



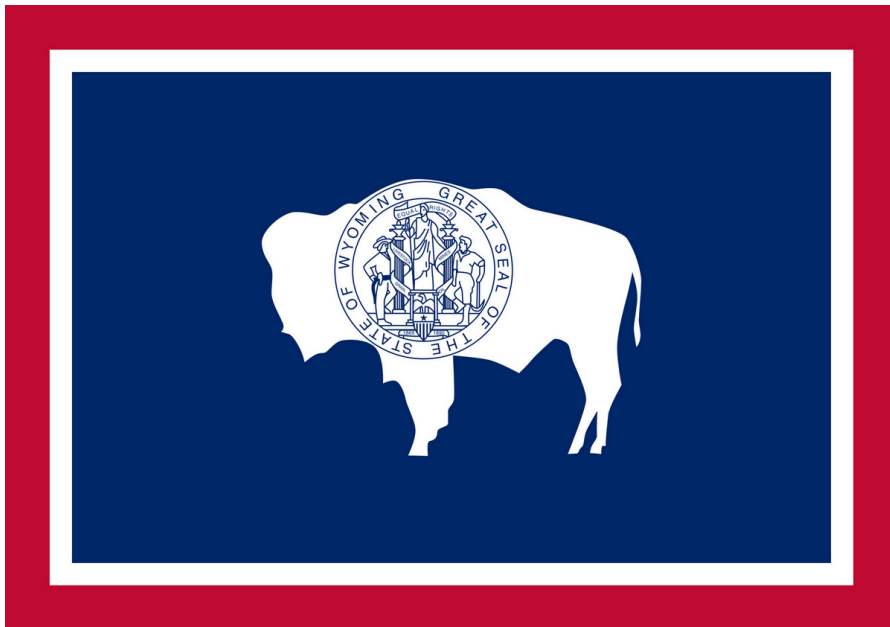

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the CPAC Foundation, is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area.

In 1971, ACUF launched its Ratings of Congress to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress. The Ratings quickly became considered the “gold standard” and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles.

In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, Ratings of the States grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers. Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America’s federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31.

Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected.

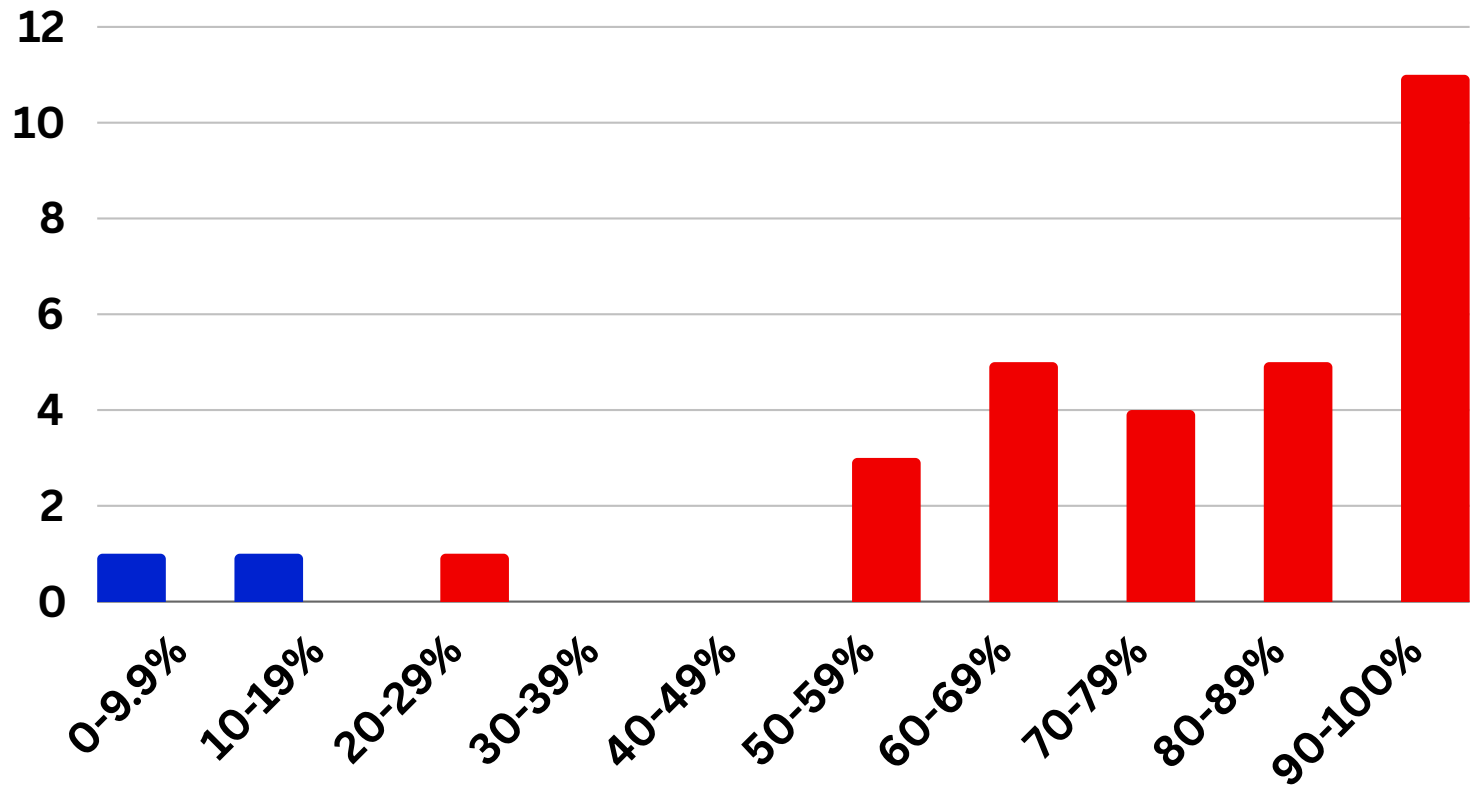

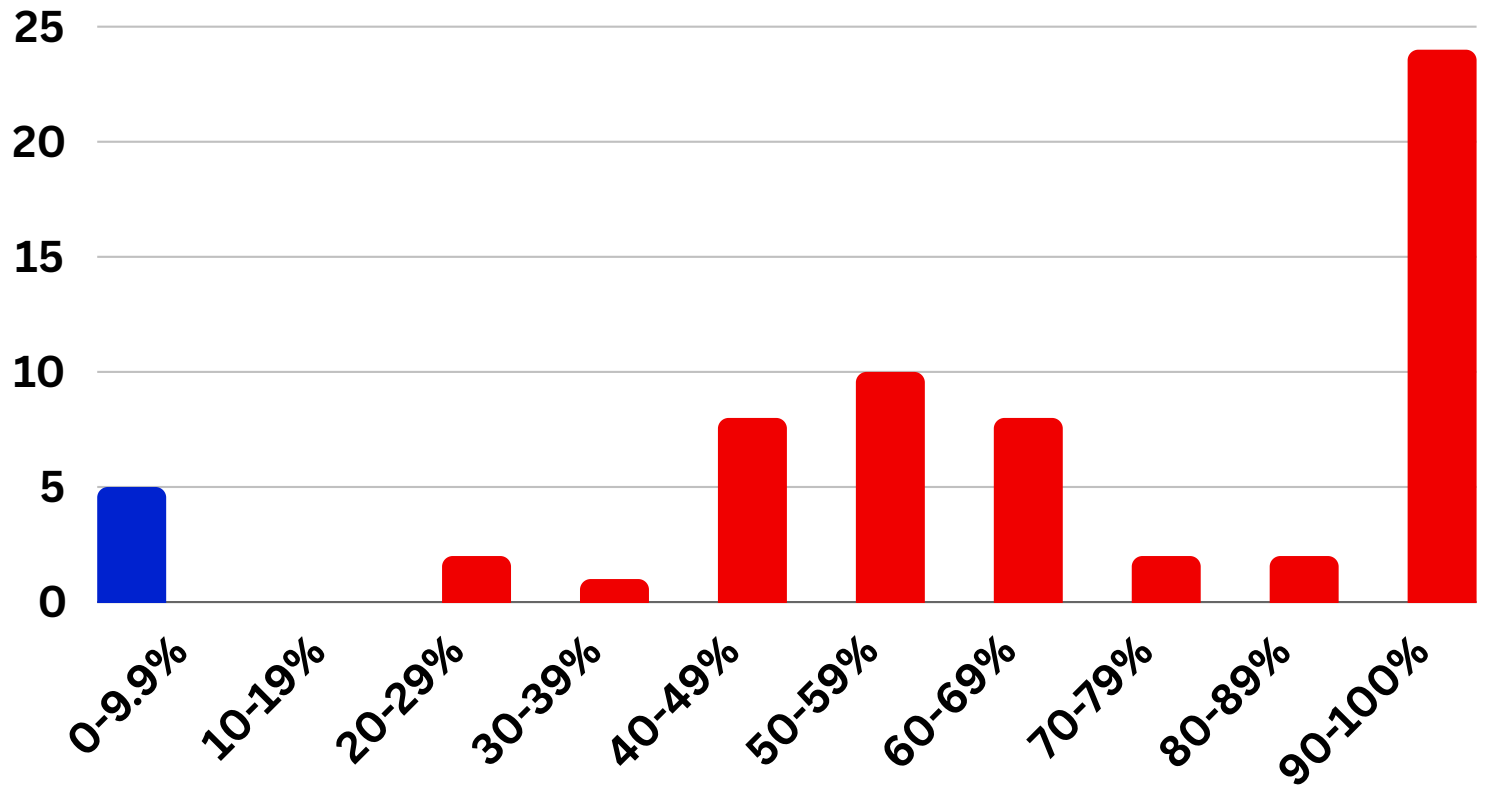

SF 1 (Amd. 2005) Wasting Taxpayer Funds on Various Cultural Expenses.

The Case (CPAC Lifetime Rating 54%) amendment to Wyoming's Budget bill increases the amount of funds apportioned to the cultural trust fund by \$6,000,000. CPAC believes that taxpayers should not be forced to pay for arts and culture-related endeavors and opposed this amendment. The Senate defeated this amendment on February 1, 2023 by a vote of 12-19.

SF 1 (Amd. 2041) Protecting Taxpayer Funds from Misuse.

The Kinskey (CPAC Lifetime Rating 76%) amendment to Wyoming's budget bill strikes a provision from the bill that would have apportioned \$40,000,000 to Wyoming's Tomorrow Scholarship Endowment fund. This scholarship program gives funds to individuals over the age of 24 to help them pay for their higher education. CPAC believes that taxpayers should not be forced to help pay for other people's tuition and supported this amendment. The Senate passed this amendment on February 1, 2023 by a vote of 22-9.

SF 1 (Amd. 2051) Expanding Medicaid in Wyoming.

The Case (CPAC Lifetime Rating 54%) amendment to Wyoming's budget bill requests that the government pursue measures that will help provide Medicaid coverage to more people. CPAC opposes the expansion of Medicaid and opposed this amendment. The Senate defeated this amendment on February 1, 2023 by a vote of 7-24.

HB 74 Forcing Taxpayers to Promote the Tourism Industry.

This bill creates the Wyoming Outdoor Recreation and Tourism Trust Fund and appropriates \$6,000,000 to its causes. CPAC believes that taxpayer resources should not be used to promote tourism and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 28, 2023 by a vote of 18-13 and the bill later became law.

HB 106 Diminishing the Scope of Eminent Domain.

This bill extends to 2032 a prohibition that prevents the government from using the power of eminent domain to erect wind energy systems. CPAC opposes eminent domain and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 16, 2023 by a vote of 18-12 but the bill was later vetoed.



HB 152 Creating Some of the Strongest Protections for Life Out There.

This bill almost completely bans all abortion procedures in Wyoming. It allows abortions to be performed when the life of the mother is at risk or when the pregnancy is the product of rape or incest. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 1, 2023 by a vote of 25-5 and the bill later became law.

SF 109 Shoring Up Protections for Life in Wyoming.

This bill makes it unlawful to prescribe, dispense, or sell chemical abortion drugs. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 2, 2023 by a vote of 26-4 and the bill later became law.

SF 111 No Radical Gender Surgeries for Minors in Wyoming.

This bill prohibits physicians from prescribing treatments to minors with the intent of changing their sex. CPAC opposes the performance of grotesque and unethical procedures on minors and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 2, 2023 by a vote of 22-9 but the bill was not introduced in the House.

SF 116 Preventing the Creation of Frivolous Litigation against Firearms Manufacturers.

This bill prohibits entities from bringing lawsuits against firearms manufacturers because of the malfeasance of an individual who uses a firearm produced by them. CPAC opposes the actions taken by many Democrat-run states to conjure up frivolous litigation against firearms manufacturers, opposes the construction of a system wherein a company may be blamed for the actions of a consumer, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 27, 2023 by a vote of 30-1 and the bill later became law.

SF 117 Improving Parental Rights in Education.

This bill prohibits schools from teaching lessons on gender identity and sexual orientation to kids in grades K-3. The bill also arrogates to parents the right to review their child's education records and know about their child's emotional state. CPAC supports parental rights in education and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on January 27, 2023 by a vote of 18-12 but the bill stalled in the House.



SF 130 Attempting to Restrict the Teaching of CRT in Schools.

This bill requires that schools teach a curricula in harmony with certain concepts to students. These concepts include those that state that meritocracy is fundamental to the pursuit of happiness and those that state that no person is responsible for the past actions of members of their race. CPAC supports efforts to reduce the teaching of racist and divisive CRT-adjacent curricula in schools and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on January 30, 2023 by a vote of 23-7 but the bill was not introduced in the House.

SF 131 Cracking Down on Vote Fraud.

This bill states that no person except the county clerk or secretary of state may distribute absentee ballot applications unless a person is asked to retrieve such a form for a potential elector. CPAC supports efforts to reduce vote fraud and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 28, 2023 by a vote of 20-10 and the bill later became law.

SF 133 Protecting Women's Sports in Wyoming.

This bill requires that public schools designate their sports teams as being for males, females, or both (coed). It then requires that males be prohibited from playing on the teams designated as being for females. CPAC supports efforts to create a safe and fair environment of play in school sports and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 2, 2023 by a vote of 27-3 and the bill later became law.

SF 143 Promoting School Choice.

This bill sets up scholarship accounts that parents may use in order to send their children to the school best suited to their needs. CPAC supports school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 2, 2023 by a vote of 17-14 but the bill was not introduced in the House.

SF 144 Making it More Difficult to Mutilate Children.

This bill prohibits insurance companies from covering puberty suppressants or procedures that castrate children. CPAC opposes the Left's abominable attempts to promote the mutilation of children and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 8, 2023 by a vote of 26-5 but the bill stalled in the House.



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WYOMING SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

SF 147 Diminishing the Power of Unions in the Public Bidding Process.

This bill prohibits the government from discriminating against companies in the public bidding process for not entering into agreements with unions. CPAC supports efforts to diminish the corrupt power of unions and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 1, 2023 by a vote of 28-2 and the bill later became law.

SF 153 Providing for Secure Ballot Counting Machines and Election Audits.

This bill prohibits ballot counting devices from being connected to the Internet. It also allows county clerks to conduct post-election ballot audits. CPAC supports efforts to decrease election fraud and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 1, 2023 by a vote of 26-3 and the bill later became law.

SF 159 Fighting Back Against ESG Corporatism.

This bill prohibits the government from entering into contracts with companies that discriminate against businesses based on their ESG score. CPAC supports efforts to reduce the influence of ESG in governmental decision-making processes and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 7, 2023 by a vote of 25-6 but the bill stalled in the House.

HB 1 (Amd. 2007) Wasting Taxpayer Funds on Various Cultural Expenses.

The Larson (CPAC Lifetime Rating 53%) amendment to Wyoming's budget bill increases the amount of funds apportioned to the cultural trust fund by \$2,000,000. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to pay for arts and culture-related endeavors and opposed this amendment. The House passed this amendment on February 1, 2023 by a vote of 36-26.

HB 1 (Amd. 3034) Forcing Taxpayers to Fund Bad Human Capital Investments.

The Nicholas (CPAC Lifetime Rating 42%) amendment to Wyoming's budget bill apportions \$2,500,000 to Wyoming's Tomorrow Scholarship program. This scholarship program gives funds to individuals over the age of 24 to help them pay for their higher education. CPAC believes that taxpayers should not be forced to help pay for other people's tuition and supported this amendment. The House passed this amendment on February 3, 2023 by a vote of 37-24.

HB 74 Forcing Taxpayers to Promote the Tourism Industry.

This bill creates the Wyoming Outdoor Recreation and Tourism Trust Fund and appropriates \$6,000,000 to its causes. CPAC believes that taxpayers should not be forced to help promote tourism and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on January 27, 2023 by a vote of 35-26 and the bill later became law.

HB 106 Diminishing the Scope of Eminent Domain.

This bill extends to 2032 a prohibition that prevents the government from using the power of eminent domain to erect wind energy systems. CPAC opposes eminent domain and supported this bill. The House sustained the Governor's veto of this bill on February 27, 2023 by a vote of 38-24.

HB 116 Stymieing the Efforts of Russia and China to Encroach on the US' National Security.

This bill states that the governments of Russia, China, and any other nation that sponsors terrorism may not purchase land within the state of Wyoming. CPAC believes that nations that are potential threats to the US' security interests should not be permitted to buy the US' land and supported this bill. The House failed to introduce this bill on February 26, 2023 by a vote of 23-39.

HB 119 Right to Try in Wyoming.

This bill allows pharmacists to prescribe drugs for off-label uses. CPAC supports acknowledgements of the right to try experimental treatments and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 2, 2023 by a vote of 44-18 but the bill stalled in the Senate.



HB 143 Preventing Elitist Organizations from Undemocratically Cramming Down Health Mandates on the People.

This bill states that the CDC and the WHO have no jurisdiction in the state of Wyoming. This means that any regulations or mandates that they issue will not be used to justify mask or testing requirements throughout the state. CPAC opposed the actions that were taken by corrupt elite bureaucrats during the COVID-19 pandemic to crush the freedoms of the people and supported this bill. The House defeated this bill on February 8, 2023 by a vote of 29-32.

HB 152 Creating Some of the Strongest Protections for Life Out There.

This bill almost completely bans all abortion procedures in Wyoming. It allows abortions to be performed when the life of the mother is at risk or when the pregnancy is the product of rape or incest. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 2, 2023 by a vote of 49-10 and the bill later became law.

SF 109 Shoring Up Protections for Life in Wyoming.

This bill makes it unlawful to prescribe, dispense, or sell chemical abortion drugs. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 1, 2023 by a vote of 56-5 and the bill later became law.

SF 116 Preventing the Creation of Frivolous Litigation against Firearms Manufacturers.

This bill prohibits entities from bringing lawsuits against firearms manufacturers because of the malfeasance of an individual who uses a firearm produced by them. CPAC opposes the actions taken by many Democrat-run states to conjure up frivolous litigation against firearms manufacturers, opposes the construction of a system wherein a company may be blamed for the actions of a consumer, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 24, 2023 by a vote of 62-0 and the bill later became law.

SF 117 Parental Rights in Education.

This bill prohibits schools from teaching lessons on gender identity and sexual orientation to kids in grades K-3. The bill also arrogates to parents the right to review their child's education records and know about their child's emotional state. CPAC supports parental rights in education. The House failed to suspend the rules and introduce this bill on February 21, 2023 by a vote of 27-34.



SF 131 Cracking Down on Vote Fraud.

This bill states that no person except the county clerk or secretary of state may distribute absentee ballot applications unless a person is asked to retrieve such a form for a potential elector. CPAC supports efforts to reduce vote fraud and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 28, 2023 by a vote of 54-5 and the bill later became law.

SF 133 Protecting Women's Sports in Wyoming.

This bill requires that public schools designate their sports teams as being for males, females, or both (coed). It then requires that males be prohibited from playing on the teams designated as being for females. CPAC supports efforts to create a safe and fair environment of play in school sports and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 1, 2023 by a vote of 51-10 and the bill later became law.

SF 147 Diminishing the Power of Unions in the Public Bidding Process.

This bill prohibits the government from discriminating against companies in the public bidding process for not entering into agreements with unions. CPAC supports efforts to diminish the corrupt power of unions and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 1, 2023 by a vote of 52-9 and the bill later became law.

SF 153 Providing for Secure Ballot Counting Machines and Election Audits.

This bill prohibits ballot counting devices from being connected to the Internet. It also allows county clerks to conduct post-election ballot audits. CPAC supports efforts to decrease election fraud and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 1, 2023 by a vote of 56-5 and the bill later became law.
