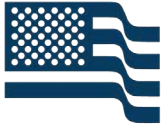
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LETTER FROM THE CHAIRMAN

The American Conservative Union Foundation (ACUF) is proud to present our 2021 Ratings of Congress. The stakes could not be higher as we head into the 2022 midterms: runaway inflation, a border crisis, spiking crime rates, a gruesome war abroad and an attack against the unborn, all products of a Biden administration hijacked by the radical left.

It will take an unwavering commitment to conservative principles to stop this downward spiral, so we made this year's *Ratings of Congress* our most in-depth and comprehensive edition in its 50-year history.

While the path forward will not be easy, this year's ratings provide hope for our future. For example, nine freshmen lawmakers earned a 100% rating, a feat not achieved since 2007 and not surpassed since the 1994 Gingrich revolution. In addition, the freshman Republican class earned, on average, an 10% higher rating than the Republicans they replaced (86% vs 76%).

We predict this trend will continue after the 2022 midterm elections. The Republicans who have already announced their retirement collectively rate a mere 67%, giving us a great opportunity to reduce the number of RINOs in Congress. Moreover, there are radicals in Congress who are facing conservative challengers who can win. We have a real shot at finally reversing the Left's tirade of destruction.

SELECTING THE VOTES

ACUF's Center for Legislative Accountability researches and selects a range of bills to evaluate a member's adherence to conservative principles. We begin by defining conservatism (i.e., the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person). Next, we apply our understanding of the proper role of government (i.e., protecting Life, Liberty and Property). Then, we select bills that focus on Ronald Reagan's philosophy of the "three-legged stool": 1) fiscal and economic: taxes, budgets, regulation, spending, healthcare, and property; 2) social and cultural: Second Amendment, religion, life, welfare, and education; and 3) national security: preserving our nation's security by maintaining a strong national defense. The wide range of issues covered are designed to give citizens an accurate assessment of how Members of Congress view the role of government in an individual's life.

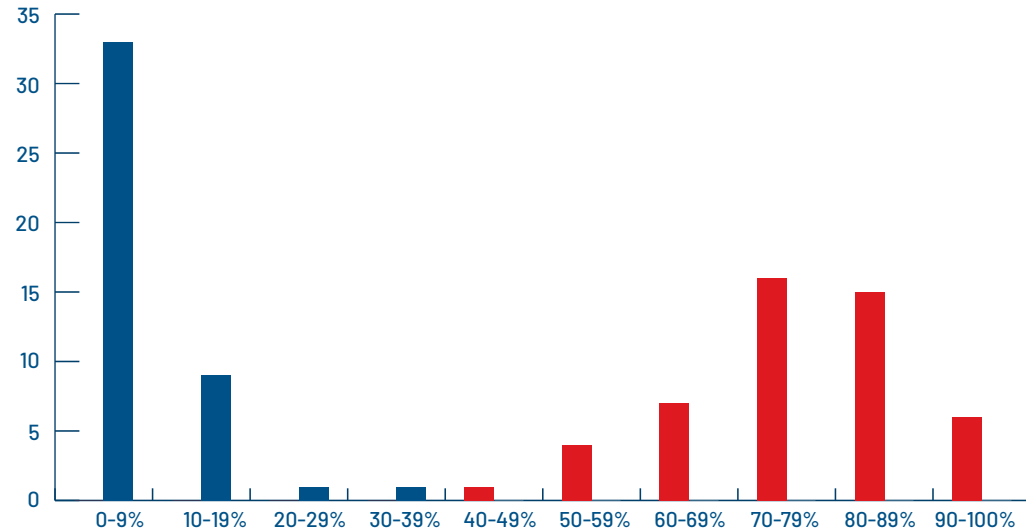
U.S. SENATE CONSERVATIVE RATINGS

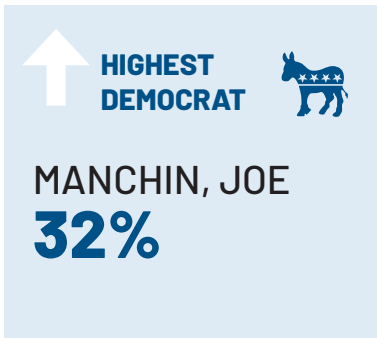
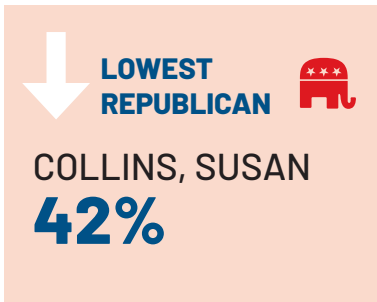

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U.S. SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. RC 14 Duplicating Pandemic Spending in the Restaurant Industry (SCR 5 Amd. 261).** The Senators Roger Wicker (R-MS, ACUF Lifetime 83%) and Kyrsten Sinema (D-AZ, ACUF Lifetime 15%) amendment #261 to the congressional budget duplicates COVID-19 relief efforts by creating a special restaurant grant fund. Even though the restaurant industry is already eligible for numerous benefits under the so-called American Rescue Plan and it's \$1.9 trillion in spending, this amendment is expected to provide another \$25 billion in taxpayer-funded grants to the industry. ACU opposes run-away spending and instead believes Congress should prioritize reopening the economy, especially considering the wide-scale distribution of the COVID-19 vaccine and opposed this amendment. The Senate adopted the amendment on February 4, 2022 by a vote of 90-10.
- 2. RC 18 Preventing Illegal Immigrants from Receiving Stimulus Checks (SCR 5 Amd. 54).** The Sen. Todd Young (R-IN, ACUF Lifetime 79%) amendment #54 to the congressional budget would ensure that illegal immigrants do not receive new rounds of economic impact payments, such as the \$1,400 stimulus payments proposed in the American Rescue Plan (roll call #110). ACU opposes rewarding individuals residing in the country unlawfully with taxpayer-funded benefits and supported this amendment. The Senate adopted the amendment on February 4, 2021 by a vote of 58-42 but the provision was not included in the final budget resolution.
- 3. RC 28 Ensuring Hydraulic Fracking Remains Legal (SCR 5 Amd. 833).** The Sen. Mike Braun (R-IN, ACUF Lifetime 91%) amendment #833 to the congressional budget ensures that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) cannot, through regulation or otherwise, ban fracking in the United States. ACU supports strengthening property rights and lowering energy costs through increased production of American energy and supported this amendment. The Senate adopted the amendment on February 4, 2021 by a vote of 57-43.
- 4. RC 31 Advancing a Fiscally Responsible Budget – the “Three Penny Plan” (SCR 5 Amd. 1).** The Sen. Rand Paul (ACUF Lifetime 97%) amendment #1 to the congressional budget implements the “Three Penny Plan” federal budget. Under the plan, the federal budget will be balanced within five years by cutting the budget by 3 pennies on the dollar each year over the next five years, at which point spending increases are then limited to 2 percent per year. ACU supports restoring fiscal sanity to a Congress that continually grows deficit spending and has plunged our nation into nearly \$30 trillion in debt and supported this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on February 4, 2021 by a vote of 29-71.
- 5. RC 32 Supporting Construction of the Keystone XL Pipeline (SCR 5 Amd. 678).** The Sen. Steve Daines (R-MT, ACUF Lifetime 85%) amendment #678 to the congressional budget supports construction of the Keystone XL pipeline to expand North American energy production. The bill is in response to an executive order issued on President Biden's first day of office which revoked the permit for the pipeline that would carry oil from Alberta, Canada to refineries in Illinois, Oklahoma and Texas. Upon completion the pipeline will transport 830,000 barrels of oil a day, roughly the amount of oil the U.S. imports from Russia. ACU supports lowering energy costs by expanding North America energy production and supported this amendment. The Senate adopted the amendment on February 4, 2021 by a vote of 52-48 but the provision was later stripped from the Senate's budget resolution.
- 6. RC 36 Preventing an Expansion of the Supreme Court (SCR 5 Amd. 66).** The Sen. Tom Cotton (R-AR, ACUF Lifetime 86%) amendment #66 to the congressional budget prevents packing the U.S. Supreme Court by requiring a three-fifths vote of the Senate to increase the number of justices. ACU opposes calls by the radical Left to pack the Supreme Court in order to “legislate from the bench” and supported this amendment. The Senate failed to advance the amendment on February 5, 2021 by a vote of 50-50 (51 votes were required).
- 7. RC 39 Advancing an America First Agenda by Prioritizing Domestic Spending Over Foreign Aid (SCR 5 Amd. 441).** The Sen. Rand Paul (ACUF Lifetime 97%) amendment #441 to the congressional budget reprioritizes spending “to build roads at home instead of building them around the world.” Specifically, the amendment takes \$26 billion in annual foreign aid for economic development programs and instead redirects the funds to domestic infrastructure projects. ACU supports advancing an America First agenda by prioritizing critical American needs over foreign aid and supported this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on February 5, 2021 by a vote of 8-92.

- 8. RC 49 Lowering Oil Refining Costs by Capping an Ethanol Subsidy Scheme (SCR 5 Amd. 871).** The Sen. Ted Cruz (ACUF Lifetime 97%) amendment #871 to the congressional budget would provide the oil refinery industry nearly \$15 billion in regulatory relief by placing a 10-cent cap on RINs which are part of a scheme to subsidize the ethanol industry. Under the crony Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS), refineries are forced to blend their gasoline with a certain amount of ethanol or purchase RIN credits which in recent years have surged to as much as \$1.12 under the scheme. ACU opposes ethanol fuel mandates which cause significant damage to older vehicles and small engines due to ethanol's corrosive properties, opposes driving up refinery costs to enrich a government-favored industry, and supported this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on February 5, 2021 by a vote of 26-74.
- 9. RC 59 Convicting President Donald J. Trump – Second Impeachment (HR 24).** This resolution represents Speaker Nancy Pelosi's (D-CA, ACUF Lifetime 3%) and Democratic Majority Leader Chuck Schumer's (D-NY, ACUF Lifetime 5%) second politicized impeachment attack on President Donald J. Trump. This resolution wrongfully alleges that President Trump incited a crowd to breach the Capitol on January 6th and threatened the integrity of the democratic system by highlighting credible cases of vote fraud in the 2020 election. ACU recognizes that on multiple occasions President Trump called for the protests on that day to remain peaceful. ACU further recognizes that at the time of this vote President Trump was a private citizen and this impeachment solely served as a personal political attack to prevent President Trump from seeking a future term and deny him government benefits and Secret Service protection as a private citizen. ACU opposes this partisan attack on the president and opposed this resolution. The Senate acquitted President Trump by finding him "not guilty" on February 13, 2021 by a vote of 57-43 (a two-thirds majority vote is required to convict.) This vote is double-weighted due to the egregious nature of the political attack.
- 10. RC 74 Increasing Unemployment by Hiking the Federal Minimum Wage to \$15 an Hour (HR 1319 Amd. 972).** The Sen. Bernie Sanders (D-VT, ACUF Lifetime 6%) amendment #972 to the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 hikes the federal minimum wage to \$15 an hour. The increase is phased-in over the next four years and then set to further rise at the rate of inflation. ACU has long opposed minimum wage hikes which lead to greater unemployment and harm those who need work experience the most such as students and opposed this amendment. The amendment failed to advance on March 5, 2021 by a vote of 42-58.
- 11. RC 110 Advancing \$1.9 Trillion in Unnecessary COVID-19 Relief Spending via the "American Rescue Plan" (HR 1319).** This resolution, the so-called American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, unnecessarily plunges the nation trillions of dollars into additional debt under the guise of relief for COVID-19. This massive bill includes \$1,400 checks for all individuals earning under \$75,000 and further extends the \$300 weekly federal unemployment benefits throughout the summer. ACU recognizes this program is rife with fraud and waste. ACU supports the full reopening of the economy, opposes discouraging employment and ruinous deficit spending and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 6, 2021 by a vote of 50-49 and the bill later became law.
- 12. RC 142 Fueling Run-Away Spending by Overriding the Sequester Budget Restraints (HR 1868).** This bill further fuels run-away government spending by overriding the automatic spending cuts to Medicare put in place under the 2011 Budget Control Act, also known as the sequester. Specifically, the bill continues to exempt Medicare from sequestration (2% cut) until 2022 at a cost to taxpayers of \$12.2 billion. The bill contains no other reforms or spending offsets. ACU believes the tea-party era sequester serves as one of the last hopes for fiscal responsibility, opposes Congress's continual action of "kicking the can down the road" at a time when the national debt is set to exceed \$30 trillion and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 25, 2021 by a vote of 90-2 and the bill later became law.

- 13. RC 165 Providing DOJ Bureaucrats Over-Reaching New Authority via the "COVID-19 Hate Crimes Act" (S 937).** The COVID-19 Hate Crimes Act, sponsored by Sen. Mazie Hirono (D-HI, ACUF Lifetime 2%), provides overly broad authority to bureaucrats within the Department of Justice to advance the enforcement of "hate crimes." Under the bill, the DOJ must issue guidance to state and local governments regarding hate crimes and establish online reporting, telephone hotlines and education campaigns. Additionally, the bill establishes new grant programs which direct millions of potentially wasteful spending to local governments and community organizations. ACU believes in equal rights under the law for all and that it is the duty of government to ensure all laws are applied equally. ACU recognizes that "hate crime" statutes violate the double jeopardy clause of U.S. Constitution by allowing individuals to be tried for the same crime twice. ACU opposes providing bureaucrats within the DOJ over-reaching new authority – especially at a time when they are tagging concerned parents as "domestic terrorists" for questioning actions of local school boards – and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 22, 2021 by a vote of 94-1 and the bill later became law.
- 14. RC 175 Repealing Trump Administration Reforms to Draconian Obama-era Methane Emission Mandates (SJR 14).** This resolution, sponsored by Sen. Martin Heinrich (D-NM, ACUF Lifetime 6%), would invoke the Congressional Review Act (CRA) in an attempt to repeal the reforms made by the Trump administration to the draconian methane emission mandates implemented by the Obama administration. Under Obama's EPA countless regulations were imposed on the oil and gas sector which were onerous and unworkable, especially for independent and small producers. ACU supported the Trump administration reforms which provided a better balance of environmental protection while unleashing American energy production and opposed this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on April 28, 2021 by a vote of 52-42 and the Trump administration reforms were overturned.
- 15. RC 206 Protecting the Dignity of Aborted Fetal Remains (S 1260 Amd. 1891).** The Sen. Mike Lee (R-UT, ACUF Lifetime 99%) amendment #1891 to the U.S. Innovation and Competition Act prohibits any activities or research authorized under the bill from utilizing any fetal tissue or body parts that were obtained from an abortion. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions to end the practice and ensure that the human remains from this tragedy be treated with the utmost respect and supported this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on May 25, 2021 by a vote of 48-51.
- 16. RC 210 Growing Government Bureaucracy by Establishing the Foundation for Energy Security and Innovation (S 1260 Amd. 1588).** The Senator Chris Coons (D-DE, ACUF Lifetime 4%) amendment #1588 to the U.S. Innovation and Competition Act unnecessarily expands bureaucracy to advance a Leftist climate agenda. Specifically, the amendment creates a quasi-government non-profit known as the Foundation for Energy Security and Innovation (FESI) which is directed to "accelerate the commercialization of energy technologies" (i.e., "green" energy) and would cost taxpayers \$30 million in 2023 and likely much higher amounts in future years. ACU supports all sources of energy and believes government should not favor one source of energy over another. ACU further believes the real solution to reduce energy costs is to overturn draconian regulations imposed by the Left. ACU opposes expanding government bureaucracy and unnecessarily driving up taxpayer costs and opposed this amendment. The Senate passed the amendment on May 26, 2021 by a vote of 83-14 but the bill was not taken up by the House.
- 17. RC 218 Advancing a Partisan Political Attack Through the Establishment of a January 6th National Commission (HR 3233).** This bill establishes a January 6th national commission which is touted as a tool to investigate the breach of the U.S. Capitol, but instead will be used to conduct a political witch hunt. The commission is given multiple powers, including subpoena power. ACU opposes utilizing taxpayer funds and resources to carry out baseless attacks on political opponents and opposed this bill. The Senate failed to invoke cloture (end debate) on May 28, 2021 by a vote of 54-35 (60 votes were required) and the commission was defeated. However, an illegal January 6th House Committee was established.

- 18. RC 226 Advancing Countless Anti-Competitive and Wasteful Spending Projects via the “U.S. Innovation and Competition Act” (S 1260).** The so-called U.S. Innovation and Competition Act sponsored by Senators Chuck Schumer (D-NY, ACUF Lifetime 5%) and Todd Young (R-IN, ACUF Lifetime 79%), is nearly 2,400 pages in length and expected to cost taxpayers over \$250 billion. The bill authorizes funding for the National Science Foundation and countless special interest initiatives and pet projects of lawmakers. The bill also contains a myriad of protectionist procurement mandates and anti-competitive regulations. ACU opposes wasteful spending and unnecessary regulations that drive up taxpayer and consumer costs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 68-32 but the bill was not taken up by the House.
- 19. RC 227 Subjecting Businesses to Frivolous Litigation via the “Paycheck Fairness Act” (HR 7).** The so-called Paycheck Fairness Act serves as a new mechanism to enrich greedy plaintiff attorneys through frivolous litigation. Under the bill, employers are prohibited from asking about an applicant's salary history and must abide by multiple new mandates when determining wages for prospective employees. Additionally, the resolution forces employers to turn over detailed private wage data to the government. ACU believes employment discrimination is wrong and business that discriminate will face repercussions in the marketplace. However, ACU opposes this measure which has the potential to devastate small businesses by exposing them to lawsuit abuse and opposed this resolution. The Senate failed to invoke cloture (end debate) on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 49-50 (60 votes were required) and the resolution was defeated.
- 20. RC 250 Blocking Federal Interference in the Energy Market (S 1251 Amd. 2119).** The Sen. Mike Lee (R-UT, ACUF Lifetime 99%) amendment #2119 to the so-called Growing Climate Solutions Act would prevent additional government interference within the energy market. Specifically, the amendment would block the underlying bill's “self-certification” program which will inevitably lead to government mandates and a federalized “cap and trade” bureaucracy. Instead, the amendment would allow for the sharing of information voluntarily. ACU opposes additional interference in the energy market and a federalized cap and trade program and supported this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 11-89.
- 21. RC 295 Enacting Conservative Reforms to Reduce Wasteful Infrastructure Spending (HR 3684 Amd. 2255).** The Sen. Mike Lee (R-UT, ACUF Lifetime 99%) amendment #2255 to the infrastructure bill would implement numerous reforms that would allow federal infrastructure projects to be built more quickly and affordably. For example, the bill would repeal the Davis-Bacon Act, reduce and eliminate countless unnecessary regulations and return the national Highway Trust Fund to solvency. As a result of these reforms, the federal gas tax would be reduced by more than eleven cents per gallon. ACU agrees with Sen. Lee that “we can't pour money into a broken pitcher,” supports these critical reforms and supported this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on August 3, 2021 by a vote of 20-78.
- 22. RC 314 Authorizing Countless Wasteful Spending Initiatives via the \$1 Trillion “Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act” (HR 3684).** The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act contains over \$1 trillion dollars in spending, with only a small fraction of the funds directed to actual infrastructure such as roads and bridges. Instead, the bill contains funding for an endless list of liberal priorities such as electric vehicles, green energy and special programs to benefit labor unions. The bill also contains countless new costly regulations (such as automatic emergency braking systems for new vehicles) and various other protectionist mandates. ACU opposes this grab bag of wasteful spending to benefit special interests under the guise of improving the nation's roadways and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on August 10, 2021 by a vote of 69-30 and the bill later became law.
- 23. RC 331 Authorizing States to Provide Tax Cuts Under the American Rescue Plan (SCR 14).** The Sen. Mike Braun (R-IN, ACUF Lifetime 91%) amendment to the congressional budget ensures states can implement tax cuts even if they accepted funds under the American Rescue Plan (ARP). The amendment is in response to a provision within the ARP (roll call #110) that prevents states which receive funds from lowering their taxes in any way through 2024. ACU opposed the ARP, especially the provision designed by radical Leftists to block tax relief and grow the size of government and supported this amendment as a step in the right direction. The Senate adopted the amendment on August 10, 2021 by a vote of 86-13.

- 24. RC 333 Preventing Additional Methane Regulations in the Farming and Ranching Industry (SCR 14 Amd. 3115).** The Sen. Joni Ernst (R-IA, ACUF Lifetime 82%) amendment #3115 to the congressional budget prohibits the implementation of any new federal methane requirements (i.e., “a cow tax”) that would increase the cost of beef or other critical products. Additionally, the amendment prohibits any limitations on the issuance of permits for farmers or ranchers under the Clean Air Act. ACU opposes driving up food costs for all Americans through unnecessary regulations and supported this amendment. The Senate adopted the amendment on August 10, 2021 by a vote of 66-33.
- 25. RC 341 Ensuring Enforcement of Immigration Laws at the Southern Border (SCR 14 Amd. 3795).** The Sen. Jerry Moran (R-KS, ACUF Lifetime 86%) amendment #3795 to the congressional budget ensures enforcement of existing immigration laws during the humanitarian crisis at the southern border. The amendment also requires increased resources for smart and effective border security, to improve asylum processing and to reduce immigration court backlogs. ACU recognizes that at the time of this vote over 200,000 illegal border crossings were attempted in the previous month due to the Biden administrations roll back of immigration laws and failed border policies. ACU supports efforts to strengthen national security and immigration enforcement, especially at a time when tens of thousands of migrants are camped out at the southern border and supported this amendment. The Senate adopted the amendment on August 10, 2021 by a vote of 76-23.
- 26. RC 342 Combatting Critical Race Theory at Public Schools (SCR 14 Amd. 3680).** The Sen. Tom Cotton (R-AR, ACUF Lifetime 86%) amendment #3680 to the congressional budget prevents taxpayer funds from being used to indoctrinate students in grades K-12 with critical race theory (CRT). ACU recognizes that CRT is a tool used by the radical Left to advance division amongst Americans and expand the role of government. ACU believes it is abhorrent to advance this indoctrination and supported this amendment. The Senate adopted the amendment on August 11, 2021 by a vote of 50-49.
- 27. RC 348 Protecting Life by Restricting Abortion Once an Unborn Child is “Pain Capable” at 20 Weeks (SCR 14 Amd. 3758).** The Sen. John Kennedy (R-LA, ACUF Lifetime 83%) amendment #3758 to the congressional budget helps protect life by directing the establishment of penalties for providers who perform elective abortions on unborn children at 20 weeks gestation or later. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on August 11, 2021 by a vote of 48-51.
- 28. RC 350 Protecting Life by Prohibiting Funding of Down-Syndrome Abortion (SCR 14 Amd. 3331).** The Sen. Jim Inhofe (R-OK, ACUF Lifetime 95%) amendment #3331 to the congressional budget helps protect life by prohibiting taxpayer funds from being used to perform an abortion due to the unborn child having down-syndrome. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on August 11, 2021 by a vote of 49-50.
- 29. RC 351 Ensuring Adequate Funding to Deport Illegal Immigrants Convicted of Crime (SCR 14 Amd. 3742).** The Sen. Bill Hagerty (R-TN, ACUF Lifetime 92%) amendment #3742 to the congressional budget ensures that the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement has sufficient resources to detain and deport illegal immigrants who have been convicted of crimes in the United States. The amendment is in response to actions taken by the Biden administration which have drastically reduced deportations to roughly a quarter of the level compared to the previous year. ACU supports efforts to strengthen national security and combat crime in communities and supported this bill. The Senate adopted the amendment on August 10, 2021 by a vote of 53-46.
- 30. RC 352 Defunding Localities which Fail to Prosecute Violent Crime (SCR 14 Amd. 3568).** The Sen. Hyde-Smith (R-MS, ACUF Lifetime 78%) amendment #3568 to the congressional budget helps combat the practices of Leftists and Soros-funded prosecutors who fail to prosecute crime and protect local communities. Specifically, the amendment blocks localities from receiving federal funds under various grant programs if their district attorney prohibits the prosecution of certain violent offenses or serious offenses that result in damage to property or individuals. ACU opposes the Left’s quest to defund the police and promote lawlessness, supports protecting property rights and victims of crime and supported this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on August 10, 2021 by a vote of 47-52.

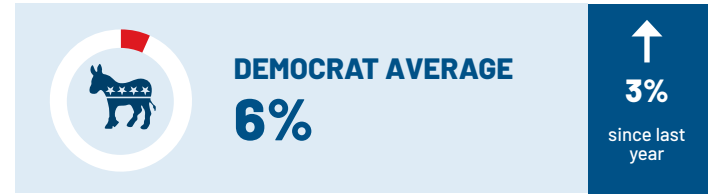
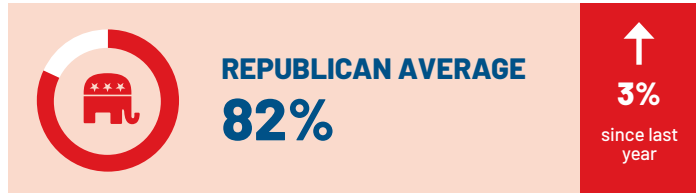
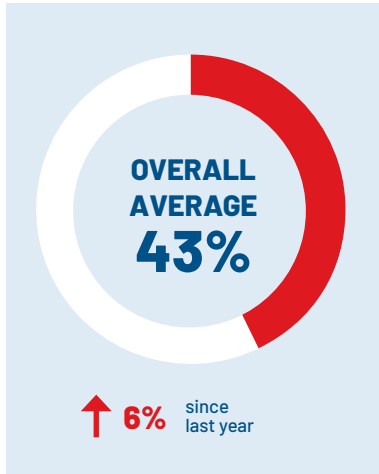
- 31. RC 394 Strengthening National Security by Ensuring Proper Vetting of Afghanistan Refugees (HR 5305 Amd. 3833).** The Sen. Tom Cotton (R-AR, ACUF Lifetime 86%) amendment #3833 to the continuing resolution strengthens national security by ensuring Afghan refugees follow normal vetting procedures prior to receiving REAL ID driver's licenses. Additionally, the amendment establishes a reasonable 18 month limit on the housing, food and medical benefits provided to the refugees. The amendment is in response to the Biden administration's plan to carelessly dole out green cards to refugees and bypass normal vetting procedure. ACU recognizes the Biden administration's disastrously planned Afghanistan withdrawal resulted in countless Americans being left stranded and tens of billions of dollars of weapons and equipment being seized by the Taliban. ACU supports strengthening national security by ensuring the proper vetting of all individuals entering the country and supported this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on September 30, 2021 by a vote of 50-50 (51 votes were required).
- 32. RC 397 Funding Biden's Unconstitutional Vaccine Mandates and Reckless Spending (HR 5305 No. 1).** This is the first continuing resolution (CR) that funds the federal government through early December 2021, including the enforcement of the Biden administration's unconstitutional vaccination mandates on private businesses. The resolution also represents a lost opportunity to force significant spending cuts and combat the ludicrous fiscal agenda of the Biden administration such as "Build Back Better". ACU opposes the Biden administration's attack on individual liberties through vaccination mandates, supports all efforts to reign in the nation's out-of-control spending and nearly \$30 trillion national debt and opposed this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on September 30, 2021 by a vote of 65-35 and the resolution became law.
- 33. RC 411 Fueling Out-of-Control Spending by Raising the Debt Limit (S 1301).** This motion allows the U.S. debt ceiling to be raised by \$480 billion to fund the government through the first week of December 2021. As a result, a major opportunity was lost to rein in out-of-control spending ahead of the November election season and deflate outrageous liberal initiatives such as the multi-trillion dollar "Build Back Better" social welfare package. ACU supports all efforts to rein in the nation's out-of-control spending and nearly \$30 trillion national debt, opposes raising the debt limit without tremendous reforms, and opposed this motion. The Senate voted to invoke cloture (end debate) on October 7, 2021 by a vote of 61-38 and the debt ceiling was raised.
- 34. RC 459 Federalizing State Elections and Weakening Ballot Integrity via the "John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act" (S 4).** The John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act, sponsored by Sen. Pat Leahy (D-VT, ACUF Lifetime 5%), federalizes state elections and makes unelected bureaucrats within the Department of Justice arbiters of election law. Specifically, the bill revives a section of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, which was thrown out by the Supreme Court. This section requires states and localities to get "preclearance" before altering election rules (e.g. implementing fraud reduction measures such as voter-ID). ACU opposes this attempt to federalize state elections and weaken election integrity and opposed this bill. The Senate failed to invoke cloture (end debate) and the bill was defeated on November 3, 2021 by a vote of 50-49 (60 votes were required). Senate Majority Leader Schumer is recorded as opposing the ACU position because his "nay" vote was tactically designed to keep the bill alive.
- 35. HR 5376 Advancing \$1.8 Trillion in New Social Spending via the "Build Back Better Act."** The so-called "Build Back Better" Act is nearly 2,500 pages long and contains nearly every Leftist priority ranging from subsidies for renewable energy to government provided pre-K and childcare to a new federal paid leave program. The bill, which is a signature priority for the Biden Administration, costs \$1.8 trillion and includes numerous tax hikes on corporations and individuals. ACU opposes destroying economic growth and further growing the nation's \$30 trillion national debt and opposed this bill. The bill was never advanced in the Senate due to opposition from Republicans and Senators Joe Manchin (D-WV, ACUF Lifetime 26.55%) and Kyrsten Sinema (D-AZ, ACUF Lifetime 14.59%). All members who voiced opposition were recorded as supporting the ACU position.

- 36. RC 477 Further Funding Biden's Unconstitutional Vaccine Mandates and Reckless Spending (HR 6119 No. 2).** This is the second continuing resolution (CR) that funds the federal government through February 2022, including the enforcement of the Biden administration's unconstitutional vaccination mandates on private businesses. The resolution also represents a lost opportunity to force significant spending cuts and combat the ludicrous fiscal agenda of the Biden administration such as "Build Back Better". ACU opposes the Biden administration's attack on individual liberties through vaccination mandates, supports all efforts to reign in the nation's out-of-control spending and nearly \$30 trillion national debt and opposed this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on December 2, 2021 by a vote of 69-28 and the resolution became law.
- 37. RC 489 Overturning Biden's Unconstitutional Vaccine Mandate on Private Businesses (SJR 29).** This resolution, sponsored by Sen. Mike Braun (R-IN, ACUF Lifetime 91%), would invoke the Congressional Review Act (CRA) in an attempt to repeal the Biden administration's vaccination-or-testing mandate placed on private-sector employers. This mandate under the Department of Labor forces businesses with 100 or more employees to ensure their workers are fully vaccinated against COVID-19 or conduct weekly testing. ACU opposes this attack on individual liberties by unelected bureaucrats within the Biden administration and the enormous regulatory burden and cost placed on the private sector and supported this resolution. The resolution passed the Senate on December 8, 2021 by a vote of 52-48 but the resolution failed to advance in the House. The Supreme Court later ruled the mandate unconstitutional.
- 38. RC 491 Raising the Debt Limit and Fueling Run-Away Spending via the "Protecting Medicare and American Farmers from Sequester Cuts Act" (S 610).** The Protecting Medicare and American Farmers from Sequester Cuts Act, sponsored by Sen. Tim Kaine (D-VA, ACUF Lifetime 3%), further fuels Congress's spending free-for-all by bypassing the filibuster and permitting the debt limit to be raised with only 51 votes in the senate. Additionally, the bill once again overrides the sequester spending cuts applied to Medicare by preventing a 4% statutory cut through 2023 and delaying the other 2% cut through March 31, 2022. ACU believes the tea-party era sequester serves as one of the last hopes for fiscal responsibility, opposes Congress's continual action of "kicking the can down the road" at a time when the national debt is set to exceed \$30 trillion and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on December 9, 2021 by a vote of 59-35 and the bill was signed into law.

U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES STATISTICS



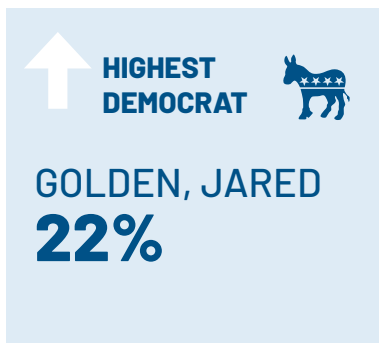
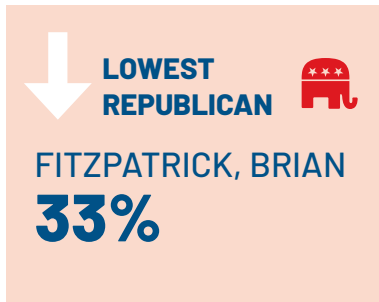
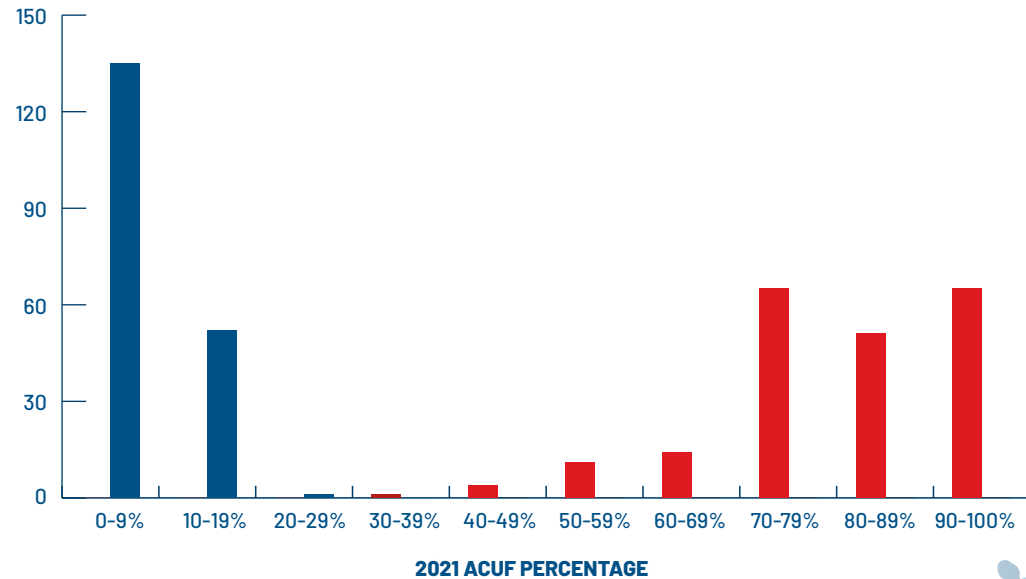
U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONSERVATIVE RATINGS

U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. RC 17 Impeaching President Donald J. Trump – Second Impeachment (HR 24).** This resolution represents Speaker Nancy Pelosi's (D-CA, ACUF Lifetime 3%) and Democratic Majority Leader Chuck Schumer's (D-NY, ACUF Lifetime 5%) second politicized impeachment attack on President Donald J. Trump. This resolution wrongfully alleges that President Trump incited a crowd to breach the Capitol on January 6th and threatened the integrity of the democratic system by highlighting credible cases of vote fraud in the 2020 election. ACU recognizes that on multiple occasions President Trump called for the protests on that day to remain peaceful. ACU further recognizes that at the time of this vote President Trump was a private citizen and this impeachment solely served as a personal political attack to prevent President Trump from seeking a future term and deny him government benefits and Secret Service protection as a private citizen. ACU opposes this partisan attack on the president and opposed this resolution. The House adopted the resolution on January 13, 2021 by a vote of 232-197 but the Senate later acquitted President Trump. This vote is double-weighted due to the egregious nature of the political attack.
- 2. RC 31 Enriching Labor Unions via the "National Apprenticeship Act" (HR 447).** The National Apprenticeship Act of 2021, sponsored by Rep. Bobby Scott (D-VA, ACUF Lifetime 5%), serves as a giveaway to union bosses and includes over \$3.9 billion in new spending over the next five years. The bill also contains numerous provisions that grow federal control over apprenticeship programs and discriminate against non-union apprenticeships. ACU opposes enriching greedy union bosses at the expense of taxpayers and other non-union workers and employers and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 5, 2021 by a vote of 247-173. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 3. RC 39 Expanding Lawsuit Abuse and Attacking Women's Sports via the "Equality Act" (HR 5).** The so-called Equality Act, sponsored by Rep. David Cicilline (D-RI, ACUF Lifetime 5%), serves as a new tool to enrich plaintiff attorneys and attack women's and girl's athletics. Specifically, the bill would expand the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to include sex, sexual orientation and gender identity, thus exposing private businesses to new avenues of frivolous litigation and forcing women to compete against biological males. ACU supports equal rights under the law for all, vehemently opposes discrimination, and recognizes those that do discriminate will face repercussions in the marketplace. ACU opposes this measure which is designed to destroy the institution of women's sports and enrich plaintiff attorneys through frivolous litigation and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 25, 2021 by a vote of 224-206. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 4. RC 45 Waging War on American Energy Production via the "Protecting America's Wilderness and Public Lands Act" (HR 803).** The Protecting America's Wilderness and Public Lands Act, sponsored by Rep. Diana DeGette (D-CO, ACUF Lifetime 4%), combines eight public land bills. This draconian land conservation package wages war on American energy production by blocking mining, oil and natural gas extraction on an additional 1.2 million acres of public land. Furthermore, the bill completely eliminates recreation and responsible forest management on 1.5 million acres of federal land across multiple states. ACU supports growing American energy production, opposes the federal government's enormous holdings and gross mismanagement of public land, and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 26, 2021 by a vote of 227-200. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 5. RC 49 Advancing \$1.9 Trillion in Unnecessary COVID-19 Relief Spending via the "American Rescue Plan" (HR 1319).** This resolution, the so-called American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, unnecessarily plunges the nation trillions of dollars into additional debt under the guise of relief for COVID-19. This massive bill includes \$1,400 checks for all individuals earning under \$75,000 and further extends the \$300 weekly federal unemployment benefits throughout the summer. ACU recognizes this program is rife with fraud and waste. ACU supports the full reopening of the economy, opposes discouraging employment and ruinous deficit spending and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 27, 2021 by a vote of 219-212 and the bill later became law.

- 6. RC 57 Authorizing Children to Vote in Federal Elections to Increase Democrat Political Power (HR 1).** The Rep. Ayanna Pressley (D-MA, ACUF Lifetime 3%) amendment #22 to the “For the People Act” is designed to boost the voting base of the Democratic party by lowering the federal voting age from 18 to 16. ACU recognizes that countless studies have shown brain development and maturity is not reached until an individual reaches their early 20s, hence multiple rights are age restricted including military service (18), and tobacco and alcohol (21). ACU opposes this ploy by Democrats to prey on children who are not yet mature enough to comprehend the outcomes of their policies and opposed this amendment. The House failed to adopt the amendment on March 3, 2021 by a vote of 125-302.
- 7. RC 60 Advancing the Left’s All-Out Attack on the Police via the “George Floyd Justice in Policing Act” (HR 1280).** The George Floyd Justice in Policing Act of 2021, sponsored by Rep. Karen Bass (D-CA, ACUF Lifetime 3%), serves as an all-out attack on law enforcement and would have tremendous negative consequences on local communities and public safety. The bill contains numerous provisions that would expose officers to such great criminal and legal liabilities that they would be unable to properly carry out their duties as public servants. Additionally, the bill would essentially federalize local police departments, while doing nothing to address collective bargaining agreements which protect bad cops by making it nearly impossible to fire them. ACU supports improving government accountability and believes all police misconduct should be investigated and penalized according to the law. ACU opposes the promotion of lawlessness through the leftist notion of “defunding the police,” opposes this measure which harms public safety and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 3, 2021 by a vote of 219-213. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 8. RC 62 Weakening Election Integrity and Infringing Free Speech via the “For the People Act” (HR 1).** The “For the People Act,” sponsored by Rep. John Sarbanes (D-MD, ACUF Lifetime 3%), should be titled as the “For the Politicians Act” as it attempts to improve chances of election victories for Democrat politicians at the federal, state and local levels. The bill contains countless provisions which weaken election integrity and promote vote fraud such as same-day, online and automatic voter registration. The bill also imposes a myriad of new campaign finance disclosure requirements and even makes Election Day a federal holiday. ACU opposes this partisan political ploy which infringes free speech, disenfranchises legitimate voters by increasing the risk of voter fraud and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 3, 2021 by a vote of 220-210. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 9. RC 75 Establishing a Costly and Burdensome Barrier to Exercise Second Amendment Rights via the “Bipartisan Background Checks Act” (HR 8).** The so-called Bipartisan Background Checks Act of 2021, sponsored by Rep. Mike Thompson (D-CA, ACUF Lifetime 7%), would make it more difficult for law-abiding citizens to exercise their Second Amendment rights by mandating “universal” background checks for nearly all private firearm sales and transfers. As a result, individuals privately selling a firearm would be forced to conduct the sale through a federal firearms licensee (FFL) and pay any fees charged by the FFL dealer. ACU recognizes that countless studies have found no correlation between imposing universal background checks and reducing unlawful usage of firearms. These sorts of legislative barriers do nothing to stop criminals from engaging in additional criminal behaviors; they just make it more difficult for law-abiding citizens who are not committing crimes to exercise their constitutional rights. ACU supports the founders’ belief in the Second Amendment, opposes this political attack intended to prevent law-abiding citizens from accessing firearms and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 11, 2021 by a vote of 227-203. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)

- 10. RC 82 Violating the Constitutional Amendment Process in Order to Advance the Long-Expired Equal Rights Amendment (HJ Res. 17).** This resolution, sponsored by Rep. Jackie Speier (D-CA, ACUF Lifetime 4%), seeks to ratify the Left's Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) to the U.S. Constitution by eliminating the 1979 ratification deadline. The ERA has nothing to do with treating individuals equally, but instead is a tool that was introduced by the Left in 1972 to provide judges carte blanche authority to abuse the legal system, including attacking the private sector and providing "rights" to abortions. Proponents of the ERA failed to meet the congressionally established deadline (1979) for ratification by 37 states. In response, this unconstitutional resolution seeks to provide a retroactive 41-year extension. ACU supports the inherent rights of every individual and opposes government discrimination on the basis of characteristics such as sex or race. ACU opposes the revival of the Left's ERA at both the federal and state level and opposed this resolution. The House passed the resolution on March 17, 2021 by a vote of 222-204. (The resolution failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 11. RC 86 Reauthorizing and Expanding Gun Control Measures within the "Violence Against Women Act" (HR 1620).** This bill, sponsored by Rep. Sheila Jackson Lee (D-TX, ACUF Lifetime 5%), would reauthorize the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) and violate Second Amendment rights through the expansion of the program's gun control measures. Specifically, the bill would rescind the Second Amendment rights of individuals with certain misdemeanors, a significant expansion which was previously only applied to individuals with certain felony convictions. Additionally, the bill would prevent a "dating partner" who is subject to restraining orders from purchasing a firearm, another expansion which the law currently only applies to married partners. The bill also contains countless new spending initiatives. ACU opposes this infringement of Second Amendment rights, recognizes VAWA has grown exponentially since its original passage and provides millions of taxpayer dollars to leftist organizations, and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 17, 2021 by a vote of 244-172. (The bill was later passed in a 2022 Omnibus bill.)
- 12. RC 91 Providing Amnesty and Welfare Benefits to Immigrants who Entered the Country Unlawfully via the "American Dream and Promise Act" (HR 6).** The American Dream and Promise Act of 2021, sponsored by Rep. Lucille Roybal-Allard (D-CA, ACUF Lifetime 3%), rewards immigrants who entered the country illegally as minors with amnesty and full access to taxpayer-funded benefits. Under the bill, immigrants who entered the country prior to 2021 when they were supposedly under the age of 18, are provided a pathway to citizenship, including voting rights and eligibility for welfare and subsidized college. The bill even grants amnesty to immigrants with criminal histories (up to two misdemeanor offenses.) While ACU supports expanding economic growth by increasing merit-based immigration we oppose rewarding individuals who entered the country illegally with amnesty and taxpayer-funded benefits and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 18, 2021 by a vote of 228-197. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 13. RC 98 Fueling Run-Away Spending by Overriding the Sequester Budget Restraints (HR 1868).** This bill further fuels run-away government spending by overriding the automatic spending cuts to Medicare put in place under the 2011 Budget Control Act, also known as the sequester. Specifically, the bill continues to exempt Medicare from sequestration (2% cut) until 2022 at a cost to taxpayers of \$12.2 billion. The bill contains no other reforms or spending offsets. ACU believes the tea-party era sequester serves as one of the last hopes for fiscal responsibility, opposes Congress's continual action of "kicking the can down the road" at a time when the national debt is set to exceed \$30 trillion and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 13, 2021 by a vote of 384-38 and the bill later became law.
- 14. RC 108 Subjecting Businesses to Frivolous Litigation via the "Paycheck Fairness Act" (HR 7).** The so-called Paycheck Fairness Act, sponsored by Rep. Rosa DeLauro (D-CT, ACUF Lifetime 4%), serves as a new mechanism to enrich greedy plaintiff attorneys through frivolous litigation. Under the bill, employers are prohibited from asking about an applicant's salary history and must abide by multiple new mandates when determining wages for prospective employees. Additionally, the resolution forces employers to turn over detailed private wage data to the government. ACU believes employment discrimination is wrong and business that discriminate will face repercussions in the marketplace. However, ACU opposes this measure which has the potential to devastate small businesses by exposing them to lawsuit abuse and opposed this resolution. The House passed the bill on April 15, 2021 by a vote of 217-210 but the Senate failed to invoke cloture and advance the bill.

- 15. RC 118 Imposing Excessive New Workplace Regulations via the “Workplace Violence Prevention for Health Care and Social Service Workers Act” (HR 1195).** The Workplace Violence Prevention for Health Care and Social Service Workers Act, sponsored by Rep. Joe Courtney (D-CT, ACUF Lifetime 3%), directs bureaucrats within OSHA to impose new mandates on employers within the health care and social services industries concerning workplace violence prevention. Under the bill, employers will be forced to provide annual training and education to employees, maintain detailed records of workplace violence risk and incidents, and submit annual reports to the government. ACU recognizes businesses are incentivized to maintain safe and productive work environments to retain top talent and profit, opposes empowering unaccountable bureaucrats to saddle businesses with costly unnecessary regulations and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 16, 2021 by a vote of 254-166. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 16. RC 127 Weakening National Security via the “No Travel Ban Act” (HR 1333).** The National Origin-Based Antidiscrimination for Nonimmigrants (NO BAN) Act, sponsored by Rep. Judy Chu (D-CA, ACUF Lifetime 3%), weakens national security by largely stripping the President of the authority to restrict travel from countries due to the addition of “religion” as a protected characteristic under the Immigration and Nationality Act. The bill is in response to President Trump’s efforts to combat terrorist activities by instituting travel bans on the countries of Chad, Iran, Iraq, Libya, North Korea, Syria, Venezuela, and Yemen, which the Left has characterized as a “Muslim ban.” ACU recognizes that nearly every president including Obama and Biden have used this authority to protect our country, opposes the Left’s quest to advance an open borders foreign policy, and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 21, 2021 by a vote of 218-208. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 17. RC 132 Expanding Democratic Political Power through DC Statehood (HR 51).** The Washington, DC Admission Act, sponsored by Rep. Eleanor Holmes Norton (D-DC), is designed to expand the power of the Democrat Party by making the District of Columbia the 51st state. Under the bill, the heavily Democratic-leaning district would be apportioned two senators in the U.S. Senate and one representative in the U.S. House of Representatives. The federal district would be reduced to a small strip of land that would include the U.S. Capitol Building, the White House and the National Mall. ACU recognizes this is purely a political measure to shift the balance of power in Congress by granting a heavily liberal region three new members. ACU further recognizes that if politicians truly cared about representation, they would ask Maryland to follow Virginia’s lead in absorbing its portion of the district that was previously included in the state’s borders. ACU negatively scored DC statehood in our 1993 Ratings of Congress and continues to oppose the political maneuver to empower leftist politicians and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 22, 2021 by a vote of 216-208. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 18. RC 143 Expanding Lawsuit Abuse and Excessive Labor Mandates via the “Pregnant Workers Fairness Act” (HR 1065).** The so-called Pregnant Workers Fairness Act, sponsored by Rep. Jerry Nadler (D-NY, ACUF Lifetime 3%), would subject businesses to lawsuit abuse by imposing a series of excessive workplace mandates on employers. Under the bill, employers with 15 or more employees would be forced to alter operations in order to afford pregnant women a series of expanded benefits including modified work schedules, job restructuring, the acquisition or modification of equipment, and various other requested accommodations. Additionally, employers would be prohibited from placing pregnant employees on leave if there is another “reasonable accommodation” available. ACU recognizes the challenges of choosing life and raising a child but believes this measure will merely empower plaintiffs’ attorneys to pursue frivolous litigation against employers. ACU opposes this excessive government mandate that interferes with private business operations and holds businesses hostage through lawsuit abuse and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 14, 2021 by a vote of 315-101. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)

- 19. RC 145 Providing DOJ Bureaucrats Over-Reaching New Authority via the "COVID-19 Hate Crimes Act" (S 937).** This bill, known as the COVID-19 Hate Crimes Act, provides overly broad authority to bureaucrats within the Department of Justice to advance the enforcement of "hate crimes." Under the bill, the DOJ must issue guidance to state and local governments regarding hate crimes and establish online reporting, telephone hotlines and education campaigns. Additionally, the bill establishes new grant programs which direct millions of potentially wasteful spending to local governments and community organizations. ACU believes in equal rights under the law for all and that it is the duty of government to ensure all laws are applied equally. ACU recognizes that "hate crime" statutes violate the double jeopardy clause of U.S. Constitution by allowing individuals to be tried for the same crime twice. ACU opposes providing bureaucrats within the DOJ over-reaching new authority – especially at a time when they are tagging concerned parents as "domestic terrorists" for questioning actions of local school boards – and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 18, 2021 by a vote of 364-62 (a two-thirds vote was required due to the expedited process) and the bill later became law.
- 20. RC 154 Advancing a Partisan Political Attack Through the Establishment of a January 6th Committee (HR 3233).** This resolution illegally establishes a committee falsely claiming to investigate the breach of the U.S. Capitol. Under House rules, Republican leadership selects members to the committee. But under this resolution, Nancy Pelosi (ACUF x% lifetime) can hand pick anyone she wants. In addition, this so-called committee has subpoena powers and is prohibited from investigating the way Democrats were involved in illegal actions. ACU opposes utilizing taxpayer funds and resources to carry out baseless attacks on political opponents and opposed this bill. The House passed the resolution on May 19, 2021 by a vote of 252-175 and the committee was illegally established.
- 21. RC 182 Hiking Regulatory Costs in the Lending Industry via the "LGBTQ Business Equal Credit Enforcement and Investment Act" (HR 1443).** The so-called LGBTQ Business Equal Credit Enforcement and Investment Act sponsored by Rep. Ritchie Torres (D-NY ACUF Lifetime 3%), saddles banking and lending firms with even greater regulatory costs and serves as yet another tool for plaintiff attorneys to advance frivolous litigation. Specifically, the bill forces financial institutions to collect and report application data regarding LGBTQ owned businesses under the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau's fair lending laws. ACU supports equal rights under the law for all, vehemently opposes discrimination, and recognizes those that do discriminate will face repercussions in the marketplace. ACU opposes this measure which imposes yet another regulatory cost on businesses and is designed to enrich plaintiff attorneys through frivolous litigation and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 252-176. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 22. RC 184 Forcing Taxpayers to Fund Plan B Abortion Inducing Drugs via the "Equal Access to Contraception for Veterans Act" (HR 239).** The so-called Equal Access to Contraception for Veterans Act, sponsored by Rep. Julia Brownley (D-CA, ACUF Lifetime 4%), forces taxpayers to provide free contraceptives to veterans, including "Plan B" or "morning after" pills which induce abortions. ACU has long supported the Hyde Amendment, opposes forcing taxpayers to fund contraceptives and abortion inducing drugs and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 245-181. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 23. RC 185 Repealing Trump Administration Reforms to Draconian Obama-era Methane Emission Mandates (SJR 14).** This resolution would invoke the Congressional Review Act (CRA) in an attempt to repeal the reforms made by the Trump administration to the draconian methane emission mandates implemented by the Obama administration. Under Obama's EPA countless regulations were imposed on the oil and gas sector which were onerous and unworkable, especially for independent and small producers. ACU supported the Trump administration reforms which provided a better balance of environmental protection while unleashing American energy production and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 25, 2021 by a vote of 229-191 following Senate approval and the rule was eliminated.

- 24. RC 186 Fueling Run-Away Spending by Doubling the Budget of the National Science Foundation (HR 2225).** The National Science Foundation for the Future Act, sponsored by Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson (D-TX, ACUF Lifetime 6%), further fuels run-away government spending by more than doubling the budget of the National Science Foundation over the next five years from \$8.5 billion to \$18.3 billion. Much of the new funding would go towards unnecessary initiatives best performed by the private sector, as well as Leftist initiatives such as research in “climate change and environmental sustainability” and “social and economic inequality”. ACU supports cutting and eliminating all unnecessary government initiatives, especially at a time when the national debt is soaring past \$30 trillion and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 28, 2022 by a vote of 345–67 (a two-thirds vote was required due to the expedited process) but the bill failed to advance in the Senate.
- 25. RC 187 Mandating \$50 Billion in New Spending on Climate Change and Unnecessary Initiatives via the “Department of Energy Science for the Future Act” (HR 3593).** The Department of Energy Science for the Future Act, sponsored by Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson (D-TX, ACUF Lifetime 6%), further fuels run-away government spending by providing the Department of Energy’s Office of Science an additional \$50 billion over the next 5 years. The funds will be used for numerous research initiatives best performed by the private sector as well as Leftist projects relating to climate change and energy efficiency. ACU supports cutting and eliminating all unnecessary government initiatives, especially at a time when the national debt is soaring past \$30 trillion and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 28, 2022 by a vote of 351–68 (a two-thirds vote was required due to the expedited process). (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 26. RC 188 Channeling Billions of Taxpayer Funds Overseas for Duplicative Initiatives via the “Global Health Security Act” (HR 391).** The Global Health Security Act of 2021, sponsored by Rep. Gerry Connolly (D-VA, ACUF Lifetime 6%), would force taxpayers to send billions of additional dollars overseas for the creation of yet another international organization – the so-called Global Health Security Agenda Interagency Review Council. The council will supposedly be made up of 30 countries and advance global health and pandemic preparedness. ACU recognizes the U.S. already funds countless international organizations already performing these initiatives including the World Health Organization (WHO), the Global Health Security Initiative (GHSI), the Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations (CEPI), The Vaccine Alliance, and dozens of entities run by the United Nations. ACU supports an America First Agenda and President Trump’s actions to withdrawal the U.S. from corrupt international entities such as the WHO, opposes channeling even more taxpayer funds overseas to failed and duplicative initiatives and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 28, 2021 by a vote of 307–112 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate.
- 27. RC 217 Imposing Excessive Regulations within the Chemical Industry via the “PFAS Action Act” (HR 2467).** The PFAS Action Act of 2021, sponsored by Rep. Debbie Dingell (D-MI, ACUF Lifetime 2%), places overreaching regulations on chemical compounds that are used in thousands of consumer products including cookware, food packaging and firefighting. Specifically, the bill designates two PFAS compounds (PFOA and PFOS) as “hazardous substances” and directs the EPA to potentially designate over 7,800 other PFAS compounds as hazardous. ACU recognizes that government has a role in protecting the public against the harm of dangerous chemicals; however, ACU believes government action should be based on sound scientific data that demonstrate a legitimate risk to public health and safety, opposes this bill’s hasty and heavy-handed regulations that ultimately enrich plaintiffs’ attorneys and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on July 21, 2021 by a vote of 241–183. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)

- 28. RC 282 Weakening National Security by Blocking Nuclear Weapon Modernization (HR 4350).** The Rep. John Garamendi (D-CA, ACUF Lifetime 4%) amendment #117 to the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) would severely jeopardize national security by blocking funding for nuclear weapon modernization initiatives. Specifically, the bill would prohibit funding for the Ground Based Strategic Deterrent Program and the W87-1 warhead modification program, which are replacing the nearly 50-year-old Minuteman III Intercontinental ballistic missile system. ACU firmly believes in President Ronald Reagan's "peace through strength" doctrine, supports strengthening our national security by ensuring our military is as strong and prepared as possible, especially at a time when China is deploying an enormous new nuclear arsenal, and opposed this amendment. The House failed to adopt the amendment on September 23, 2021 by a vote of 118-299.
- 29. RC 284 Cutting National Defense to Expand Leftist Welfare Initiatives (HR 4350).** The Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez (D-NY, ACUF Lifetime 3%) amendment #119 to the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) would enact an across the board 10% cut (\$78 billion) to the defense budget, with the exception of military personnel. According to Rep. Ocasio-Cortez's testimony, the funds should be used to expand Leftist welfare initiatives relating to affordable housing, healthcare, unemployment and COVID-19. While ACU supports eliminating waste in all functions of government, we firmly believe in President Ronald Reagan's "peace through strength" doctrine, oppose redirecting funding to wasteful leftist welfare initiatives and opposed this amendment. The House failed to adopt the amendment on September 23, 2021 by a vote of 86-332.
- 30. RC 295 Codifying Roe v. Wade and Providing a "Right" to Abortion at Any Stage via the "Women's Health Protection Act" (HR 3755).** The so-called Women's Health Protection Act of 2021, sponsored by Rep. Judy Chu (D-CA, ACUF Lifetime 3%), represents one of the most extreme attacks on the lives of the unborn. Specifically, the bill codifies Roe v. Wade into law while establishing a "right" to abortion on demand nationwide and at any stage of pregnancy. The bill would also force taxpayers, employers and insurers to pay for abortion and eliminate nearly every limitation or requirement put in place by any of the 50 states. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on September 24, 2021 by a vote of 218-211 but the bill was later filibustered in the Senate.
- 31. RC 311 Funding Biden's Unconstitutional Vaccine Mandates and Reckless Spending (HR 5305).** This is the first continuing resolution (CR) that funds the federal government through early December 2021, including the enforcement of the Biden administration's unconstitutional vaccination mandates on private businesses. The resolution also represents a lost opportunity to force significant spending cuts and combat the ludicrous fiscal agenda of the Biden administration such as "Build Back Better". ACU opposes the Biden administration's attack on individual liberties through vaccination mandates, supports all efforts to reign in the nation's out-of-control spending and nearly \$30 trillion national debt and opposed this resolution. The House passed the bill on September 30, 2021 by a vote of 254-175 and the bill became law.
- 32. RC 318 Increasing Unnecessary Government Spending in the Pharmaceutical Industry (HR 4369).** The National Centers of Excellence in Advanced and Continuous Pharmaceutical Manufacturing Act of 2021, sponsored by Rep. Frank Pallone (D-NJ, ACUF Lifetime 9%), rams through \$100 million in unnecessary spending within the pharmaceutical industry. The funds are to be doled out to institutions of higher education to "support the development and implementation of continuous pharmaceutical manufacturing." ACU recognizes higher education subsidies represent one of the largest transfers of wealth from lower-income individuals to higher-income individuals. ACU believes the private sector is the best institution to advance and fund this research, opposes socializing these costs onto taxpayers, and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on October 19, 2021 by a vote of 368-56 (a two-thirds vote was required due to the expedited process). (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 33. RC 355 Expressing Support for a Free Cuba and Condemning the Communist Regime (HR 760).** This resolution, sponsored by Rep. Debbie Wasserman Schultz (D-FL, ACUF Lifetime 2%), express solidarity with Cuban citizens demonstrating peacefully for fundamental freedoms and condemns the communist Cuban regime. In July, thousands of Cubans took to the streets to express their dissatisfaction, and multiple additional demonstrations took place across the United States. During this time CPAC held a Cuba Libre event at the U.S. Capitol where multiple advocates for freedom spoke, including Leader Kevin McCarthy (R-CA, ACUF Lifetime 84.93%). ACU condemns all communist and authoritarian governments, supports a free Cuba and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on November 3, 2021 by a vote 382-40 (a two-thirds vote was required due to the expedited process.)

- 34. RC 369 Authorizing Countless Wasteful Spending Initiatives via the \$1 Trillion "Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act" (HR 3684).** The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act contains over \$1 trillion dollars in spending, with only a small fraction of the funds directed to actual infrastructure such as roads and bridges. Instead, the bill contains funding for an endless list of liberal priorities such as electric vehicles, green energy and special programs to benefit labor unions. The bill also contains countless new costly regulations (such as automatic emergency braking systems for new vehicles) and various other protectionist mandates. ACU opposes this grab bag of wasteful spending to benefit special interests under the guise of improving the nation's roadways and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on November 5, 2021 by a vote of 228-206 and the bill later became law. (Members of "The Squad" who opposed the bill for not including even greater spending were recorded as opposing the ACU position.)
- 35. RC 385 Advancing \$1.8 Trillion in New Social Spending via the "Build Back Better Act" (HR 5376).** The so-called "Build Back Better" Act is nearly 2,500 pages long and contains nearly every Leftist priority ranging from subsidies for renewable energy to government provided pre-K and childcare to a new federal paid leave program. The bill, which is a signature priority for the Biden Administration, costs \$1.8 trillion and includes numerous tax hikes on corporations and individuals. ACU opposes destroying economic growth and further growing the nation's \$30 trillion national debt and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on November 19, 2021 by a vote of 220-213. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 36. RC 388 Advancing a \$400 Million Government Vaccine Tracking System via the "Immunization Infrastructure Modernization Act" (HR 550).** The Immunization Infrastructure Modernization Act of 2021, sponsored by Rep. Ann Kuster (D-NH, ACUF Lifetime 5%), serves as a slippery slope to a creeping Federal Vaccine Database. The bill authorizes \$400 million to fund a "confidential, population-based, computerized database that records immunization doses administered by any health care provider to persons within the geographic area covered by that database." ACU supports strong privacy rights, opposes the surveillance state and government tracking of vaccination status which may be used to infringe individual liberties and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on November 30, 2021 by a vote of 294-130 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate.
- 37. RC 404 Raising the Debt Limit and Fueling Run-Away Spending via the "Protecting Medicare and American Farmers from Sequester Cuts Act" (S 610).** The so-called Protecting Medicare and American Farmers from Sequester Cuts Act further fuels Congress's spending free-for-all by bypassing the filibuster and permitting the debt limit to be raised with only 51 votes in the senate. Additionally, the bill once again overrides the sequester spending cuts applied to Medicare by preventing a 4% statutory cut through 2023 and delaying the other 2% cut through March 31, 2022. ACU believes the tea-party era sequester serves as one of the last hopes for fiscal responsibility, opposes Congress's continual action of "kicking the can down the road" at a time when the national debt is set to exceed \$30 trillion and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on December 7, 2021 by a vote of 222-212 and the bill was signed into law.
- 38. RC 420 Expanding Government Bureaucracy via the "Oral Health Literacy and Awareness Act" (HR 4555).** The Oral Health Literacy and Awareness Act of 2021, sponsored by Rep. Tony Cardenas (D-CA, ACUF Lifetime 6%), further grows the role of government by expanding the Public Health Service Act to include "oral health literacy and awareness" in public education campaigns. ACU recognizes that there are countless initiatives already being conducted at the state and local levels surrounding oral health. ACU believes the private sector and charitable organizations are best equipped to solve these issues, opposes further expanding the size and scope of government and opposed this bill. The House passed the resolution on December 8, 2021 by a vote of 369-58 (a two-thirds vote was required due to the expedited process). (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
