ABOUT THE CENTER FOR LEGISLATIVE ACCOUNTABILITY

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the American Conservative Union Foundation (ACUF), is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area. In addition to ACUF's Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC), the largest gathering of conservatives in the world, the CLA develops conservative policy solutions and educates everyday citizens and activists on the proper role of government. In 1971, ACUF launched its *Ratings of Congress* to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress.

The Ratings quickly became considered the "gold standard" and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles. In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, *Ratings of the States* grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers.

Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America's federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

METHODOLOGY

The CLA's Ratings of Congress and the States illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. When determining a position on a particular issue, the CLA begins by defining conservatism: the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person. Then, we apply the founders' belief that the proper role of government is to protect Life, Liberty and Property.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

Each lawmaker is evaluated on a zero to 100 scale, with a score of 100 representing a voting record that is perfectly aligned with conservative principles. Officials who earn a score of 90% or higher are presented with the CLA's highest honor, the Award for Conservative Excellence, while those who earn a score of 80% or higher, but less than 90%, are presented with the Award for Conservative Achievement. Additionally, any lawmaker who earns a score of 10% or lower qualifies for the ACUF's Coalition of the Radical Left.

ANNUAL METRICS







To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31. Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected. The CLA provides a score for each legislative chamber, which is based upon the average scores of all members within that respective chamber. A legislature's overall score is calculated by averaging each state's two legislative chambers together in order to better reflect the differences in political power between the chambers. (The exception being Nebraska, the nation's only unicameral legislature comprising a single legislative chamber, on which the state's overall score is based.)







WISCONSIN SENATE CONSERVATIVE RATINGS

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WISCONSIN SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. SJR 3 Restoring Individual Liberties by Ending the Governor's COVID-19 State of Emergency. This joint resolution, that does not require the governor's signature, helps restore individual liberties by ending Wisconsin's state of emergency. Specifically, the resolution ends the state of emergency called by the governor, which should have expired after 60 days, and ends any orders given by the governor after May 11, 2020. The renewed state of emergency of January 19, 2021, which the legislature asserts is unconstitutional, is also ended. ACU believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good, supports efforts to combat abuse of power by government officials and supported this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on January 26, 2021 by a vote of 18-13. (The Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled the emergency declaration unlawful on March 31, 2021.)
- 2. SB 16 Protecting Children who Survive Abortion. This bill protects infants born alive after an attempted abortion by requiring the attending physician to provide the same care that would be given to any other child born alive. This bill outlines the care that must be given to a baby born alive after an abortion and stipulates that a health care provider who fails to provide the appropriate care would be guilty of a Class H felony. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on September 28, 2021 by a vote of 19-12 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 3. AB 32 Expanding Consumer Choice by Permitting the Sale of Cocktails To-Go. This bill slightly expands individual liberties by allowing the sale of to-go alcoholic beverages from licensed establishments such as restaurants, taverns and wineries. ACU supports a freer market in the alcoholic beverage and food service industry, supports expanding consumer choice and eliminating unnecessary and anti-competitive regulations and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The Senate passed the bill on March 23, 2021 by a vote of 28-2 and the bill was signed into law.
- 4. SB 39 Expanding Opportunities for Charter School Students to Participate in Athletics. This bill would expand extra-curricular opportunities for virtual charter school students by allowing them to participate in public school athletics. Specifically, the bill allows students in a virtual charter school to participate in interscholastic athletics and extracurricular activities in the student's resident school district. ACU supports school choice, opposes discrimination against school choice students and barring them from participating in public sports and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 16, 2021 by a vote of 20-12 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 5. AB 59 Strengthening School Choice by Expanding Eligibility for the School Choice Voucher Program. This bill helps expand school choice by increasing the income eligibility threshold for the school choice voucher program. Under current law, families with incomes up to 220% of the federal poverty level are eligible for school vouchers, while this bill increases the threshold to 300%. ACU supports improving educational outcomes by responsibly expanding school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 20-12 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 6. SB 119 Promoting Public Safety by Defunding Localities that Defund their Police Force. This bill helps combat the practices of radical Leftist localities that defund their police forces. Under the bill, the state's shared revenue municipal aid payments are reduced by the same amount that a local government defunds its law enforcement. ACU opposes the Left's quest to defund the police and promote lawlessness, supports protecting property rights and victims of crime and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 20-12 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 7. AB 121 (Taylor Amd.) Forcing Hair Braiders to Register with the State (Motion to Defeat). The Taylor (ACUF Lifetime 11%) amendment #3 to a bill deregulating hair braiding adds a new provision which forces individuals who braid hair to provide the Board of Cosmetology their contact information. ACU supports the complete deregulation of hair braiding, opposes this unnecessary mandate which weakens privacy protections and opposed this amendment. The Senate voted to defeat the amendment on June 23, 2021 by a vote of 20-10. (A "Yes" vote supported the ACU position.)




- 8. AB 173 Strengthening Election Integrity by Prohibiting Private Funds for Election Administration. This bill strengthens election integrity by helping ensure outside donors do not influence the administrations of elections. Under the bill, county and municipal authorities may not apply for or accept contributions from a private individual or any non-governmental authority to help with the administration of elections. The bill is in response to individuals such as Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg who in the 2020 election channeled over \$400 million through his nonprofit groups to influence the operation of local election offices. ACU supports efforts to strengthen the integrity of our elections and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 18-14 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 9. SB 183 Enacting a Legislative Check on Executive Branch Expenditure of Federal COVID-19 Relief Funds. This bill places a critical legislative check on the expenditure of federal COVID-19 relief funds provided under the American Rescue Plan. Under the bill, the Joint Committee on Finance would approve the Governor's plan on expenditure of funds. ACU supports efforts to increase government transparency and protect against the misuse of taxpayer funds and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 23, 2021 by a vote of 18-12 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 10. AB 191 Expanding Economic Growth by Eliminating the State's Personal Property Tax. The bill expands economic growth by eliminating the personal property tax imposed on businesses. The bill also provides aid payments to local governments to compensate for the loss of the property tax revenue. ACU supports expanding economic growth through broadly provided tax relief and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 30, 2021 by a vote of 20-12 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 11. SB 204 Strengthening Election Integrity Through Voter ID for Absentee Ballots. This bill strengthens election integrity by requiring absentee voters to show a voter ID prior to receiving an absentee ballot. Additionally, the bill makes it a felony to use the indefinitely confined voter status to bypass the voter ID requirements. ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 18-14 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 12. SB 210 Strengthening Election Integrity by Providing Poll Watchers Greater Access. This bill strengthens election integrity by permitting credentialed poll watchers to be within 3 feet of election material processing and examination. ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 14, 2021 by a vote of 20-11 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 13. SB 212 Strengthening Election Integrity by Prohibiting Election Officials from Filling in Ballot Information. This bill strengthens election integrity by prohibiting anyone other than the voter or a witness from correcting an error on an absentee ballot. ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchise eligible voters, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 11, 2021 by a vote of 20-13 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 14. AB 232 Utilizing Extra Federal COVID-19 Relief Funds to Provide \$1 Billion in Property Tax Relief. This bill utilizes extra federal COVID-19 relief funds under the American Rescue Plan (ARP) to provide \$1 billion in much needed property tax relief. The bill also contains a work-around as the ARP contains an outrageous provision (which ACU scored in its Ratings of Congress) that prevents funds from being used to provide tax relief. ACU supports utilizing extra COVID-19 relief funds to provide much needed property tax relief and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 14, 2021 by a vote of 18-13 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 15. SB 259 Imposing Excessive New Licensing Mandates on Genetic Counselors. This bill mandates that anyone who serves as a "genetic counselor" obtain a license under a newly established licensing regime. Additionally, the bill enriches a private entity (American Board of Genetic Counseling) by mandating certification (a fee of \$900, plus continual renewal fees) as well as educational institutions who heavily lobbied the bill. ACU opposes excessive licensing mandates which restrict competition and drive-up costs and are primarily designed to enrich private entities and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on September 28, 2021 by a vote of 29-2 and the bill was signed into law.




- 16. AB 314 Expanding Cronyism by Socializing \$5 Million in Export Promotion Costs for the Dairy, Meat and Agricultural Industries. This bill expands cronyism by establishing a new agricultural exports program which forces taxpayers to spend \$5 million to supposedly "increase the value of the state's milk, poultry, fish and meat product exports by 25%" within the next five years. ACU believes unleashing the free market not expanding government intervention is the best way to direct investment and expand economic growth and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on November 8, 2021 by a vote of 33-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 17. AB 336 Returning Wisconsinites to the Workforce by Ending Enhanced Federal Unemployment Benefits. This bill is designed to encourage individuals to return to the workforce by ending the supplemental federal unemployment insurance program. Specifically, the bill would end the \$300 weekly unemployment bonus claimants receive from the federal government. The bill also restored work-search requirements for unemployment insurance that had been abandoned during the pandemic. ACU believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good, supports reopening the economy by encouraging individuals to return to the workforce and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 20-12 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 18. SB 463 Strengthening Government Accountability Through Public School Curriculum Transparency. This bill strengthens government accountability by providing public school parents greater access to current and proposed teaching materials. Under the bill, school boards must maintain all information about learning materials and educational activities on their publicly available website. ACU supports increasing government accountability and transparency by ensuring parents have full access to all educational material and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on September 28, 2021 by a vote of 19-12 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 19. SB 503 Protecting Life by Defunding Abortion Providers such as Planned Parenthood. This bill protects life by prohibiting the Department of Health Services from certifying any private entity under the Medicaid assistance program if they provide abortions. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on October 20, 2021 by a vote of 20-11 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 20. SB 570 Protecting Firearm Manufacturers from Frivolous Litigation. This bill helps protects firearm manufacturers and dealers from frivolous litigation due to criminal actions by third parties that are outside of their control. Specifically, the bill establishes a state liability shield covering firearms, firearm accessories and ammunition. While these protections exist under federal law, these protections have come under attack by the Biden administration. ACU supports the founder's belief in the Second Amendment, opposes Leftist attempts to shut down firearm manufacturing and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on November 8, 2021 by a vote of 21-12 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 21. SB 591 Protecting Life by Requiring Disclosure of Abortion Reversal Options. This bill would help protect the lives of unborn children by improving the information provided to women considering abortion. Specifically, the bill would require that a patient, who is using a drug regimen that includes mifepristone, misoprostol, or methotrexate to induce an abortion, be informed that the abortion-inducing drug regimen may not result in an immediate abortion the woman may be able to continue the pregnancy. The patient would also receive contact information for resources and health care professionals that assist women in counteracting the effects of the drug and continuing their pregnancies. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and informing patients and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on October 20, 2021 by a vote of 20-11 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 22. SB 593 Protecting Life by Banning Discriminatory Abortions Based on Disability, Sex, or Race. This bill protects the lives on unborn children by prohibiting the abortion, or attempted abortion, of an unborn child if the person performing the abortion knows the abortion is being obtained because of certain characteristics of the unborn child. These include sex, race, color, national origin, ancestry, or a congenital disability diagnosis or Down syndrome diagnosis. The women seeking the abortion would not face penalties. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on October 20, 2021 by a vote of 20-11 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.



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WISCONSIN ASSEMBLY VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. SJR 3 Restoring Individual Liberties by Ending the Governor's COVID-19 State of Emergency. This joint resolution, that does not require the governor's signature, helps restore individual liberties by ending Wisconsin's state of emergency. Specifically, the resolution ends the state of emergency called by the governor, which should have expired after 60 days, and ends any orders given by the governor after May 11, 2020. The renewed state of emergency of January 19, 2021, which the legislature asserts is unconstitutional, is also ended. ACU believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good, supports efforts to combat abuse of power by government officials and supported this resolution. The Assembly passed the resolution on January 28, 2021 by a vote of 52-42. (The Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled the emergency declaration unlawful on March 31, 2021.)
- 2. AR 16 Joining the State into a Federal Lawsuit to Allow Tax Relief Under the American Rescue Plan. This resolution directs the attorney general to join the state as a plaintiff in State of West Virginia v. U.S. Department of the Treasury. The lawsuit challenges a provision within the federal American Rescue Plan which prohibits states from reducing taxes for 3 years if they receive federal funds. ACU negatively scored the American Rescue Plan in our Ratings of Congress, supports providing tax relief and supported this resolution. The Assembly passed the resolution on April 13, 2021 by a vote of 56-36.
- 3. SB 16 Protecting Children who Survive Abortion. This bill protects infants born alive after an attempted abortion by requiring the attending physician to provide the same care that would be given to any other child born alive. This bill outlines the care that must be given to a baby born alive after an abortion and stipulates that a health care provider who fails to provide the appropriate care would be guilty of a Class H felony. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on October 27, 2021 by a vote of 55-38 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 4. AR 18 Strengthening National Security by Urging the Governor to Support Federal Immigration Enforcement Efforts. This resolution seeks to bolster border security and is largely in response to the Biden Administration's reckless open border policies which have led to a migrant crisis and a flood of illegal immigration all across the country. Specifically, the resolution formally requests the Governor of Wisconsin to send aid and resources to the U.S.-Mexico border to assist with the influx of individuals crossing the border illegally. ACU opposes the audacious open border policies of the Biden Administration which are severely jeopardizing national security, supports assisting the federal government in its constitutional role to enforce our nation's immigration laws and supported this resolution. The Assembly passed the resolution on May 11, 2021 by a vote of 59-35.
- 5. AB 23 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Banning Government-Imposed Vaccine Mandates. This bill strengthens individual liberties by prohibiting any state or local health official from requiring an individual to receive a COVID-19 vaccine. ACU supports strengthening individual liberties and placing a check on the powers of unelected bureaucrats and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on March 23, 2021 by a vote of 60-33 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 6. AB 24 Protecting Religious Liberties during the COVID-19 Pandemic. This bill helps protect religious liberties by prohibiting any local health officer from forbidding a gathering at a place of worship due to the COVID-19 pandemic. ACU believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good, supports strengthening religious liberties and supported this resolution. The Assembly passed the bill on March 23, 2021 by a vote of 61-33 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 7. AB 34 Maintaining High Health Care Costs by Preserving Obamacare. This bill prevents consumers from obtaining cheaper health care policies by codifying into state law major provisions of the Affordable Care Act (Obamacare), in the event it is repealed at the federal level. The bill stipulates that every insurer must accept every individual and employer who applies for coverage, regardless of an individual's preexisting condition, as well as prohibits insurers from establishing limits on benefits. ACU has long opposed Obamacare, which has sent health care costs skyrocketing, opposes its mandates which prevent individuals from obtaining more affordable health care by selecting the plan that best fits their needs and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on March 16, 2021 by a vote of 92-0. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)



- 8. SB 39 Expanding Opportunities for Charter School Students to Participate in Athletics. This bill would expand extra-curricular opportunities for virtual charter school students by allowing them to participate in public school athletics. Specifically, the bill allows students in a virtual charter school to participate in interscholastic athletics and extracurricular activities in the student's resident school district. ACU supports school choice, opposes discrimination against school choice students and barring them from participating in public sports and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on March 23, 2021 by a vote of 58-35 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 9. AB 59 Strengthening School Choice by Expanding Eligibility for the School Choice Voucher Program. This bill helps expand school choice by increasing the income eligibility threshold for the school choice voucher program. Under current law, families with incomes up to 220% of the federal poverty level are eligible for school vouchers, while this bill increases the threshold to 300%. ACU supports improving educational outcomes by responsibly expanding school choice and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on May 11, 2021 by a vote of 60-36 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 10. SB 70 Increasing Transparency of State Revenue and Spending. This bill improves the ability of citizens to hold their local governments accountable by requiring the Department of Revenue to publish online a publicly accessible overview of the amounts of revenue collected and how the revenue is spent. ACU supports improving transparency at all levels of government, especially when it concerns taxpayer funds, and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 22, 2021 by a vote of 98-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 11. SB 119 Promoting Public Safety by Defunding Localities that Defund their Police Force. This bill helps combat the practices of radical Leftist localities that defund their police forces. Under the bill, the state's shared revenue municipal aid payments are reduced by the same amount that a local government defunds its law enforcement. ACU opposes the Left's quest to defund the police and promote lawlessness, supports protecting property rights and victims of crime and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 22, 2021 by a vote of 61-37 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 12. AB 121 Exempting Hair Braiders from Draconian Cosmetology Licensure Requirements. This bill slightly reduces draconian regulations that govern the practice of cosmetology in Wisconsin. Under the bill, hair braiders are no longer regulated as cosmetologists, thereby permitting them to work without being forced to obtain a cosmetology license which requires individuals to complete a course of instruction approved by the Cosmetology Examining Board, pass a written and practical exam, and acquire 1,550 hours of continuous study. ACU supports the elimination of the Cosmetology Examining Board, opposes the proliferation of licensing requirements that reduce available services, raise consumer costs and are primarily designed to restrict competition and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The Assembly passed the bill on March 17, 2021 by a vote of 88-5 and the bill was signed into law.
- 13. AB 173 Strengthening Election Integrity by Prohibiting Private Funds for Election Administration. This bill strengthens election integrity by helping ensure outside donors do not influence the administrations of elections. Under the bill, county and municipal authorities may not apply for or accept contributions from a private individual or any non-governmental authority to help with the administration of elections. The bill is in response to individuals such as Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg who in the 2020 election channeled over \$400 million through his nonprofit groups to influence the operation of local election offices. ACU supports efforts to strengthen the integrity of our elections and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on May 11, 2021 by a vote of 60-36 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 14. SB 183 Enacting a Legislative Check on Executive Branch Expenditure of Federal COVID-19 Relief Funds. This bill places a critical legislative check on the expenditure of federal COVID-19 relief funds provided under the American Rescue Plan. Under the bill, the Joint Committee on Finance would approve the Governor's plan on expenditure of funds. ACU supports efforts to increase government transparency and protect against the misuse of taxpayer funds and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on March 23, 2021 by a vote of 59-36 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 15. AB 191 Expanding Economic Growth by Eliminating the State's Personal Property Tax. The bill expands economic growth by eliminating the personal property tax imposed on businesses. The bill also provides aid payments to local governments to compensate for the loss of the property tax revenue. ACU supports expanding economic growth through broadly provided tax relief and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 29, 2021 by a vote of 64-34 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.



- 16. AB 195 Protecting Women's Athletics from Competition with Men. This bill protects the institution of women's athletics by requiring the University of Wisconsin and technical college sports and athletics to maintain separate competition for female and male students. Under the bill, athletic teams must be designated as male, female, or co-ed, based on a participants sex at birth. As a result, biological males who identify as females or vice-versa may not compete with individuals of a different sex, unless the competition is labeled co-ed. ACU believes people should be treated with dignity and respect and have the same opportunities under the law. ACU also recognizes that there are numerous standard classifications in sports (such as weight, wage, etc.) to ensure fair competition. Therefore, ACU supports ensuring fair competition among teams competing across the state and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 16, 2021 by a vote of 59-38. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 17. SB 204 Strengthening Election Integrity Through Voter ID for Absentee Ballots. This bill strengthens election integrity by requiring absentee voters to show a voter ID prior to receiving an absentee ballot. Additionally, the bill makes it a felony to use the indefinitely confined voter status to bypass the voter ID requirements. ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 22, 2021 by a vote of 60-38 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 18. SB 210 Strengthening Election Integrity by Providing Poll Watchers Greater Access. This bill strengthens election integrity by permitting credentialed poll watchers to be within 3 feet of election material processing and examination. ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 22, 2021 by a vote of 60-38 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 19. SB 212 Strengthening Election Integrity by Prohibiting Election Officials from Filling in Ballot Information. This bill strengthens election integrity by prohibiting anyone other than the voter or a witness from correcting an error on an absentee ballot. ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchise eligible voters, and supported this bill. The Assembly supported the bill on June 22, 2021 by a vote of 60-38 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 20. AB 232 Utilizing Extra Federal COVID-19 Relief Funds to Provide \$1 Billion in Property Tax Relief. This bill utilizes extra federal COVID-19 relief funds under the American Rescue Plan (ARP) to provide \$1 billion in much needed property tax relief. The bill also contains a work-around as the ARP contains an outrageous provision (which ACU scored in its Ratings of Congress) that prevents funds from being used to provide tax relief. ACU supports utilizing extra COVID-19 relief funds to provide much needed property tax relief and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on April 13, 2021 by a vote of 57-37 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 21. AB 293 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights by Prohibiting Enforcement of Federal Gun Control. This bill strengthens Second Amendment rights by prohibiting the enforcement of certain federal gun control laws imposed after January 1, 2021. Specifically, the bill prohibits state agencies and local governments from enforcing firearm confiscation, registration of firearms, magazine capacity mandates, and the ban of certain semi-automatic firearms. ACU supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 61-36 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 22. AB 314 Expanding Cronyism by Socializing \$5 Million in Export Promotion Costs for the Dairy, Meat and Agricultural Industries. This bill expands cronyism by establishing a new agricultural exports program which forces taxpayers to spend \$5 million to supposedly "increase the value of the state's milk, poultry, fish and meat product exports by 25%" within the next five years. ACU believes unleashing the free market not expanding government intervention is the best way to direct investment and expand economic growth and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on October 26, 2021 by a vote of 95-0 and the bill was signed into law.



- 23. AB 336 Returning Wisconsinites to the Workforce by Ending Enhanced Federal Unemployment Benefits. This bill is designed to encourage individuals to return to the workforce by ending the supplemental federal unemployment insurance program. Specifically, the bill would end the \$300 weekly unemployment bonus claimants receive from the federal government. The bill also restored work-search requirements for unemployment insurance that had been abandoned during the pandemic. ACU believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good, supports reopening the economy by encouraging individuals to return to the workforce and supported this bill. The Assembly sustained the governor's veto of the bill on July 27, 2021 by a vote of 59-37 (a two-thirds vote was required to override the veto).
- 24. AB 411 Combatting Critical Race Theory and Leftist Indoctrination at Schools. This bill is designed to ensure students receive instruction on core subject areas and prevent classrooms from being used to indoctrinate students with Leftist ideals, such as critical race theory (CRT). Under the bill, teachers would be prohibited from teachings pupils that one race or sex is inherently superior to another or that one race or sex bears responsibility for acts committed in the past by other people. The bill bars schools from requiring employees to attend training that promotes race or sex stereotyping and requires each school board to post all curricula used in the school district on the district's website. ACU recognizes that CRT is a tool used by the radical Left to advance division amongst Americans and expand the role of government. ACU believes it is abhorrent to advance this indoctrination on young students and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on September 28, 2021 by a vote of 60-38 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 25. AB 414 Prohibiting Tax Dollars from Being Spent to Provide Critical Race Theory Training to Government Employees. This bill prohibits taxpayer funds from being used to enrich leftist groups to provide government employees "implicit bias" or critical race theory trainings. The bill applies to both state and local government employees and ensures no training may be provided which places any form of blame or judgment on the basis of race or sex. ACU believes all government work environments should be safe, respectful and managed to ensure maximum productivity. ACU opposes enriching Leftist providers of these services, which sow division and disrupt employee work and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on September 28, 2021 by a vote of 60-38 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 26. SB 463 Strengthening Government Accountability Through Public School Curriculum Transparency. This bill strengthens government accountability by providing public school parents greater access to current and proposed teaching materials. Under the bill, school boards must maintain all information about learning materials and educational activities on their publicly available website. ACU supports increasing government accountability and transparency by ensuring parents have full access to all educational material and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on September 28, 2021 by a vote of 60-38 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 27. SB 503 Protecting Life by Defunding Abortion Providers such as Planned Parenthood. This bill protects life by prohibiting the Department of Health Services from certifying any private entity under the Medicaid assistance program if they provide abortions. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on October 27, 2021 by a vote of 55-38 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 28. SB 591 Protecting Life by Requiring Disclosure of Abortion Reversal Options. This bill would help protect the lives of unborn children by improving the information provided to women considering abortion. Specifically, the bill would require that a patient, who is using a drug regimen that includes mifepristone, misoprostol, or methotrexate to induce an abortion, be informed that the abortion-inducing drug regimen may not result in an immediate abortion the woman may be able to continue the pregnancy. The patient would also receive contact information for resources and health care professionals that assist women in counteracting the effects of the drug and continuing their pregnancies. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and informing patients and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on October 27, 2021 by a vote of 55-39 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 29. SB 593 Protecting Life by Banning Discriminatory Abortions Based on Disability, Sex, or Race. This bill protects the lives on unborn children by prohibiting the abortion, or attempted abortion, of an unborn child if the person performing the abortion knows the abortion is being obtained because of certain characteristics of the unborn child. These include sex, race, color, national origin, ancestry, or a congenital disability diagnosis or Down syndrome diagnosis. The women seeking the abortion would not face penalties. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on October 27, 2021 by a vote of 55-39 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
