar panels. CPAC supports property rights, supports efforts to leave individuals to freely negotiate contracts regarding their property, does not believe that the government should insert itself into negotiations between HOAs and homeowners, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 25, 2022 by a vote of 81-13 and the bill later became law.

SB 156 Improving Self-Defense Laws.

This bill adds knives to the list of weapons that are legal to use when engaging in self-defense. CPAC views this as a common-sense addition to the list of items that can be used for self-defense and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 1, 2022 by a vote of 59-32 and the bill later became law.



SB 185 Attempt to Preserve Second Amendment Rights in an Emergency.

This bill protects the people's right to bear arms during declared emergencies, prohibiting government bodies from regulating certain firearms in the wake of emergencies. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on December 1, 2022 by a vote of 57-22 but the Senate refused to accept the House version of the bill.

SB 215 Establishing Constitutional Carry.

This bill legalizes the carrying of a concealed handgun without a permit, a measure that has come to be known as "Constitutional Carry." CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 2, 2022 by a vote of 58-36 and the bill later became law.

SB 249 Establishing a Regulatory Sandbox for Financial Products.

This bill establishes a regulatory sandbox program for financial products. Under this program, qualifying entities can offer novel financial products to consumers for up to 24 months without the burden of some regulations that would normally be levied on new products. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to reduce regulations that hamper the functioning of the free market and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on November 30, 2022 by a vote of 82-0 and the bill later became law.

SB 302 Improve Rules Governing Unemployment Insurance.

This bill tightens rules that govern how one's identity is verified for the purpose of entering a government unemployment program. CPAC supports efforts to reduce fraud and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on December 14, 2022 by a vote of 68-22 and the bill later became law.
